## Singing a New Song

After a six month search process, the Rector and Vestry at St. Andrew's are excited to welcome Stephen Leist as our new Director of Music Ministry. By day, Leist is on the faculty at Virginia Wesleyan, where he works as the Research Librarian. He combines that vocation, however, with a lifelong passion for the music of the Episcopal Church.

Prior to moving to Norfolk two years ago, Leist served for eight years as the Organist and Choir Director at St. John's Episcopal Church in Versailles, Ky. At St. John's, he oversaw a diverse music program and led the revitalization and growth of the parish choir. He directed several choral evensongs and other special services each year, while also collaborating in the broader musical community. In a prior position as the Music Assistant at Christ Church Cathedral in Lexington, he worked with the children and youth choristers participating in the Royal School of Church Music program. These experiences resonate directly with many of the priorities we identified during our search as ways we would like to expand our music ministry in the years ahead.

Leist brings a wealth of gifts to this position. As a trained baritone, he has a beautiful voice, a sharp ear, and a skilled approach to directing. He once had the honor of officiating a service of choral evensong at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., and he has completed choral residencies at several English cathedrals. He is also a very fine organist, having begun his organ studies while an

St. Andrew's is a member of the Norfolk Emergency Shelter Team (NEST), a coalition of churches and synagogues that provide an overnight homeless shelter during the winter months. The shelter moves each week to a different location. Our week starts **Wednesday, February 25**, and runs through **Tuesday, March 4**. For those seven nights, St. Andrew's will host 50-60 homeless men and women sleeping on the floor in White Hall. NEST is a barebones shelter. Our guests are admitted at 7:30 pm. We give them a hot supper, and a mat and a blanket on the floor. They get a light breakfast before they leave at 7:00 am.

It takes at least 15-20 volunteers to staff the shelter each night. There are plenty of jobs for everyone: registration desk, chefs and assistant cooks, evening helpers and overnight watch keepers. Stop by the signup desk in White Hall to see the schedule.

We will also be asking for donations of food and toiletry items (soap, washrags, combs, razors, small airplane size sample bottles of shampoo, lotion, deodorant and shaving cream, plus feminine hygiene products. We need LOTS of socks - plain white large size gym socks – at least 150 pairs, also gloves (plain cotton work gloves are fine).

Please note that NEST has no official affiliation with the City of Norfolk and is supported by voluntary donations from individuals and churches. The annual budget is over \$22,000 – which covers the cost of buses to take guests to outlying shelter sites beyond walking distance from downtown Norfolk, as well as weekly laundering of the blankets. You can make a check payable to NEST and give it to Dennis, who will send it to the NEST treasurer.

In the meantime, I invite you to take a minute in church to ponder the messages in the stained glass windows depicting the six Corporal Works of Mercy from Matthew 25: 34-40. The Gospel is clear on this. Jesus states unambiguously that we are called to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, give shelter to strangers, minister to the sick and prisoners. He goes even further. He says that when we fail to do these acts to the least of our fellow humans we are failing Him personally.

## Columbarium Survey Results Are In

A big *Thank You* to all who participated in the Columbarium Survey. The committee was delighted with the number of respondents (93) and the overwhelmingly positive response. Here is what you said:

#### Desire for a Columbarium

- 89% of you felt that the columbarium will be a meaningful addition to our sacred space while 11% either were not in favor or needed additional information.
- 61% will consider using a columbarium in our church if we build one while 29% indicated they would not (mostly because they have already made other plans) and 9% were unsure.
- The question "Do you think that use of the columbarium should be limited to church members only?" received a more equally-spread response: 35% said yes, 25% said no, and 37% were unclear.

As a result of these responses, the Committee is looking forward to making recommendations to the Vestry to pursue the addition of a columbarium and memorial garden to our church. Your many thoughtful comments will help to guide us as we progress to developing policies for the management of the columbarium.

#### Columbarium Cost

- The price of a niche was placed in the range of \$1500-\$2500. 62% of you indicated that this would be in your price range, 17% would not purchase a niche in this price range and 3% felt the cost was too high.
- Asked if you would be willing to pre-pay for a niche to help fund the construction, 26% indicated that you would be willing, 27% were unsure, and 20% would wait until the time of purchase.
- You were also asked if you would be willing to donate to a Columbarium Fund to help finance construction. An unexpected 42% of you indicated you would while another 39% indicated that you might contribute.

Again, this very positive outcome gives the Committee strong support and incentive to move ahead toward the goal of constructing a columbarium and memorial garden.

#### Columbarium Design

- As to the design of the columbarium, a compelling 60% of you indicated you wish it to be outside on church grounds while 9% prefer inside the church and 28% have no preference.
- Of those who will be buried elsewhere, 15% of you are interested in a memorial plaque, 28% indicated that you are not interested and 27% are undecided.
- When asked if you would like a memorial plaque for family or friends, 26% said yes, 39% said no, and 27% were undecided.

Your responses support the idea that a columbarium for our church is best suited to be outdoors. (Refer to the November/December Saltire to see the location that is being considered as the spot for a columbarium and a memorial garden.) The Columbarium Committee is excited about moving forward and is deeply appreciative of your participation and sharing of your thoughts.

## **Vestry Updates**

#### **November Vestry Meeting**

At the November Vestry meeting, the Vestry reviewed the draft budgeted presented by Jim Rhodes, chair of the Finance Committee. The draft budget represents the "wish list" budget as requested by all staff and ministry chairs. Vestry members analyze this budget in light of the on-going annual stewardship campaign, and also in consultation with stated priorities in the year ahead.

After an initial conversation on the budget, the Vestry tabled the discussion for final review and approval in December. With the rest of the November meeting, the Vestry took some "retreat" time to consider possible future uses for the parish rectory, which is being vacated by its current tenants at the end of April. The Rev. Jeunee Godsey, Diocesan Canon for Congregational Development and Mission, facilitated a conversation. The aim was not so much to make a decision but to explore ideas and also talk about how best to engage the congregation in that discussion. Stay tuned for more information and opportunities to share input in the new year.

In early December, prior to the December Vestry meeting (which had not yet taken place as of press time), the Vestry affirmed the Rector's decision to hire Stephen Leist as our new Director of Music Ministry. We also discussed and affirmed Richard Rigg's soon-to-be-enhanced role as Associate Director of Music Ministry.

In other news, the landscaping project will come to fruition in the coming weeks as new plantings are placed in the patio and playground area. Keep your eyes out for a more beautiful and inviting setting out back, which we will look forward to enjoying when the weather warms in spring!

## **Outreach Sandwich Ministry**

On the fourth Saturday of each month, we at St. Andrews help provide sandwiches for our homeless community. Members of the "Sandwich Ministry" prepare one or two full-size loaves of sandwiches, and deliver them to the church on Friday before Noon. They are distributed Sat-

urday morning on Salter Street at 7:00a.m., where they are handed out during the breakfast that is provided by Catholic Worker. The people that are served are very appreciative of this ministry we provide, many of the them smile and say they are blessed!

#### **Outreach Ministries**

Once again the Outreach Ministry Committee will highlight the parish hunger ministries during the season of Lent. During this time, there will be opportunities for the parish community to donate time, food and funds to help those in our community and around the world who are less fortunate. Volunteers can sign up for work on sheets on the table in White Hall; food donations can be brought to church and placed in the red wagon in the Narthex or left in the basket outside of the parish office; and financial gifts can be placed in the

offering plate or mailed to the office with a notation for which ministry the donation is to be designated.

The first volunteer opportunity will come on Sunday, February 22, 2015 from 2:00-4:00 p.m. when the parish will host its 3rd annual *Stop Hunger Now* Meal Packing Party. The hope is to package 10,000+ meals to benefit hungry families around the world.

During Lent, the parish will conduct a drive (February 23—March 23) to donate a ton of food (either by way of cash or kind) to the **Food Bank of Southeastern Virginia**. If



money is donated to the Food Bank, record Food Bank in the memo section of the check made out to St. Andrew's.
