Pastor's Letter

Dear Friends at American Lutheran,

In cooperation with ELCA recommendations, a sabbatical of twelve weeks may be granted by the Church Council to rostered clergy after serving at the Church for no less than five years. This statement was taken out of our congregation's Employee Handbook. In my annual reports to Bishop Crist, she has been encouraging me to take a sabbatical and to make it a part of our congregation's life.

This past Fall, American Lutheran's Church Council voted to grant me a sabbatical in the summer of 2018, and Pastor Elizabeth a sabbatical in the summer of 2019. Being part of a team ministry will mean that the impact to congregational life, worship, and budget will be minimal at these times since one pastor is always on duty. It won't be unlike when Pastor Elizabeth has been on maternity leave (although maternity leave is no time for rest for the mother!).



A sabbatical is based on the Biblical concept of Sabbath. It is to be a time of regeneration and renewal, of study and rest, of continuing education

and visiting other churches and otherwise generating new ideas for the life of the congregation. I'm at a different stage in life with this sabbatical than the one you granted me eleven years ago. With grown kids around the country, Marcia by my side, and new perspectives on ministry with more years under my belt, I'm excited for opportunity to travel, spend time with my adult kids, and invest in turning towards the next stage of our life together as a congregation.

Many of you have asked what we are doing during the sabbatical. Here's our agenda:

May: officiating at the wedding of Macy Carman, daughter of former ALC members Mark and Nancy Carman, at Mammoth in Yellowstone Park

--Festival of Homiletics in Washington, DC:

we'll attend a large preaching conference (1,500-1,800 preachers in attendance) and see the sites in our nation's capital

June: spend a long weekend in **Chester, MT,** where Marcia grew up, for her father's birthday

--spend a week in late June traveling by RV in the national parks of Utah

July: spend two weeks reconnecting with my family in **Minnesota**, which will include spending a couple days on a northern Minnesota lake

During sabbatical time at home, I'll be working on a reading list and doing some manual labor as I finish some projects around the house. My last day in the office will be **Thursday, May 10** and then I'll be back to work on **Tuesday, August 14**.

Many thousand thanks for this gift of a sabbatical! I am so grateful for this time of regeneration and renewal and the renewed energy for ministry that it promises.

Stewardship Matters: Norms and Averages

Though churches are no longer tracking certain metrics as a sign of health or success, there is one measurement that can't be ignored, but for reasons one might not suspect.

Reason #1 - Congregational giving does not measure financial success of the church; it measures the abundance of an individual's *commitment to the ministry* of the church, which is the work we are called to as Christians.

Reason #2 - Stewardship campaign pledges do not dictate the church's budget; the *ministry desired by church members* drives the budgeting process. What do ALC's numbers for 2017 tell us? We have 709 members comprising 409 giving units.

285 Giving Units received statements of giving, which leaves 124 Non-Giving Units Demographically speaking:

22 Giving Units in the Under 40 group collectively averaging \$970.56 per week 133 Giving Units in the Sandwich Generation group collectively averaging \$2,052.98 per week

125 Giving Units Over 70/Retired group collectively averaging \$1,972.07 per week

In general:

171 Giving Units give less than \$25.00 per week

88 Giving Units give between \$25.01 – 100.00 per week

25 Giving Units give more than \$100.00 per week

\$29.17 average giving per week

50.7% of annual offerings were given towards a pledge

Studies indicate that church giving is based on habit and that many people don't know what's normal or average. It's easy to tell if you are average or not based on congregational data, but how do you know if you are giving a normal amount? That's a tough question. Here are some ideas to ponder: Scripture often speaks about tithing 10% as the normal or expected amount, a tall order for many. Stewardship programs encourage growing by 1% or stepping up in \$10 increments from current giving. Yet the needle rarely moves in congregational giving with either method. Are there other methods that might be more easily achieved?

Drop Three Zeros: If annual income is\$60,000 then weekly giving equals \$60.

Make it Equal: Give as much as spent on kids' activities, meals eaten in restaurants, travel or entertainment. What if some of us gave us much each week to church as we did to Target?



What difference might that make in the life of ALC? Look again at the data above and then decide. We invite you to consider being among those making a difference, keeping in mind that giving is personal – it is

not data driven, nor is it driven by guilt or shaming. But sometimes data can help us reflect more deeply on the impact of our personal commitment to giving. Collectively, our giving is a reflection of abundance and the difference it makes in our church, our community and our world.
