### Pastor's Page ~ *Christ Leads the Way*



One of the great gifts and treasures of the church is the presence of four Gospels. So, in the Bible there is more than one portrait of Jesus. There are four. The Gospel writers – Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John – each offer a unique portrait of Jesus' life, ministry, death and resurrection. These Gospel stories have much in common. Yet, each offers a distinctive slant. They may even end up contradicting one another around certain details of the Jesus story. This isn't so much a problem as it is a gift and challenge. It is an opportunity, really, to hold all four Gospel accounts in a lively tension. Such a tension saves us from one-dimensional thinking and steers us away from a kind of fundamentalism.

We are blessed to have the witness of all four Gospel accounts in our lectionary – the cycle of Scripture readings proclaimed in worship. I must confess that I am partial to Luke and John. The Jesus in Luke's Gospel is filled with mercy, compassion and forgiveness. Given my sacramental sensibilities, I'm also drawn to John. When Jesus declares himself to be the bread of life, light of the world, or living water, I am reminded that God's grace comes in the most ordinary and earthy things. At the same time, there is a sense of mystery in this Gospel that complements God's presence in the ordinary.

Over the years, I've been more than a little challenged by Mark. For example, what do we do with the curious ending of Mark's Gospel? While Luke, John and Matthew describe the Risen Jesus speaking to and eating with the apostles,

Mark ends his Gospel in a rather open-ended manner. He reports no resurrection appearances. Instead, Mark ends his Gospel by telling us that the women fled from the tomb in fear and astonishment. What do we make of this? This year, since we are in the year of Mark, I pondered and studied this Resurrection account and, much to my surprise, I found Mark's Easter story to be a great blessing. Unlike previous years, I found this story both compelling and exciting.

The messenger tells the women to go back to Galilee where Jesus said he would go. Jesus, the messenger tells them, has already gone ahead of them. Back to Galilee? That is where Jesus did so much of his ministry. It is as though the writer of Mark wanted us to go back to the beginning of the Gospel and see that the Risen One is alive and well in doing the same sort of thing that was done prior to the crucifixion and resurrection. It is as though Mark is telling us to get clues for where the Risen One is

leading us by pointing to Jesus' activity in healing the sick, feeding the hungry, ministering to the poor, freeing the oppressed, speaking truth to power, forgiving sins, practicing compassion, and proclaiming justice. Indeed, many biblical scholars say that the entire Gospel of Mark is a Resurrection narrative!

Maybe one of the reasons I find this so compelling is that Bethlehem is now in a visioning or strategic planning process. Launched in January, this process begs us to see that we are always being called to embrace God's mission. We are called to see that our role in the body of Christ and in the world is to live

as disciples. We are called to follow Jesus. I see that message loud and clear in the Gospel of Mark. Furthermore, such a call to discipleship is what Easter living is all about!

As many of you know, our current phase in the visioning process is to hold a number of Easter meetings so that all the members of Bethlehem are given opportunity to engage in conversation about the ministry and mission of Bethlehem and where God is leading us. My prayer is that this phase, indeed the entire visioning process, will find us with willing and open hearts to follow the Risen Jesus into the wild and wondrous venues of

God's Kingdom. As many have wisely observed, the church doesn't have a mission. Rather, God's Mission has a church.

There is a great gift in the reading and proclaiming of the Four Gospels. Each one offers an extremely important picture of the crucified and risen Jesus. This year, I'm grateful for the witness of Mark and the challenge and comfort of knowing that the Risen Jesus has gone ahead of us and that the great blessing and joy of the church in mission is to follow where he leads the way.

## Worship Notes: The 50 Days of Easter

Easter is such a big celebration that it can't be limited to just a single day. Christ is risen! The bonds of death have been broken! We need a week of Sundays – seven weeks – to sing to God for Christ's victory over sin and death. We give thanks and praise to God for the power of God's love, for the power of new life bursting forth from the tomb. Thus, the season of Easter, lasting 50 days or seven weeks is a gift. During this time we can savor the story of the victory of life over death, of light over darkness, of forgiveness over judgment, of love over estrangement.

During the Easter season we sing of the "Feast of Victory" wherein Christ meets us in word and meal. We also sing numerous "Alleluias" and begin our worship with the Thanksgiving for Baptism. This is followed by sprinkling with water during the first hymn or song as a remembrance of baptism. The Paschal Candle, signs of the Risen Christ, burns brightly and has a prominent place beside God's Word and the Table. This is the candle from which the light of Baptism is taken. Notice, too, the beautiful new Easter paraments – a frontal covering the Altar Table, and the matching stole and chasuble worn by the Pastor. The Jerusalem Cross is embossed on these white vestments. They are a new gift to Bethlehem.

## A Note from Bryan Whiteside



What an amazing experience that was had this year on our Mexico Pilgrimage. It was truly an unbelievable blessing to be in the midst of some wonderfully godly people. In case you are unaware, this year our Pilgrimage to Mexico was a little different. Thirty nine of us from Faith Lutheran and Bethlehem Lutheran departed during holy week for an orphanage outside of Tecate, Mexico. This orphanage is unusual because it sits on a 145 acre olive orchard with 3500 trees. Two years ago they brought in 600 tons of olives!!! The goal is that one day Miracle Ranch orphanage will be financially self-sustainable from the sale of olives. Unfortunately olives are not a staple food but are more of a delicacy and it has been difficult to sell 600 tons of olives. So they are beginning the new adventure of making olive oil and their most recent batch won a bunch of awards in Spain.

At this point the orphanage does not have an olive press and are in the process of raising the funds to purchase one by selling their award winning oil. So we decided to bring back 120 bottles of oil that we will begin selling on May 6 (Cinco De Mayo weekend) for \$15 a bottle. All proceeds will go directly to Miracle Ranch orphanage in Tecate for the purchase of their oil press. If you are interested in hearing more about our experience we will be celebrating Mexico Sunday May 5 and May 6 and will be sharing testimonies, pictures, and the amazing things that God did during our week in Mexico.

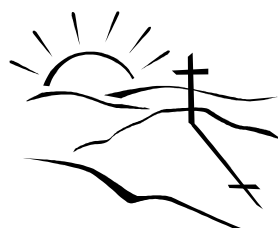

"You've got to be kidding," were the exact words I used when Don informed me that he was going away for two months and that I would have to chair the council meetings using Robert's Rules. What? Talk about stepping way out of my comfort zone! Here I was, still a relative newcomer to Bethlehem, totally ignorant of council work, and surrounded by strangers, except for Pastor, of course. What to do? Well, I prepared the best I could and sallied forth. Two council meetings later, I can report to you that this assignment was an amazing and most rewarding experience. I gained insights into and a lot of respect for Council work, our meetings yielded tangible results, and strangers became colleagues with whom it is a pleasure to work. As to Robert's Rules, well, it's a work in progress.

Here is a quick overview of what your Council (consisting of Diane Allison, Jaron Latona, Terry Mornin, Christie Sonmez, Laura Hesse, and Kara Sizemore as our secretary) accomplished this month. Based on the foundation laid by Don, we were able to appoint all mission team leaders but one, assigned Council liaisons to mission teams, set up a Financial ad hoc Committee, which under the leadership of Larry Brieschke is already hard at work to make sure Bethlehem operates on a sound financial basis, initiated the search for a new youth director, and revised the Continuing Resolutions in order to integrate our mission work into the Baptismal Covenant. Currently, Council is looking into ways to improve mission team creation so that new teams can begin operating a lot sooner and with greater efficiency.

Our top priority for the immediate future, however, will be the promotion of more congregational involvement in the many activities and services required in a vibrant, thriving church. Has anyone ever seen the full scope of tasks necessary for all of our ministries to function? In the coming weeks, we will make this information available to you because it is nothing short of awe-inspiring. In response, we hope that you will feel inspired to step out of your comfort zone and give service a try. Accompany Randi on a house or hospital call, for example, and see whether that type of service is something you could do. Spend a couple of hours observing Denise or a mission leader to gain insight into the kind of work they perform, or turn to a council member for help with matching your interests and talents with a task. God calls not some, but all of us to serve, following the example of Jesus. Reluctantly, I decided to give it a try this past month and ended up finding my niche at Bethlehem. 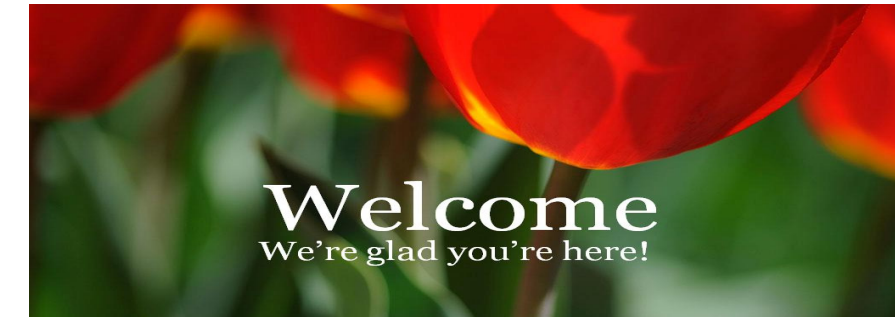
