Praying in the Wilderness

a letter to the people of St. Michael's from the rector

Dear People of St. Michael's,

Music +Bells of St. Michael's Concert +Anticipate Christmas Eve Music at St. Michael's Mot many of us gravitate toward the wilderness or are even very familiar with it. We like our creature comforts, our technologies and buying our food at Trader Joe's rather than growing or slaughtering it for ourselves. You'd think, therefore, that we'd all look puzzled and disoriented in response to the Advent theme of wilderness.

> But many of us seem right at home in the Advent wilderness. We seem to understand that, although the literal wilderness may be mostly foreign to us, one can never completely escape or suburbanize the wilderness regions in our own hearts. We had this surprisingly common inner terrain in mind when planning a liturgy for this coming Wednesday, the 19th, at 7:00 p.m., We're calling it *Praying in the Wilderness*.

encircling the pine tree, the "Advent" Christmas tree, in the chapel is a continuation of the white streak running throughout the stained glass windows in the nave and represents the Holy Spirit as on the blue vestments? The red yarn coming from the descending dove at the top of the tree symvolizes the Grace of God. The larger ornaments reflect the Advent Gospels depicted in the first three windows - the Annunciation, the Visitation, and the Nativity.

The ornaments on the "Advent" tree each have a special meaning. The first figure is the angel Gabriel sent from God with the good news to Elizabeth and then to Mary. The second one is circle with a shell within it representing an expectant Elizabeth. Third is the Fleur-delis, symbol of Mary, depicted with a Chi-Rho, a Greek Symbol for Jesus, and the fourth item is the large shell of John the Baptist "preaching a baptism of the repentance for the forgiveness of sins."

Next is the manger with the Christ child on the first day of Christmas with the star that guided the Wisemen to that stable in Bethlehem. -Ruth Silver

+And two more thoughts on Father Kevin's prompt, "Advent is..."

From Kaky Bowles, the following excerpts from the meditations from a church's hundreth anniversary sermon:

" 'Advent' means 'coming' of course, and the promise of Advent is that what is coming is an unimaginable invasion....An invasion of *holiness*. That is what Advent is about. What is coming upon the world is the Light of the World. It is Christ. That is the comfort of it. The challenge of it. The challenge of it is that it has not come yet. Only the hope for it has come, only the longing for it. In the meantime we are in the dark, and the dark, God knows, is also in us. We watch and wait for a holiness to heal us and hallow us, to liberate us from the dark. Advent is like the hush in a theater just before the curtain rises. It is like the hazy ring aroung the winter moon that means the coming of snow which will turn the night silver. Soon. But for the time being, our time, darkness is where we are."

From our weekly Clergy Time with the Preschool Children of Little Angels.

This week, a class of three year olds and four year olds listened to the story of Mary's visit with her cousin Elizabeth after learning that she would be the Mother of the Son of God and that her cousin was also with child. They heard the words directly from the Bible how the child leaped in Elizabeth's womb when Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting. The children listened to Elizabeth's declaration of Mary as Mother of her Lord, and, finally, they were favored with the words of the Magnificat, or Mary's Song. We pondered with the children about the gift for which Elizabeth and Mary were waiting, the coming of Christ, the Light, and thought together how we, too, might prepare as we wait for the Light of Christ to born again in our hearts. 
