Rector's Reflections

As I write this, our household is in full rehearsal mode for school holiday programs and the church Christmas pageant. All day long our little angels belt out their favorites, often with hilariously mangled verses. For the first thirty minutes or so, it's a fun way to start our day with some Christmas spirit.

They tend to focus on the upbeat tunes so that they can incorporate drums and harmonicas whenever possible, and one of the consequences is that we never get around to my favorite – "In the Bleak Midwinter." I'm a sucker for reflective, haunting tunes to begin with, and I especially love the imagery of that one – the barren landscape and harsh conditions of the world as a backdrop to the promise of new life. I think it resonates with our lives and the way we're always striving to balance sorrows and joys, losses and gains, hurts and hopes.

I think that is especially true at Christmas time. It's a time and a season when all of those emotions churn together in our hearts as we look upon the manger. And when we look, we discover the beautiful absurdity that our savior would be born in such a place, that a stable would suffice for God incarnate. It seems such a ridiculous contradiction, and yet at the same time it seems so true to the experience of our lives. Of course God would choose to be born into the midst of our uncertainty and fragility. That's where we need God most. That's why the light of the incarnation shines brightly enough to drive the darkness away, and if we look long enough upon that manger we may see signs of new life springing forth around us. And perhaps in time we may be able to offer our gift in response. What can we give him, poor as we are? We can give our hearts. That's the only reason he came in the first place. Amen.

The group's 2014 broad policy priorities will include: Reducing Poverty, Access to Health Care, Environmental Justice, and **Strengthening**.

Health Department Food Handlers Regulations

2014 is the time to re-certify your food handlers cards if you attended the St. Andrew's course two years ago (Jan 2012). All people using the kitchen are required to be certified by Norfolk Health Department. The Health Department will no longer hold on site training. This means that we have to attend at one of their sites. There are day and night sessions for about 1 ½ hours. Here are the sites and schedules: Days at 830 Goff Street Mondays 9:30 a.m. Thursdays 9:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Evenings at Main Health Department 1st and 3rd Tuesdays - 6:30 p.m. Fee is \$10 No reservations needed.
