The following excerpt was taken from a book entitled "Stories Behind the Great Traditions of Christmas" by Ace Collins.

Martin Luther transformed the look of the Christmas tree forever after a late-night December walk through the German woods almost five hundred years ago. Enthralled with the way the starlight looked as it filtered through branches of evergreen trees, he felt as if the hand of God had touched his soul and had allowed him to see the world in a much different way. Stopping on a snow-covered rise, he studied the scene for some time. Its tranquil beauty and soft light brought a great sense of peace to Luther.

Determined to duplicate the atmosphere of that outdoor scene inside his own home, the minister attached candle-holders to the tree's limbs and wowed his family and friends with the first brightly lit Christmas tree. From this humble beginning, the custom of putting candles on Christmas trees quickly swept across Germany.

Because of the new interest in lighting Christmas trees, craftsmen began to produce ornate candleholders that were made just for using on tree limbs. Specifically designed and multicolored candles soon followed. By the mid-1800's, a beautiful fir tree, trimmed with ornaments and lit by scores of candles, came to represent two things. First, it came to represent the perfect Christmas scene. It was pictured over and over again by illustrations in magazines, newspapers, books, and on Christmas cards. In just three centuries, the lighted Christmas tree had evolved into as much a symbol of the season as had St. Nicholas and the nativity scene.

But the Christmas tree also came to represent an extremely dangerous fire hazard. Countless trees were set ablaze by candles, thousands of homes were burned to the ground annually when a candle ignited a tree limb, and hundreds of people died each year in fires started by Christmas-tree candles. Yet the beautiful glow of the candlelight, even if it was a major fire risk, meant so much to so many people that concerned firemen could not convince even their own families to give up using these fiery decorations. It would take both time and technology to blow out the Christmas-tree candles.

In 1879 Thomas Edison changed the way America illuminated houses, with his invention of the light bulb. Three years later, one of his employees, Edward Johnson, decided to apply this new invention to the Christmas tree.

As had become their family custom, in 1882 the Johnsons purchased an evergreen tree and put it up in the parlor of the family's New York home. As they decorated the newly cut tree, Johnson was struck with an idea. Using the process of the Edison laboratories, Johnson produced a string of eighty small and brightly colored electric light bulbs. Much brighter than the light of a similar number of candles, the bulbs gave off a constant glow that was almost intoxicating. Johnson took them home and strung them around his tree. As the lights lit up the room and shone through the large window, the neighbors began to walk by the house and marvel at what they saw.

As most people did not even have electricity, the sight of a green tree illuminated by bulbs seemed almost magical. Yet even more incredible was that the Johnson's lights didn't just glow; they flashed on and off.

Even in a city the size of New York, the Edison employee's inventive decorations created a great stir. A parade of people constantly walked by the Johnson's home, and scores of people knocked on the front door, asking to see the tree up close.

Layered Pumpkin Pie in a Jar

Here's a fun idea to send home with your Thanksgiving guests

Ingredients

For the graham cracker crust layer:

1-1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs

3 T. brown sugar

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 tsp. salt

4 T. unsalted butter, melted and slightly cooled



For the pumpkin layer:

1 c. milk

1 15-oz. can pumpkin puree (not pre-spiced pumpkin pie filling)

2 pkg. (4-serving size) Jell-O vanilla flavor instant pudding & pie filling

1-1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. ginger

1/4 tsp. cloves

Preheat oven to 350°. Place the mixing bowl and beater(s) for beating the cream into the freezer to chill.

First prepare the graham cracker crust layer. Stir together the graham cracker crumbs, sugar, cinnamon, and salt. Then add the melted butter and stir until evenly moistened. Spread mixture in a 90 x 130 pan and bake for 5 minutes. Stir and bake for another minute or two, or until crumbs are fragrant and nicely browned. Be careful not to burn. Remove from oven and let cool completely while you prepare the other pie layers.

Now for the whippy cream cheese layer and the finishing dollop of sweetened whipped cream – my favorite part! Using your chilled bowl and beaters, whip the cream until stiff. Add the powdered sugar and beat just to combine. Remove sweetened whipped cream to another bowl and set it in the refrigerator. Add the cream cheese to the same chilled bowl and cream until very smooth, about 1 to 2 minutes. Blend in the vanilla. Now add half of the sweetened whipped cream back into the chilled bowl with the cream cheese, gently folding to thoroughly combine. This tastes awesome! Place this bowl of whippy cream cheese and the remaining half of the sweetened whipped cream back into the refrigerator to stay chilled.

And the final layer, the pumpkin layer. Pour the milk into a large bowl. Add the pumpkin, pudding mixes, and spices. Beat with a wire whisk for 2 minutes, or until very well blended. The mixture should be quite thick.

Now it's time to layer the layers into the jars!

Fill a pastry bag fitted with a large plain round tip (I used Ateco No. 808) with the whippy cream cheese mixture. Pipe a layer of this mixture onto the bottom of a jar (I used 8-ounce wide mouth Mason jars), starting at the perimeter of the jar and working to the center. Lightly tap the jar on a towel (so jar doesn't break) on the counter, to settle the mixture in. Repeat this step with the rest of the jars.

Sprinkle the whippy cream cheese layer with 2 tablespoons of baked graham cracker crumbs. Lightly tap the jar again to even out the crumbs. Repeat with the rest of the jars. Using the same large plain round tip, fill another pastry bag with the pumpkin pudding mixture. Pipe this mixture onto the graham cracker crust layer, in the same manner as the first whippy cream cheese layer. Lightly tap again and repeat with the rest of the jars.

Now you can simply add a dollop of the reserved sweetened whipped cream (without the added cream cheese) to the top of each pie with a spoon, or you can pipe a more refined swirl, like I did, using the same large plain round tip. Then finish with a sprinkling of graham cracker crust and chocolate shavings, if desired. If you plan to transport these jars with their lids screwed on, keep in mind the height of your top dollop, if you don't want it to get smooshed when you add the lid.

These jars of pie can easily be made the day prior to serving, they taste best after being completely chilled overnight.

Servings: 10 to 12 jars of pie, depending on how much you fill each jar

I Choose to Spank

I believe in spanking. Please keep reading! Let me explain what I mean. Feel free to disagree with me still, but at least take the time to understand my point. Let me start by acknowledging that my sisters and I were spanked as children. I can even remember the last spanking or two that I received. As an adult I can honestly say I am thankful my parents spanked and I believe they did it correctly. My sisters and I are all still very close to our parents and we were never in doubt that they loved us. We are also not violent people – we knew the difference between a spank and a hit.

Now, let me explain what I do NOT mean by spanking. I do NOT mean a hit on the child on any part of his/her body done in a fit of anger. Instead using Proverbs 22: 15 and Proverbs 29:15 as my guide, I use spanking as discipline. Here's how this will look. Let's say Cayden colored on his walls after specifically being told not to (I can still point out all the pen marks on my walls to this day). I would take him somewhere private and say "Cayden, you disobeyed mommy. I told you not to color on your walls and you did. You disobeyed so I have to discipline you. I am not spanking you because I am angry with you. I am frustrated with what you did, but I still love you. But I need to spank you because you disobeyed." You then turn the child over and hit firmly on the bottom in a controlled manner. If there is padding (diapers, thick pants, etc) I would do the bare leg. If it doesn't hurt, you didn't spank hard enough. But also realize you don't want to spank hard enough to leave a bruise. The child should experience discomfort with discipline (Hebrews 12:11). After the spanking is administered you then hold the child close and reassure your love and that do not enjoy spanking. This is also a great time to teach your child how to not get spanked again - you obey next time. Then I would role play what the child should do the next

There are times when I am so worked up I have to calm myself down before I can spank. Do I always do this perfectly – NO, but this is the standard I am aiming for. I love my children and I want them to know I love them enough to discipline, to make sure it hurts, to make sure they learn right from wrong. I'd rather they learn it from me than from someone else who loves them a whole lot less or not learn it at all till it's too late.
