Don't Just Sit There, Do Something

Imagine that your life is at stake. Not from some perilous threat or activity, but from something you likely think is perfectly normal, even safe. It's so common to all of us that you may be doing it as you read this. What is it? Sitting! "Sitting Disease," as it is now called isn't an actual disease, but a term now used to describe more than 30 chronic health conditions associated with our increasingly sedentary life styles. In fact sitting has been labeled "the new smoking" in terms of its overall negative impact on bodily health.

Now, you may think I've got a screw loose, but I'm quoting Mayo Clinic research. Here are just a few statistics from a recent article: 50-70% of us spend six or more hours a day in a sitting position. That's in part due to shifts in the jobs we do in our economy (less farming/factory work, more desk work). We also drive more and walk less. In addition, 20-35% of us spend more than 4 hours a day sitting in front of the television, which near as I can tell does not include social media, internet based gaming, etc., which some do simultaneously while watching TV. Then add 6-8 hours of sleep! It may not be sitting, but it's not up and moving either. (And if you're not getting 6-8 hours of sleep, that's not good for your health either.)

Mayo Clinic and other research institutions have now made direct connections between our increasingly sedentary lifestyles and a rising list of chronic health issues, as well as a now shortening life-span. So don't just sit there. Go for a walk. Ride a bike. Go for a swim. Play tennis, badminton, or golf (without the cart!). Wrestle in the green grass with your children or grand-children. Whatever you choose to do, get moving for the sake of the rest of your life.

I can see little thought bubbles over some heads asking "What has any of this to do with my church, faith, or devotional life?" Well, as Methodists, probably more than you may think. John Wesley was big into healthy living. He even wrote a book titled "Primitive Physick." By today's standards it is rather primitive. His suggested lists of treatment options for various ailments often ended with, "and if none of these work, try a cold bath." Not tepid mind you, but COLD. We must give Wesley a break, of course. Given he published in 1747 he hardly had access to the knowledge modern medicine has given us. Yet, those very early seeds of concern for our physical health are why we find hospitals started by Methodists dotting our nation, including Bronson Hospital in Kalamazoo.

But here's the deeper "rub," and how it applies to our church. "Sitting Disease" can also shorten the life span of a congregation. Significantly. Again, it's not a real "disease," but it is a term we could fairly use to describe a host of conditions that negatively impact the health of a church: inactive members, low volunteerism, few participants involved in small groups, infrequent fellowship opportunities, an inward focus, a lack of hospitality, little to no outreach or witness, etc. It's well documented that just like humans, churches have a life cycle. Those that don't get up, outside the walls, and keep faith moving decline and eventually die.

This year is Stevensville UMC's 150th year of ministry in the community. Thanks be to God for the great cloud of witnesses who got us here. We've had a good, long life. And I am not suggesting that it might be coming to an end. But it could if we allow ourselves to just sit on that legacy, living a sedentary spirituality rather than a living, moving faith. The Risen Christ calls us to rise up and follow Him outside the walls and property lines to offer hope and healing to the community around us. Not only will it extend our life as a congregation, and as individuals, it may just make us all better disciples, which is not just who we are called to be, but what we are called to do.

So where might Jesus be calling you to get moving on His behalf? What gifts has God given you that only you can share? Don't sit on them, put them to work for Him. And if you need help? Just ask.

One Hundred Fifty Years
of Stevensville United Methodist Church
(continued)

At the turn of the century, (1900), Stevensville, Hollywood, and Bridgman churches were on the same charge. The parsonage was deemed inadequate and sold in 1901. This money plus other contributions was used to erect the parsonage on St. Joseph Avenue. Victor Howard and his brother Lute Howard were the builders. Rev. S. F. McGuire was the minister.

During the next ten years, the church was served by 7 Ministers—L. H. Manning, R. W. Paul, S. F. McGuire, Seymour Williams, W. L. Jones, F. M. Cosner and R. E. Showerman. In 1908, Herbert J. Root was appointed as student pastor. One of his pleasant recollections was the annual journey to Crystal Spring Camp Meeting, where old fashioned gospel preaching drew great crowds.

In the fall of 1911 Rev. Floyd Blewfield was appointed pastor. He remained a year, later going to Peace Temple in Benton Harbor which he built. From 1912 to 1916, there were four different ministers, (George Wilson, F. A. Van De Walker, A. M. Oviatt, and T. Avery.) Rev. L. D. Miles was appointed in 1916 and stayed for six years.

Winter attendance for the church had been low due to no place to protect horses from the elements, so in 1917 a shed was constructed at the back of the church property and winter attendance increased. At that time, revival services strengthened the church and the church school outgrew the one room church. In 1918, the annex and basement were completed on the old church. The revivals continued and Sunday School attendance was well over 100 and remained throughout Rev. Miles stay.

Rev. Wilfred Eley was appointed in 1923 and served for four years. Rev. R. A. Dawson came in 1927 and Arthur Delamarter in 1928.

There were no local restaurants at this time, so the Ladies Aid Society (now United Methodist Women) served dinners and suppers on election days. This was not only done as public service but also as a money making project. Around this time Winifred Howard and Mrs. Adam Reimer were pianists. Rev. A. C. Parson was appointed in 1929 and served for three years.
