## **African American Baptists Collaborate to Support Haiti**

Washington, DC – **February 12, 2010** - Five historic African American Baptist communities are collaborating to respond more effectively to the devastation in Haiti. The Presidents of these Baptist bodies have formed the **United African American Baptist Mission Collaboration** to enable a stronger response to benefit the people of Haiti.

The suffering being experienced in the Republic of Haiti in the aftermath of the January 12, 2010 earthquake motivated the Presidents of the largest African American Baptist communities to commit to link resources:

- 1. To create synergies in responding through relief and recovery for Haiti;

- 3. To engage in effective service delivery and sustainable community development in Haiti.
