Wednesday: Peace That is Just Right. Pray that you would know a peace that is just right in all times and all places. Pray that God's presence would be evident in your life as He makes His peace known to you in a variety of ways. "Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times and in every way. The Lord be with all of you." —2 Thessalonians 3:16 (NIV)

Thursday: Peace That Takes Effort. Pray that you would work in all ways to live at peace with the people around you. Pray that your efforts in pursuing peace would lead you to holiness that prepares you to be in God's presence. "Make every effort to live in peace with all men and to be holy; without holiness no one will see the Lord."

Friday: Peace That is Sown. Pray that you would be aware of the seeds of peace which have been sown in your life. Pray that you would live as a peacemaker who sows those same seeds of God's peace into the lives of others. "Peacemakers who sow in peace raise a harvest of righteousness."—James 3:18 (NIV)

Saturday: **Peace That is Sought**. Pray that you would turn from all that is at odds with true peace. Pray that you would pursue peace as you do the good God has created for you to do. "He must turn from evil and do good; he must seek peace and pursue it."—1 Peter 3:11 (NIV)
