Some Dos and Don'ts For Police Chaplains

DO's

- 1. Learn to tolerate teasing
- 2. Ride with the officers; visit roll call sites; get personally acquainted
- 3. Attend social functions; get to know minister, priest, or rabbi of officers
- 4. Develop basic knowledge of officers' work responsibilities
- 5. Learn the lingo; ten codes, 10-4, 10-8, 10-25, etc.
- 6. Know the organizational structure of the department
- 7. Recognize the ranks of authority and use them, especially in public settings
- 8. Congratulate personnel on weddings, anniversaries, promotions, etc.
- 9. Volunteer to assist
- 10. Listen to the radio
- 11. Go in on calls but be careful about interfering
- 12. Be loyal to officers and supervisors by serving as a bridge between them
- 13. Respect the officers' religious views or lack of them
- 14. EARN their personal respect and confidence
- 15. Be contagiously honest
- 16. Empathize more than sympathize with person look at options
- 17. Be positive and optimistic
- 18. Be a good stroker (always be courteous)
- 19. Become acquainted with referral agencies in community and county
- 20. MAINTAIN CONFIDENTIALITY
- 21. Remember: Your life will reveal what you profess
- 22. Be a good listener
- 23. Be a team member; be trusting; be a play-maker; keep informed
- 24. Be clean and neat in appearance and attitude; you are the Police Pastor

DON'Ts

- 1. Do not get involved in inter-departmental politics
- 2. Do not over identify with the situation; remain objective
- 3. Do not interfere with management operations (policy, transfers, etc.)
- 4. Do not confuse the role of the Chaplain with that of an officer
- 5. Do not throw your weight around; status must be earned
- 6. Do not appear to have all the answers
