The task of Leadership and being a Point Man always challenges me to raise my Standard. Consequently, I am always subject to material that I receive with scrutiny suspect - does that person really know what they are talking about or are they in leadership? I recently received a note reflecting on an article in Bloomberg Businessweek by Gary Burnison in which he explored some fundamental truths about leadership. Gary is the chief executive officer of a New York Stock Exchange company - I'm guessing he is in leadership and might know something about the subject!

Here are the two convictions that he has identified from asking many different leaders about the subject:

"The first was the importance of listening. Burnison says "... leadership is much less about the leader, and more about the followers and the mission. It's about having individuals look into your eyes and see who you, as a leader, really are; it's about letting them see into your soul. That kind of transparency and connection starts with listening.

"The second was the importance of always learning. Great leaders are curious. They are always on the watch for what might work better. They are eager to learn "more." John Wooden, the great University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) basketball coach, said, "It's what vou learn after vou know it all that counts." Burnison went on to say that "... leaders are always learning ... Leadership is stewardship of a company, its brand, and its people." Great leaders take that seriously and daily prepare themselves to lead well."

I believe that like great First Responders when they are in the throes of caring for difficult events they model and testify to leader being а in communities. I as well believe that Chaplains carry the same opportunity to take on and identify with the role of being a leader. I was asked not too long ago by a brand new sergeant what I thought they could do to really help their troops and I said, if you could help our guys and gals in uniform be a success they will be glad and honored to serve alongside of you no matter where you are or what you get into."

Team Building - Chaplain's Retreat



The Chaplains of Central Oregon Police Chaplaincy provide the crucial services that support the region's First Responders and the community. On an on-call basis, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, COPC Chaplains are dispatched to calls including deaths (Code 99s), death notifications, drownings, fires, homicides, hospital transports, infant and child deaths, motor vehicle accidents, search and rescue, suicides, and more.

In addition, COPC Chaplains provide confidential personal counseling and mentoring. hospital and home visits to assist in healing and provide support, critical incident stress debriefing and defusing for First Responders and the community traumatic following events. They officiate at ceremonies including funerals, weddings, celebrations, dedications, and other events. They do ride alongs and visit the First Responders at the agencies throughout Central Oregon. They also are involved in administrative duties, attending meetings, making community contacts, and fundraising.

Monthly training is offered to the COPC Chaplains, First Responders, and others; training to help Chaplains, Emergency Services Personnel and their family members maintain healthy relationships.
