Parishioners Embrace New Yoga Class

"AAAAAAUUUMMMMMMM....." This is the sound that you might hear if you pass White Hall between noon and 1:00 pm on a Friday. It is not a strange animal or a malfunctioning air conditioner. It is not a noise from children on the West Ghent School playground. Instead, it is the collective exhale of the new St. Andrew's yoga class. "AUM," also written as "OM," is the sound in yoga that represents the Ultimate Reality, which Christians, of course, identify as God.

The yoga class began in July and has been a terrific experience thus far. It is taught by a new member at St. Andrew's, Eleanor Kootsey. Eleanor is a certified teacher in the vinyasa flow tradition of yoga that focuses on smoothly flowing, movements centered around inhaling and exhaling. Eleanor is also the See *Yoga*, page 2

spouse of Brenden, a medical resident at CHKD, and the mother of Tucker, the curly-headed blond two year-old you may have seen in the back pew on Sundays. In addition to teaching yoga, she works as a non-profit fundraiser.

Each week, Eleanor chooses a theme inspired by the week's lectionary readings or another verse or poem that has spoken to her in her own spiritual practice. She guides participants through breathing exercises, movement, and stillness to help them connect with their deepest selves and experience God through their bodies. In this sense, the yoga is as much a form of prayer as it is a form of exercise.

The class has been publicized as being suitable for beginners and for students of all ages and levels, and that has certainly been the case. St. Andrew's members ranging from youth group participants to people in their eighties have been attending, and the class has had an average of about 15 people each week. Some have added the class to their already routine practice of yoga, while others are trying yoga for the first time. As Eleanor demonstrates postures, she offers modifications for different abilities.

"I have heard about yoga for a long time and didn't know if it was anything I would ever be interested in because I couldn't bend in all of those directions. I still can't bend in all of those directions, but I am bending in more than I thought I could... and I feel good afterward." said Dean Rogis. He also noted that he enjoyed the meditation element of the class because "I was never one who was big on sitting around and meditating."

Mary Ellen Dechert has been practicing yoga for fifteen years and credits it for helping with her agility and range of motion in her older age. "This class is unique, though, in that it instills not only a feeling of spirituality, but a deep sense of Christianity and its relation to inner goodness," she said. She was especially grateful for the way that Eleanor recently wove the previous Sunday's sermon in to the class's mantra for the day.

The class is meaningful not only for its participants, but also for its teacher. For Eleanor, yoga is a means of walking the Christian path of heart trans-



formation. "I'm humbled by the vulnerability of the students who are willing to move and breathe through their physical, mental and emotional kinks to make more space for God." Eleanor has found that in planning each week's class, she is sitting more deeply with scripture imagining how it can be translated into a body/mind practice that will serve others. Working with people of various ages and abilities is also making her a better teacher. "Coming from a social justice background, I've wondered how teaching yoga can make a difference. Seeing 15 peaceful people at the end of class gives me hope for the world."

The new yoga class is a wonderful, new opportunity at St. Andrew's that celebrates the integration of the body and the spirit and is good for both. If you haven't already, consider giving it a try!

Vestry Updates

At the August Vestry meeting, the focus time centered around a check-in discussion with The Rev. Andie Wigodsky Rohrs, upon the anniversary of her first year serving as Priest Associate for Family Ministry. The Rev. Wigodsky Rohrs shared some of the highlights of the past year, as well as some of the challenges, and she also noted preliminary plans for the year ahead. We also discussed how the arrangement is working for us to have a clergy couple serving together on staff—both how that is impacting the family life of The Revs. Rohrs and also how the parish is perceiving their work together. Vestry members expressed their support of The Rev. Wigodsky Rohrs' ministry and of this on-going arrangement.

At the same meeting, The Rev. John Rohrs and Doug Mitchell updated the Vestry on the work of the Organist/Choir Director Search Committee. They noted that we have received around 40 applications, which we narrowed down to nine persons who were selected for phone interviews. That narrowed the field further down to six candidates, each of whom is coming for a visit to St. Andrew's in the next few weeks. We hope to have a final recommendation for the Vestry later in September. Thankfully, we are in no rush because we have been in such good hands with Dr. Joe Khoury and Richard Rigg during this interim period.

The Vestry also discussed several pending repairs to the rectory property at 1010 Graydon Avenue, and the possible need to allocate funds for that purpose in the near future. As the discussion evolved, we determined that it might be time to reclaim the property to do more extensive repair work and make sure the house is refurbished well. We plan to tie this in to a discussion about potential future uses of the rectory, including possible use as a center for new outreach programming. We will involve the parish in the discussion that follows. The rectory lease is up at the end of April, and we have informed the tenants that we do not intend to renew their lease.

Food Bank Backpack Program

BackPack Program FEEDING The Backpack Program is an initiative developed by the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia to

address the nutriental needs of children who are at risk of weekend hunger. These children, identified by school personnel, are discreetly provided backpacks filled with nonperishable food, to eat on weekends and school holidays.

There are 25 children at W. H. Taylor Elementary School that receive these bags. The cost of the program is \$100 per student, per school year, or \$50 each semester. Coffee Hour follows the 10:15 service each Sunday. This is an opportunity to greet one another, learn who is new to the area and to the parish family. While the church provides the coffee and hot tea as well as the paper plates and napkins, it depends upon church members to "host" each event and provide the snacks. The mantra is "simple goodies." Snacks can include cake, cookies or quick bread, fresh fruit and/or fresh veggies with a dip, chips with dip, pretzels, goldfish, crackers or nuts, and some soft drinks or iced tea or lemonade. The "hour" generally does not last past noon. For those who wish to serve as hosts, there is a sign-up sheet at the "Information Desk" outside of White Hall. Foyer Dinner Groups Start Back Up

What today we refer to as foyer dinner groups was born in the Diocese of Coventry, England, in the aftermath of the massive destruction from the German blitz on London during World War II. The fourteenthcentury cathedral was destroyed, but a ministry of reconciliation evolved from that destruction; and about 25 years later, in 1967, the staff of Coventry Cathedral began meeting in small groups to bridge differences, eventually giving these gatherings their present name. What they discovered were the strong bonds that formed

from this communal experience.

Foyer groups are strictly social events-sometimes dinners, sometimes brunches, sometimes in a home, apartment, or condo, sometimes a meal at a local restaurant. The only constant is the presence of good food and wine! Fover groups are what the members of each group decide to make them. It is a chance to visit and socialize outside of church with people you already know, but more importantly, with people you do not know. There are no rules, and there surely is nothing that says you have to host a sit down dinner in your home.

Signup sheets are located at the Information Table in the hallway leading to White Hall. We'll want to know if you can host a meeting in your home. It is not necessary, but we need to know for planning purposes. You can also indicate if you prefer to eat out. If you have any other requests, such as needing a ride, please indicate that on the sheet so we can coordinate transportation for you.
