Columbarium Planning Underway

Toward the end of 2013, The Rev. John Rohrs formed a committee to research and make recommendations to the Vestry about a possible columbarium at St. Andrew's. This committee, co-chaired by Deane Sobol and Jim Affeldt, also includes Penny

Lewis, Will King, Steve Batten, Dean Rogis, and Mavis Benz. Committee members have contacted approximately 20 local churches to identify lessons learned from their columbaria projects. Members visited many of these columbaria to take photographs and gather sample procedural documents.

A columbarium is a structure lined with compartments or niches used to inter the cremated remains of those who have died. Cremation is becoming more widespread as an alternative to traditional burial. Churches build columbaria to provide a secure, permanent and respectful place of honor for those who choose cremation. Many churches also provide a memorial plaque within the columbarium area

Making Meals that Heal

In the mid 1980s when the full impact of HIV/AIDS hit the U.S., Bishop Charles Vache initiated a Commission on AIDS for the Diocese of Southern Virginia. Rev. Charles Joy, Frances Barber, and Llew Roberts were representatives for St. Andrew's. That group started OPERATION AMEN, an organization devoted to meeting the needs of families in our diocese who were affected by HIV/AIDS. Since then, the organization has changed names twice and joined with CANDII (the children's AIDS network) to become ACCESS AIDS Care (AIDS Care Center for Education and Support Services).

for the purpose of remembering persons who may be buried or interred elsewhere.

As our committee found during the survey of local churches, there are a wide range of columbaria options, including: indoor or outdoor, within a formal structure with walls and roofing, within a wall or a freestanding monolithic element, within an existing cemetery on top of what appear to be tomb markers, or in peaceful garden settings. Some are very large and some are much smaller. Some are very formal and some are much simpler. In many newer churches, the columbaria were

designed to be a part of the overall church landscaped master plan. Of course, St. Andrew's does not have as many design options due to our tight site conditions and existing architecture. The Columbarium Committee agrees that if the church decides to move forward with a columbarium, the memorial should be done in such a way that it fits within our church and grounds in a beautiful, dignified and timeless way.

In order to assist our committee in planning we are asking the congregation to complete a columbarium survey in the coming weeks. This survey will be available either on-line via Google Forms or by filling out a hard copy. The hard copies may be mailed or given to Dennis Sipes or left in a box in either the Narthex or in White Hall. Survey responses will remain anonymous. Please note that although most of the questions have yes or no answers, boxes are available to further explain your responses. We will notify the congregation of the results and what our next steps will be. Thank you in advance for your participation. Please contact any of the committee members if you have questions or concerns.

In the early 1990s St. Andrew's lost two members to the disease in four days. A group of concerned church members decided that we could no longer stand on the sidelines and started an HIV/AIDS committee. We provided emotional and physical support for anyone who contacted us, spending many hours with those who were dying.

During this time ACCESS began a frozen meals program for families, delivering every two weeks, to give the message that ACCESS was there for them when needed. This has become a major project for St. Andrew's, guided by the leadership of Mike Whitehurst, Charles Hassell, Lynn Earl, Melanie Buski, and Llew Roberts, along with other parishioners and friends. We now hold a "Cook-in" every two months and prepare two separate menus. Each year we make approximately 1,200 meals, with our total now exceeding 30,000. Thanks to the vestry of St. Andrew's, we have installed a dedicated freezer to house the meals.

Through the years, the roles of the group have changed. Generally, we no longer have to provide physical care. In addition to the "Cook-in," we have hosted a number of extravaganza dinners called



"Dinner is Served (now known as Dinning Out)" as a fundraiser for AC-CESS. One attribute that we did not foresee has been the sense of community that has developed within this volunteer group. Many participants are not St.

Andrew's parishioners, but faithfully contribute time and money.

In 2003, St. Andrew's was the recipient of the Georgine C. Steinbruck volunteer award, "In Recognition of Outstanding Support, Service, and Caring to Full Circle AIDS Hospice Support." In 2011, we received the Equality Virginia Community Legend Award in recognition of this ministry. This work has been a continuing blessing for all involved as well as providing another avenue for our Parish Outreach.

St. Andrew's Launches New Recovery Eucharist

Beginning on Wednesday, Oct. 5, a new "Recovery Eucharist" service debuted at St. Andrew's. Planned for the Lady Chapel at noon on the first Wednesday of each month, the service is an adaptation of a liturgy distributed by the Office of Recovery Ministries of the Episcopal Church. The liturgy predominantly takes the form of a

traditional Eucharist, but it also weaves in the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous, forming those steps into communal prayers that anchor different parts of the service. The intention is to provide a prayerful context of support for those who are recovering from various forms of addiction, and for the family members and friends who care for them.

The idea for incorporating the liturgy into the worship life at St. Andrew's came when one of our parishioners who is in recovery approached the Rev. John Rohrs about organizing such a service. The need was evident, as nearly every person and family is in relationship at one time or another with someone who struggles with addiction. Too often there is a stigma attached and the problem is kept under wraps, but this service aims to bring the church into the conversation and acknowledge that our collective prayers and support can help buoy the difficult



journey of recovery.

The noon Eucharist seemed a natural fit for this service, because that weekly liturgy already features a focus on healing. The Recovery Eucharist will take place on the first Wednesday of each month, and the remaining Wednesdays will still utilize the traditional Rite I Eucharist liturgy. Please join us to share in this meaningful new service. Materials will be available for those who would like more information about resources for overcoming addiction, or for reflecting on the way that loved ones' struggles with addiction have impacted your life. There is also a weekly Alcoholics Anonymous support group that meets in the St. Andrew's Auditorium at 8:00 p.m. each Wednesday evening. Newcomers are welcome.

Vestry Updates

At the September Vestry meeting, we elected officers for the year ahead: Jay Lassiter, Senior Warden, Greg Murphy, Junior Warden, Dennis Pendleton, Register, and Larry Brett, Treasurer (not a Vestry member). We also signed up for committee assignments, whereby each Vestry member serves as a liaison to at least one standing committee of the parish.

The Rector updated the Vestry on the search for an organist/choir director. The search committee met with six candidates in September and subsequently narrowed the field further. Unfortunately, we were not able to proceed with our top candidates, and we decided to extend our search. We continue to talk with several new candidates and hope to have more to report in the coming month.

The Rector also reported that it is now official that we will be a host church for a diaconal intern, Genevieve Nelson, who is an ordination candidate from Church of the Ascension. A letter will go out to the parish soon introducing Genevieve. She will serve as an intern here for the calendar year 2015, participating regularly in the Sunday liturgy and working on an outreach project and other select experiences.

The Senior Warden noted that we are about two years away from the typical time at which the Rector would take a sabbatical. We ought to have that in mind and begin planning ahead of time so that it is a positive and renewing experience for the Rector and for the church.

The Junior Warden shared the preliminary landscaping plan for the back patio and surrounding areas, developed by Jim Affeldt and others on the Buildings and Grounds Committee. It has been publicized as an Angel's Corner project soliciting parishioner support.
