Plant Bulbs Now for Beautiful Spring Gardens

Longing to create a gorgeous spring garden? Fall is the ideal time to lay the foundation by planting bulbs. Popular spring bulbs such as tulips, crocuses, daffodils, and hyacinths need fall and winter to prepare for spring blooms.

Fall Bulb Planting Tips

Plant when the soil temperature is cool. "Ideally, the soil's temperature should be between 50–55 degrees," says Susanne Woodell, Biltmore's land-scape manager.

Plant bulbs in a sunny location in a hole that is six inches deep. Make sure the tip of the bulb faces upwards. For the most impact, dig wide holes and place multiple bulbs in one hole. "Grouping bulbs in one hole creates a bigger visual impact because the blooms are closer together," says Susanne.

Homemade Glass Cleaner Recipe

Mix in a sprayer bottle:

- * 1 cup rubbing (isopropyl) alcohol
- * 1 cup water
- * 1 tablespoon white vinegar

Furniture Polish Recipe

Mix in a sprayer bottle:

- * 1 cup olive oil
- * 1/2 cup lemon juice

Shake well and apply a small amount to a flannel cleaning rag or cleaning cloth. Spread evenly over furniture surface. Turn cloth to a dry side and polish dry.

HOLIDAY TEA



There's a new book out entitled, "Kisses from Katie: A Story of Relentless Love and Redemption." It's the true story of an amazing young woman, Katie Davis, who has literally transformed thousands of lives in Uganda over the past four years. Oh, did I mention that Katie is just now 22 years old?

Katie started a ministry at the age of 18 and now this ministry, Amazima, sends 400 orphaned children to a Christian school through an education sponsorship program. These children receive three meals a day, school supplies, medical care, and spiritual discipleship.

They also feed lunch to over 1,600 children of the slum community of Masese every M-F. A majority of these children are from the Karimojong tribe. Amazima has also implementing self-sustaining vocational programs involving the local Karimojong women so the people can have the joy of providing for their own families. Women from the Karimojong tribe make Ugandan bead necklaces and sell them in the United States.
