

Crisis in South Sudan Hits Close to Home

The story of the "Lost Boys" of Sudan began in the 1980s when thousands of children fled war-torn Sudan journeying hundreds of miles over difficult terrain to Kenya. There, many of the survivors lived for over a decade in refugee camps.

In 2002, dozens of the Lost Boys (named after the lost boys in the Peter Pan story) were relocated to Hampton Roads. Soon after they arrived, Julie Hill, the founder of Outreach Africa: Lost Boys Foundation, noticed two of the recent arrivals in a Ghent grocery store. She recognized them as being Sudanese and still "lost" in their new land.

Julie took the new arrivals under her wing and helped them settle into their new homeland - teaching them to cook, providing transportation, and helping them find medical care, education and jobs.

But all of the refugees had left behind numerous family members, including many young children who needed education. As the situation of the Lost Boys in Hampton Roads became more stable, Julie created the Foundation and began raising funds to send young Sudanese refugees in Africa to school. The Foundation supports nearly 100 students each semester.

In December of 2013, a political power struggle broke out in South Sudan. Thousands of people have been killed in inter-ethnic fighting, and it is estimated that more than 800,000 people have been displaced. Many of the local Lost Boys have family members who are affected, and the Lost Boys Foundation has been soliciting donations to help with their travel, shelter, food and medical care. In January, St. Andrew's contributed \$1,500 through our Mission and Ministry budget, and individual parishioners donated as well. It is not often that we can say we are literally saving lives



with our support.

St. Andrew's has included the Foundation in its outreach initiatives since being introduced to the organization by William Mayom, a parishioner and Lost Boy. William and some fellow Sudanese refugees in Hampton Roads are now exploring additional opportunities to partner with other churches and raise awareness about this continuing crisis. A St. Andrew's "Adoption" - Tyler Montgomery

Recently, St. Andrew's was given a unique opportunity. We were asked to serve as the sponsoring parish for Tyler Montgomery, a current student at Yale Divinity School and a Candidate for Holy Orders in the Diocese of Southern Virginia.

Tyler's journey in the Ordination Exploration Process has been unique. Because he has moved around a lot, he has not had a long-term relationship with any one parish or diocese. He met with a discernment committee at Christ Church, New Haven, but he cannot be ordained in that diocese. Our Bishop, The Rt. Rev. Holly Hollerith, met Tyler and recognized his potential for ordained ministry. He asked the Commission on Ministry of this Diocese to consider adopting Tyler under special circumstances. After interviewing him in November, the Commission approved Tyler as a Postulant.

According to the Canons of the Episcopal Church, though, Tyler still needed the recommendation of a parish vestry for ordination. Therefore, Bishop Hollerith asked St. Andrew's to "adopt" Tyler to meet this requirement. Because I am on the Commission on Ministry and John is on the Standing Committee, both of which approve Candidates for ordination, our parish seemed like a natural fit. We also have a common connection to Yale Divinity School, where John and I attended.

On March 11, we hosted a cocktail party so that the Vestry could meet Tyler. Subsequently, at our



meeting in March, the Vestry voted unanimously to serve as Tyler's sponsoring parish. While we hope that Tyler will visit periodically and that he will return to this Diocese when he is ordained, it is unlikely that he will serve at St. Andrew's. However, it is a privilege for our church to be able to

support this young man in his ordination process. Perhaps our paths will cross at some point in the future.

Tyler brings exceptional experience and gifts for ordained ministry. He graduated with a degree in Political Science from the University of Pennsylvania in 2009, where he was a member of the Junior National Rowing Team. He served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Costa Rica and as Spanish teacher, coach and dorm faculty member at the Asheville School in Asheville, N.C. prior to matriculating at Yale in 2012. In addition to studying for a Masters in Divinity, he also is working to complete a Certificate of Educational Leadership and Ministry, to prepare himself for a possible career in school chaplaincy. He is scheduled to graduate in May 2015, and his ordination to the Transitional Diaconate will likely be soon afterward.

Please keep Tyler in your prayers as he continues on his journey.

March

The Vestry approved the "adoption" of Tyler Montgomery as a member of St. Andrew's and candidate for ordination in this diocese.

PARISH NEWS AND NOTES

Education for Ministry

For 11 years, St. Andrew's has offered Education for Ministry (EfM), an accredited course out of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn The following is taken from the Reading and Reflection Guide: EfM is a four year study and group reflection process for the formation of Christian ministry through the development of knowledge, attitude, skill and identity as Christians. Published texts and essays provide the primary

knowledge content in the study of Christian tradition. The first year studies the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament). The second year offers a study of the New Testament. Year Three provides study of Christian (Church) history. Theology, ethics, and interfaith encounter constitutes study in the fourth year.

The EfM group at St. Andrew's is comprised of students from both St. Andrew's and Christ and St. Luke's churches. They meet every Tuesday from 6:30-9:00 p.m. Although this is a

four-year course, students only commit to one year at a time. There are reading assignments for each week that facilitate discussion. The course teaches group members to reflect upon issues within their lives in a theological manner. The cost of the course is \$350, but scholarships are offered to those who need them. The St. Andrew's EfM students will host a coffee on June 1 and will take applications from new students at that time.

St. Andrew's Red Cross Blood Drive

Blood Transfusion is not something we think about or worry about until we need it. In the United States, someone needs it about every two seconds. Over 41,000 units are transfused every day. Where does all that blood come from? It's not packaged. All of the scientists in the world are

unable to duplicate the life-giving qualities of a blood transfusion. There is only one source and that is a human donor – you, me, our neighbors, friends, family. Get a group of people together and about 38% of them are eligible donors but, in fact, only about 10% of them donate.

So let's see if St. Andrew's can reverse the statistics. We need 54 donors on May 14 to make our



donation goal. Help supply the blood that may one


Mark Your Calendars
