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

Celebrating 132 Years of Excellence


First Calvary Baptist Church has been an influential presence in the West End Community since 1884. On Sunday, October 23, 2016, the church celebrated *132 years of excellence*. For the past 132 years, First Calvary Baptist Church has served the community as a living organism, a vibrant, thriving and growing family of faith. To celebrate this milestone as a collective body, the early morning and morning worship services were combined and held at 9:30am.

Pastor Davis' sermon, *The Excellent Work of the Church*, was taken from Acts 16:11-34." In his message, he reminded us that all that God has asked us to do is found in the Word. The disciples of Jesus acted in the power of God and recognized the power of community over individuality. Pastor Davis stated that a church is more than bricks and mortar. The church has strength because of the faithfulness of God. He said that Satan comes to kill, steal and destroy, but God works in mysterious ways; His wonders to perform. In the scripture text, Paul and Silas acted courageously. On their way to a place of prayer, they met a slave girl who had a spirit of prediction. Her owners were making lots of money through her fortune telling. She followed Paul and Silas for several days until Paul became annoyed and commanded the spirit of prediction to come out of the slave girl. When her owners saw that the girl could no longer make money for them, they beat Paul and Silas, took them to the town square, and had them arrested. Pastor Davis said that we should not get annoyed by what is happening in our communities unless we, like Paul and Silas, are

willing to go against the status quo. Paul and Silas rebuked the slave girl because she needed to be changed. America needs to be changed but we must have the courage to go up against unjust systems. Like Paul and Silas, if we are beaten and battered so badly that we fall on our backs, we need to remember to look up to the hills from whence cometh our help because our help comes from God. Even after Paul and Silas were thrown into prison, they continued to celebrate by praying and singing. Around midnight, an earthquake opened the jail doors and loosened their bonds, but Paul and Silas continued to worship God. Because of their actions, the jailer believed and he and his family were saved.

Most of us are familiar with movie and television characters dubbed "dynamic duos". Pastor Davis offered a more *spiritual* dynamic duo: *Prayer and Praise*. Prayer still works. When praises go up, blessings come down, doors are opened and shackles are loosed. Like Paul and Silas, we must be courageous. We must change the way that we do things. The church needs to praise God. We must celebrate and praise God for the great things that He has already done. We need to be that bold and courageous congregation that strives to empower, enlighten and evangelize to change our community for the better.

The 2016 Whole Family Life Conference

The Month of October brings fall temperatures, Sunday afternoon football games, and warm comforting foods to the table. It also brings two other significant events for the friends and members of First Calvary Baptist Church! We celebrate our 132nd anniversary in existence on October 23rd and the Whole Family Conference every Wednesday in October during our normal bible study time slot. **The 2016 Whole Family Life Conference** was devoted to spiritual strongholds and the Black family and was an attempt to bring multigenerational family units together to discuss and destroy strongholds that are hurting the family system.

Week 1 – Pastor and Mrs. Davis used examples from the book we have been using for weekly bible study, *Victory in Spiritual Warfare* by Tony Evans, to illustrate how the enemy works to destroy the family unit. We talked about using scripture to counterattack the enemy's efforts and praying over family members every day. It was suggested that we take turns identifying a family member as the prayer leader and have that family member pray over the family for a week. This will encourage greater communication among all family members and make them more resistant to the divisive effects of the enemy.

Week 2 – Dr. Jennifer Rounds-Bryant and Ms. Cheryl Thomas explored with the audience how social media and mental health issues are affecting individual family members and the family unit. They shared with the audience ways to safeguard the spiritual portals of the family so that all family members would be comfortable sharing information about what they are seeing on the internet and how it was making them feel. Members were urged to pay attention to each other so that they could detect changes in behavior, diet, and social activities. This early detection would allow both a physical and spiritual intervention on behalf of the entire family unit. We were cautioned to not make the mistake of thinking that our youth are too savvy, young, or smart to not be seduced by some of the items they may be exposed to on the internet.

Week 3 – A diverse panel consisting of an educator, politician, and youth shared their personal perspectives on how current events are affecting black families. Panelists

discussed different ways that they and their family stayed abreast of current events and how the various forums had some inherent risks. For example, one panelist shared that because most of her news came via social networks she had to be careful about accepting every item shared as factual until other forums were checked. This allowed her to protect her emotions as well as act as a safeguard for other family and friends that did not check verify their sources. This proactive stance allowed the panelist to "watch and pray" so that she and her family would not fall into temptation.

Week 4 – Fun, Fellowship, and Discussion. This intergenerational group of members, friends, and youth openly discussed the "proper" response of the church concerning current events that affect family values and why it matters to God. Participants played word games, had small group discussion, and created a suggestion board for families to use to define their family values, create special prayer time, and review the role of each piece of armor which works to protect us from the enemy attacks.

The Whole Family Conference, inspired by God and designed by the Visionary Ministry, assisted families in understanding, recognizing, and appreciating that Christians must play a role in the spiritual warfare through their Godly choices and actions that serve to further God's kingdom. The conference also helped some attendees to see how their ungodly actions further the efforts of the forces of evil to suppress faith and goodness.



First Calvary Baptist Church was honored to have a guest choir, Joyful Soul, from Sundsvall, Sweden to sing at the 7:45am worship service on September 11, 2016. This group sang with energy, enthusiasm and joy. Although English was not their native language, most of their songs were sung in English. After the 7:45am service, they visited another local church to render music. They returned to First Calvary to sing at a 4:00pm concert later that day. At the afternoon concert, they sang 13 songs. They seemed to enjoy singing lively gospel songs, religious songs and other hymns. They did two songs in their native Swedish language, one of which was "How Great Thou Art." The group was well received by the audience at the concert. Many in the audience stood, raised their hands in praise clapped and shouted "Hallelujah." They even requested that they repeat one song. After the concert, the members of Joyful Soul came out of the choir stand so that they could be greeted and hugged by members from the audience. On Monday, they participated in a Music Workshop at First Calvary Baptist Church. This workshop was open to other congregations and to members of the community. Minister Michael Dotson, our Minister of Music told us that he met this group several years ago, and they were warm and welcoming to him. Typically, he goes to Sweden during the summer and spends two weeks working with them. Minister Dotson stated that the choir wanted to come to the United States this year so the members of the group paid their own way to come here for this occasion. Real Talk Forum: Minority Dads in Education

On August 23^{rd.}, 42 men gathered around pizza and passionately discussed being "boxed out", "getting off the bench", and "taking the challenge". No, this was not a man-cave. It was an Open Forum in the First Calvary Baptist Church Fellowship Hall co-sponsored by our Couples' Ministry and Male Summit. The topic wasn't a struggling professional sports team. It was "Minority Dads in Education".

As it relates to being "boxed out", the first topic to get off the ground centered around the difficulty that many minority males face when simply walking into the school environment. For example, a father standing with his wife in a classroom felt invisible as the teacher spoke directly to the wife the entire time. Others agreed that their story was not told in the school curriculum, and recalled the impact it had on them as growing young men.

Rodney Williams, CEO of Walk for Life, encouraged men to get involved (or get off the bench), and be counted when our youth are being supported in the community. In the marches and other events that his organization sponsors, he noted that "the women show up" as role models for the girls but the men are not present to do the same for the young men. Thomas Mentor

Leadership Academy's CEO Larry Thomas had the same testimony.

Many of those who are actively involved in education to make a commitment to support the efforts of these existing organizations, as well as others represented, such as The New Man Institute for Skill-building, the Rites of Passage, Minority Men in Medicine, the Charles Hamilton Houston Foundation, Inc., and First Calvary's Recreation Ministry. The Many Faces of Bullying

Bullying, which can be broadly defined as intentionally causing physical, emotional, and/or spiritual harm to someone else as a show of power and authority, is very common among both children and adults. Bullies operate in schools, sports, communities, workplaces, churches and anywhere else people gather. Some consider it sport to intentionally hurt others, especially when they can get an audience, or even better, a group of additional participants. Ironically, people generally bully out of a sense of insecurity and lack of control over themselves or their circumstances. The consequences for the victims can range from low self-esteem, depression, and anxiety to suicide and homicide.

Parents are usually concerned about our children being subjected to bullying, but we rarely consider whether our children are bullying others, or whether we ourselves are bullying others. Given the grave consequences of bullying, we would do well to do a 360-degree check for bullying in our environment. The best way to find out if our children are being bullied by anyone is to ask them about their daily interactions with peers and then listen for signs of significant negative interaction in their stories. The best way to find out if our children are bullying other children (either overtly or covertly) is to ask the adults and peers who typically interact with our children (e.g., school administration and their school mates) and be willing to listen openly and to speak with our children about what we find out.

When we find evidence of bullying in any arena, we should be very intentional about reporting it to the leaders in the environment, as well as to parents when there are children involved, and helping to create a positive resolution to the situation – which can take a lot of trial and error. Let's keep working to stamp out bullying!

On Saturday, 24 September 2016, the annual Christian Education Workshop was held, with Dr. David C. Forbes, Sr. as guest speaker. After a hearty breakfast, the workshop began with welcome, scripture, and prayer by Minister Montez Thomas, followed by a historical overview of how to interpret scriptures by Minister John Carter. He reviewed the four types of context within Biblical scriptures:

Historical context, social context, political context, and literary context

Part one of Dr. Forbes' presentation was on the Urgency of Christian Discipleship, where he began the segment by defining what a disciple is: a committed Christian who is taught and trained in the teachings of Jesus Christ. He defined discipleship as a continuing, lifelong process of learning and obediently living out the teachings of Jesus Christ, in order to be an effective witness, impacting the world for Christ through Christian character and loving service to others. When asked what proof we as the workshop participants have that we are Christian disciples, the responses included that we are confessional, we let our light so shine that others will see our good works without telling them, loving God and loving our neighbors as ourselves, serving others willingly, studying the Word, loving without condition, baptized born-again believers in Christ, and committed to service as if it were a paid task. We also concluded that our faith is demonstrated in our walk as we are obedient to God's calling and urging to go out into the

Part two of the workshop morphed into a discussion on witnessing, where Dr. Forbes reminded us that witnessing is not an option; it is an obligation of discipleship. As disciples, witnessing should become second nature to us to share with others. We are to pray daily that the Lord uses us as instruments of witness, and show us when and where we may effectively witness to others. In his closing remarks, Pastor Davis concluded that we must see ourselves as sinners saved by grace, and as long as we continue to do the mission work - the kingdom work of God. that is all God requires of us.

world to reconnect those who have lost their way or disconnected from Christ.

Annual Biblical Institute

The Christian Education emphasis series continued with the Annual Biblical Institute, led by guest facilitator, Dr. Victor Davis of Bethlehem Baptist Church, in Richmond, VA. During this three-day series, from Monday – Wednesday, September 26-28th, Dr. Davis focused on the *Dimensions of Spiritual Warfare*, which he defined as the "cosmic conflict waged in the invisible, spiritual realm that is simultaneously fleshed out in the context of the visible, physical realm." On Monday, he spoke from Ephesians 6:12: *Our battle is not against flesh, but against the authorities, against the world powers of this darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavens*. Dr. Davis concluded that when David prepared to enter battle with Goliath, he was armed with four weapons. He had: (1) a vision of victory, (2) he didn't allow everyone to speak to his spirit, (3) he claimed his anointing, and (4) he put his situation in God's hands.

On Tuesday, Dr. Davis spoke from Proverbs 27:17: *As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another*, where he reminded us that iron in this passage speaks of someone in your life who makes you better. He stated that the easiest way to be denied access to where God wants you to go is to surround yourself with people who were not sent/assigned by God. Dr. Davis also talked about the six types of people who are qualified to speak into our lives: (1) comforter, (2) confronter, (3) challenger, (4) counselor, (5) co-benefactor, and (6) celebrator.

On the concluding night, Dr. Davis gave an analogy of being behind someone at a traffic light, and when the light turns green, the driver does not move...they are *stuck at a green light*. There are several reasons why someone may be stuck at the green light in life, including pride, desire clouding discernment, and giving your all and getting nothing in return. What advice should we give to someone who is *stuck at a green light*? Move forward, and pray.

NOVEMBER: ALZHEIMER'S AWARENESS MONTH

Alzheimer's Disease Facts

Alzheimer's (AHLZ-high-merz) disease is a progressive brain disorder that gradually destroys a person's memory and ability to learn, reason, make judgments, communicate and carry out daily activities. As Alzheimer's progresses, individuals may also experience changes in behavior, such as anxiety, suspiciousness or agitation, as well as delusion or hallucinations.

In late stages, the individuals need help with dressing, personal hygiene, eating and other basic functions. People with Alzheimer's die an average of eight years after first experiencing symptoms, but the duration of the disease can vary from three to 20 years.

Although there is currently no real cure for Alzheimer's, new treatments are on the horizon as a result of accelerating insight into the biology of the disease. Research has also shown that effective care and support can improve quality of life for individuals and their caretakers over the course of disease.

Causes of Alzheimer's Disease

Alzheimer's disease has no known single cause, but the last 15 years research has revealed a great deal about factors that may play a role. Late-onset Alzheimer's, which chiefly affects individuals over the age 65, is the more common form of the illness. The greatest known risk factors for late-onset Alzheimer's are increasing age and a family history of the disease. The likelihood of developing late-onset Alzheimer's approximately doubles every five years after age 65. By age 85, the rate risk reaches nearly 50 percent. Scientists have so far discovered one gene that increases the risk for the late-onset disease.

Diagnosing Alzheimer's Disease

Although Alzheimer's symptoms can vary widely, the first problem that many people notice is forgetfulness severe enough to affect performance at home, at work or in favorite activities. Sometimes the decline in memory may be more obvious to a family or close friend. The Alzheimer's Association encourages everyone who notices these symptoms in themselves or someone close to consult a physician. A skilled physician can diagnose Alzheimer's disease with 90 percent accuracy and provide further intervention.

Treating Alzheimer's Disease

Alzheimer's medication approved by U.S. Food and Federal Drug Administration (FDA) may temporarily delay memory decline for some individuals, but none of the currently approved drugs is known to stop the underlying degeneration of brain cell. One important part of treatment is supportive care that helps individuals and families come to term with the diagnosis.

Impact on Caregivers

Alzheimer's has a major impact on those who help to care for affected individual. More than 70% of people with Alzheimer's live at home, where family and friends provide most of their care. As the disease progresses, it places physical, emotional and financial stress on caregivers as they assume growing responsibilities that may include meeting physical needs, managing daily routines and making important medical and legal decisions. Caregivers are encouraged to seek Alzheimer's Support Group

Impact on Society

An estimated 4.5 million Americans have Alzheimer's. By 2030, when our entire baby boom generation is over 65, the number of Americans with Alzheimer's will soar to levels that may exceed society's ability to absorb the added cost to care for them.

Hope for the Future


Research has gained detailed understanding of basic disease processes at work in the Alzheimer's brain. Experts believe that several processes may offer promising targets for a new generation of treatments to prevent, slow or even reverse damaged to the nerve cells. A strategy to delay the onset of Alzheimer's by five years could halve the number of affected individual over the next fifty years.
