It had to be Miss Betsy. She is one of the first people whose death we have had to discuss with our daughter.

What a gift it was for my children to get to know Miss Betsy and many others like her at St. Andrew's. And if she were here she'd say that it was a gift for her to know them too. From our elders we gain wisdom and strength and historical perspective; from our children we garner energy and enthusiasm and curiosity. Everyone has something to share.

The months ahead promise many opportunities for intergenerational activities, whether it's helping at Flower Festival, making Advent wreaths, singing in the Christmas pageant, packing meals for Stop Hunger Now, or serving our guests at NEST. Let's make the most of these chances to live and work together as the Body of Christ. We are all richer for sharing the life of this parish with each other.

# I'm Serving Coffee after Church – Now What Do I Do?

Our after church coffees are a wonderful time to get to know one another over coffee and a snack. The church relies upon volunteers to provide those snacks but if you are the one who has volunteered, it could bring on indigestion just thinking about what to bring. Here is a simple 3-step recipe for putting together a coffee. First, think about doing the coffee with a friend. If it is your first time, team up with someone who has done the coffee in the past. That cuts down on time and money invested by each person and is a lot more fun than doing it by yourself.

Second, know what is supplied by the church. The church provides the coffee, tea bags for hot tea, sweeteners, and powdered cream. Cups and mugs for

the coffee are found on the shelves under the beverage center. Plates (always use small ones), napkins, and plastic cups for cold drinks are also provided. Check with church administration during the week <u>before</u> the coffee to make sure supplies are present. If they are not, purchase the items and keep your receipt for reimbursement.

Third, provide the food to accompany the coffee. It need not be anything elaborate. Think of FSSS – fresh, savory, salty and sweet. Have some fruit and vegetables. Grapes are always available and cutup celery and carrots can be served with hummus, a dip, or a thick salad dressing like blue cheese or 1000 island. Salty can encompass a bag of chips and a dip, a bowl of goldfish, nuts or the like. Savory could include hummus, cheese and crackers, pimento cheese, cream cheese and olives, etc. Sweet, of course, would be cookies, brownies, cake or the like. Keep it simple. Buy in quantities of one – 1 bunch of celery, 1 bag of chips, 1 container of dip, etc. For cold drinks, you can serve water, brew your own tea, or buy some soda, brewed unsweetened tea, or lemonade. You can save money by going to the big box stores like Costco and BJs. If you go to your neighborhood grocery store, look for sale items and house brands.

We have 52 weeks during the year during which a coffee is held after church. Please sign up to do one of them. The sign-up sheet is in White Hall.
