### Message from President Karen Dixon

#### April 13, 2013

I am writing this letter from Malawi Africa, where Blair and I are on a 5 month volunteer mission. I am setting up a risk management program for the Malawi Unions of Savings and Credit Cooperatives, Blair is working with the chaplains of the Malawi Police Service and serving as priest- in-charge at a local parish, and together we are working on a project to promote financial literacy in women and youth. There is a video on our blog of the Bishop dancing and praising God at Blair's induction. (The Bishop lost no time in conscripting Blair to be priest-in-charge within minutes after we were introduced to him....it was an on-the-spot kind of moment!)

Do use Google because our blog will come up close to the top of the list and you won't have to hunt for it. As I write, I can hear the sound of the gardener sweeping our compound with a short hand -broom made of twigs bundled together with twine. Blair just went out to give him and the other workers in our compound a small tip of 1000 MWK each, which is about \$4 USD. We do this every 2 weeks or so. It is a tiny amount of money to us but, by way of comparison, the salary upon which they must live is only 14,000 MWK per month, 10,000 MWK of which goes to their rent. To give you context, we are shopping and doing our own cooking here and often our daily grocery bill is as much as the 4000MWK upon which they must relay to pay school fees, pay for power and water, buy food, etc., etc. I have no idea how they do it. Most of the people we meet and work with in Malawi are beautiful, joyfully spiritual, gentle, and kind, which is in itself remarkable because they suffer from lack of basics such as food, shoes, clean water, and adequate healthcare.
