Friends,

Though I have been busy this summer getting established in my office and preparing for the fall, I am writing to you on my first *official* day in my position as the Priest Associate for Family Ministry. I am grateful for this new role, and I am doubly grateful for your willingness to accept me in this (somewhat unique) capacity.

Working with Jessica Chesson, our new Sunday School Coordinator, to put things in place for the year ahead has caused me to reflect recently on my own Sunday school experience. I remember the musty smell of the rooms in the old education building adjacent to my hometown Episcopal church, the stacks of children's Bibles that were probably fifty years old, and the tables marked by years of coloring and sticky from countless projects involving glue. I remember the motley crew of children my age who made up my church school class, especially Jason D. who could never, ever sit still. And I remember my teachers - Mr. Handy and Mrs. Caracrow in particular. Mr. Handy took us each week to Hardee's for sausage biscuits. I realize now that this was probably an effort to avoid answering questions we might have about God. Mrs. Caracrow was a plain, unassuming mother, but she inexplicably drove the fanciest car in town. This was a topic of much discussion with children and adults alike.

The fact that these are my memories of Sunday School suggests that the actual content of our classes was not particularly impressionable. I did not leave well-versed in the Bible, and my teachers were not great theologians or scholars. But my memories do indicate that I learned a few important lessons. I learned that you show up to talk about God each week. I learned that even if your best friends aren't in your class, your brothers and sisters in Christ are, and they are your church family. And I learned that there were adults in my congregation who cared about me and who took seriously the promise that they made at my baptism: to support me in my life in Christ.

As we begin this new program year, please consider how you can be a part of teaching the children and the youth of Saint Andrew's the same lessons. If you have questions about how you might be involved, do not hesitate to contact Jessica or me.

I look forward to a wonderful year together.

Come to Coffee Hour some Sunday or to a reception or other social event or just introduce yourself to someone you don't know.

Something on this list of activities and ministries probably interests you. Or maybe you know of a need here or in the community that isn't being addressed. Share your ideas and dreams. Find something that touches your heart and pitch in to share your gifts as you are able.

With all of us working together, this loving and caring community we call St. Andrew's will have a meaningful year of spiritual growth in service to God and our neighbor.

Ghent Area Ministry

Ghent Area Ministry (GAM) is a non-profit outreach organization dedicated to ministering in faith to those in need in the Norfolk community. The office is located at 1301 Colonial Avenue, across the street from Harris Teeter. The program addresses economic, social and spiritual needs. The GAM goal is to be a resource to people in need in their current life situations and to offer help overcome their hardships. They strive to offer a hand up, not a hand out.

GAM offers limited financial assistance, generally no greater than \$75 per situation, for rent, utilities (electricity, gas, and water), local bus transportation, travelers' aid, food, and prescriptions and medications. "Gently-used" clothing is distributed from The Coat Closet at no cost to the clients. Canned/boxed goods are distributed through the Food Pantry. A 30-day time limit between visits helps manage overuse and fraud.

The Ghent Area Ministry began August 1, 2000 as a collaborative charitable outreach ministry of fifteen congregations in the Ghent neighborhood of Norfolk that wanted to better meet the needs of the poor, distressed, underprivileged and homeless people who approached the various churches with frequency during the week. The desire to offer assistance was strong and the financial resources were available from the churches.

There were benefits to be gained for the churches and the clients from a centralized program. Social services knowledge skills were deemed necessary to best manage the requests which involved a great deal of time and put a burden on church staff in the individual churches. One point of contact also helped identify over-dependence and fraud and allowed for the identification of clients with serious needs so they could be referred to the proper community resources for more intensive and specialized services. For over ten years, the churches have supported an office within the immediate neighborhood of the churches, staffed with people having appropriate skills and experience to manage the program.

St. Andrew's is a member church of GAM and the Outreach Committee at St. Andrew's is committed to supporting this worthy organization. Not only does our church make regular financial contributions and support food and clothing drives, a member of St. Andrew's serves on the board of GAM. (Robin Kruger).

Volunteers are needed to serve on the board, help with client intake, answer phones, sort and organize clothing donations, and serve clients in The Coat Closet. Donations of gently used clothing for men and women can be dropped off at the GAM office. Donations of new men's' underwear, t-shirts, and white work socks are always needed.

The WSA is Creating a Cookbook!

The Women of St. Andrew's are preparing a cookbook called *Blessings From Heaven* that will feature favorite recipes from our members. These cookbooks will be published in the summer of 2014 and will contain special pages of interest, a table of contents, indexes of contributors as well as recipes, helpful cooking hints, and recipe categories with sub-categories. The cookbook is being created to raise funds for the special outreach projects supported by the WSA. In addition to that, however, they wish to

create a special book for all those in our church who love to read cookbooks, love to cook, like to cook or just plain need to cook - a book that will provide excellent recipes, great hints, as well as a nostalgic look back on some of the foods that have been prepared throughout our past century. So, please, be part of creating this treasure!

What types of recipes will go in the book? The WSA is looking for recipes that go across a wide variety of categories. The recipes should be time-honored, tried and true recipes which you have used for your family, the Foyer groups, for wine and cheese parties, for your children, for NEST, the bake sale - for any occasion where someone tasted your dish and said – *Yum, may I have this recipe?* Recipes that go back through the decades to 1911 are also needed for the cookbook. Do you have recipes from your mother, father, grandmother, great-aunt or beyond? Please consider submitting a couple of them to the book.

When you turn in your recipes, include any special notes, particularly as to the history of the older recipes. Let us know when the recipe started being used in your family – 1940's? 50's? Earlier? How was it used - during the week or for special occasions? In addition to notes about when the recipe was used, include notes that would help in the preparation of the food which are not really part of the recipe, e.g. what is the best way to slice corn off a cob?

The cookbook will have the following main categories: Appetizers & Beverages, Breads & Rolls, Soups & Salads, Vegetables & Side Dishes, Main Dishes, Desserts & Sweets, and This and That. The This and That category will have sub-categories which will include: Sauces & Marinades, Kid's Cooking, Brunches & Breakfast, Men's Cooking, and Pickles, Condiments & Chutneys. Sub-categories, of course, will depend on what is submitted. In addition, some of the recipes will be identified with a special symbol which will designate the following recipe characteristics: award winning, diabetic, freezes well, gluten free, heart healthy, holiday, hot and spicy, in memory, international, kid recipe, pet recipe, quick and easy, slow cooker, and vegetarian. The "in memory" symbol will be for recipes belonging to the cooks in our lives who are gone.

Because the cookbook is named *Blessings From Heaven*, each category divider will contain a blessing that is said before meals. If you have a blessing that has been used by your family for years, please submit it and, if selected, your name will be listed as a contributor. You can email your blessing to blessingsfromheaven.cookbook@gmail.com or write it down and place it in the Recipe Drop Box which is located on top of the mailboxes outside of Andie Rohrs' office or the one in White Hall on the sign-in table.

For specific and detailed directions on submitting recipes, see the Recipe Collection form. Copies may be found in White Hall or on our web site. There will also be many ways that you can help make this cookbook a great success. Besides recipes and blessings, the book will need those who would like to write a paragraph or two about our history, submit cooking hints, type recipes and proof-read them. Sam's Scarves to Touch More People

At the end of last year, Sam Williams went to the Prayer Shawl Ministry with the idea that we should knit scarves for those attending NEST. This idea was passed to the congregation and the project did very well in that we received 90 hand knitted scarves from our knitters and their friends outside the church. The scarves were distributed in March. The only problem is that March is towards the end of the winter season when nights can still be chilly but the brunt of the winter is over. This year, we would like to extend the program to reach more individuals earlier in the cold season. Our goal is to pass out 130 scarves to the guests of the Catholic Workers Sandwich line on the Saturday that our church sandwiches are distributed, November 23rd. Since we had about 25 scarves left over, we have a little bit of a head start. Whether you are an expert or a beginning knitter, knitting a scarf is as simple as doing a knit stitch from beginning to end. The scarves should be at least 4 feet long and made of dark yarn that is washable. Scarves may be deposited in a shopping bag which will be put out in front of the Church Office. Several patterns will be placed on the web site along with at least one pattern for a crocheted scarf. So get out your needles and hooks and pass the word to your friends. Deadline for getting the scarves to the church is November 10th.
