Toni Kania 3.26 Babbs Wastcoat 3.28 Ruth Kraus 3.30 Henry Bailey because of the sense of sincere devotion and because of the meditation on trees. The author, a Cistercian nun, spots some still-barren aspens through a window behind the altar. She sees them in a way that leads to a meditation on perseverance, which in turn reminds her of 'another tree' on which 'Christ died.' He persevered to the end.

Seeing in different ways, illustrated by the meditation on the trees in the poem, is apparently a regular discipline for Sister Sheryl Frances Chen. She's also written an essay titled '*What you see is NOT what you get*' that can be found in the current issue of an arguably obscure publication, the *Monastic Interreligious Dialogue*.

I don't need you to know anything about the *Monastic Interreligious Dioalogue* or about the development of ideas in Sr. Chen's essay. BUT I do hope you'll enter Holy Week with a sensitivity to things seen and unseen, the eternal and invisible that we seek and invoke amidst the often beautiful but fleeting outward forms and impressions.

I'm inclined to end with a question: When did you last see, appreciate or wonder about the unseen in that which is seen? But it occurs to me instead to end with a declaration: Please do NOT be unseen at St. Michael's!



in the church library to discuss The Lemon Tree by Sandy Tolan. This book, featured on NPR's program "Fresh Air," is subtitled, An Arab, a Jew, and the Heart of the Middle East. The book allows the reader to "see in human scale the tragic collision of the Israeli and Palestinian peoples" states Booklist's

starred review. The Lemon Tree does not reveal any magical answers to this very complex situation, but the book is well researched by Tolan, who has written extensively for newspapers and magazines, and has produced dozens of radio documentaries for NPR and PRI.



Little Red Wagon in February and March

About 20 years ago our church started collecting food for St. Cyuprian Food Pantry during Lent. It was an **Episcopal** mission on the northweat side of Chicago when in 1983 someone knocked on the door to ask for food. That simple begining of the food pantry has now mushroomed into one serving 855 families (3,825 individuals) in December alone and with a budget of \$56,000 a year. Over time, St. Michael's has included more food pantries in our donation

He was a 1993 Nieman Fellow at Harvard University and an I. F. Stone Fellow at the UC-Berkeley Graduate School of Journalism, where he directs the school's Project on International Reporting. In December 2011, Tolan spoke at the Episcopal Diocese Annual Convention in Los Angeles.



What would you do with \$15,000?

Quite simply Cathedral Shelter will use \$15,000 to pay our water bill. BUT we need your help!

In January of 2012, the Chicago City Council voted to remove the long standing exemption from water and sewer fees that non-profits and churches in Chicago had received. This measure was passed without much discussion in the hopes that it would raise revenue for the City. The Interfaith Coalition to Reinstate the Water Bill Exemption and I believe that the aldermen did not fully understand the impact that the imposition of fees would have on the availability of social services to the citizens of Chicago.

For Cathedral Shelter, this was an additional expense of nearly \$15,000 per year.

Monies that became unavailable for the over 3,000 homeless meals; 15,000 nights of housing; 10,000 case management contacts; 58,000 hours of addiction counseling; 1,300 hours of children's music therapy; 12,096 hours of life skills development; and 1,743 Christmas Baskets we provide each year.

Fortunately, the Interfaith Coalition to Restore the Water Fee Exemption for Religious Institutions has been working since last spring to restore the exemption. The member organizations provide a wide range of CAPS meeting sites, after school programs, food pantries, tutoring, sports programs, counseling, and youth programs that make life better for the citizens of Chicago, as well as save the public school system the cost of educating many thousands of students.

The amendment to the ordinance was sponsored by Aldermen Fioretti, Brookins, Burnette, and Sposato. It would reinstate the exemption for churches and non-profits with net assets or a fund balance of less than \$250 million. A copy of the amendment is attached. It is currently in committee with Alderman Carrie Austin.

We believe that if the aldermen understand the impact that the water bills will have on the social services available to City residents, they will choose to support the amendment. Please participate in the Interfaith Coalition's efforts to restore the exemption. Restoring the exemption will allow us to maintain services for vulnerable citizens.

Bottom line: The City budget should not be balanced at the expense of Chicago residents who are most in need of help. Here's how you can help now:

- Contact your alderman. Let him or her know that you are concerned about the impact of the removal of the exemption. Ask him or her to support the amendment to the ordinance and let the chair of the budget committee, Alderman Carrie Austin, know of their support so she will move it out of committee and present it for a vote.
- 2. Our votes are our power! Get others involved.
 - Tell your friends, relatives, vendors, colleagues, collaborators, and anyone else who lives in Chicago to call their alderman.
 - Share this e-mail with other non-profits and churches you may know in Chicago with net assets of less than \$250,000,000. The proposed amendment applies to all kinds of non-profits.
 - Ask them to report to the Coalition what's happening so they can carry it forward: chicagointerfaithcoalition@gmail.com
- Sign onto the petition to move the amendment our of committee that the Coalition has prepared: SIGN THE PETITION. Alderman Austin is more likely to move it out of committee if she feels she has the support from other aldermen that she needs to get it passed.
