Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends in Christ,

Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing" (Genesis 12:1-2).

These words from the beginning of the story of God's people helped form the work of our Strategic Planning Team. I quote from the Strategic Planning Update that is part of the 2017 Annual Report: We found that when we struggled to answer who are we and what do we do as a congregation, we best found the answer in Genesis 12:1-2. We are God's people, "kindred," called to take chances, and go where God will lead us even if we can't see that place, and to do so that we might be a blessing. As a kindred people, we are part of a church family. But our having two different worship service times makes this goal of being kindred more difficult. The Listening Sessions that were a part of the Strategic Planning process clearly showed us this. I've been struck in conversations with our members how worshipers at either the early or late services do not know each other.



With the goal of building community and strengthening our life as a *kindred* people, at its February meeting the Church Council voted to move to one worship service this summer at 9:00 a.m. each Sunday. Our hope is that you will embrace this new schedule as an opportunity to worship and fellowship with our full family of faith. One service will allow us to plan extended social time in the summer-think lemonade and ice cream!


While this plan may change the rhythm of your Sundays, the Strategic Planning Process speaks of being a people *called to take chances so that we might be a blessing*. A stronger, more cohesive church family will most certainly bless us and in turn bless the work we can do for our neighbors.

While we wait out the darkness and see daylight slowly lengthen our days, we joyfully anticipate a summer of praising God together in worship, fellowship, and service as a united community in Christ.

Stewardship Matters



Last month, the DOWN, IN and OUT concept of the cross as a symbol of stewardship was introduced: God makes the first vertical line DOWN. Stewardship begins at creation, where God first comes down to us. Next, God's faithful people

follow by moving IN to the center, responding with gratitude to the grace freely given. Finally, we look OUT to our neighbors on either side, both near and far, to see how God is calling us to love our neighbor with all that God has entrusted to our care. We focus this month on IN: What God has entrusted to our care.

God loved us so much that God gave each of us varying talents and time. As Peter writes, "like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received" (1 Peter 4:10). We each have unique gifts and talents that we can use. Sharing our talents makes us feel good, so much so that it can become self-serving. As a congregation of *kindred* called to be a blessing,

how do we each use our gifts of talent for the benefit of others, particularly those beyond our walls? God has also blessed us with time. We lead very busy lives, but we seldom reflect on how we are using this time. Are we using our time well to reflect on God's grace in our lives? How are we using our time to just "be" in God's presence? Are we remembering that time spent in worship and in service to others is more than just another to-do item on a busy weekly calendar? How might God be calling us, both as individuals and as a congregation? How are we individually and collectively called to use our time to be the light of Christ and be restored in the light of Christ?

Looking IN and recognizing the abundance of time, talent and resources in our lives, we know that the cross is not complete until we actively move OUT. As we begin to focus on a year of being *kindred* in Christ so that we may be a blessing, we invite you to keep in mind the image of DOWN, IN and OUT.
