To Everything, Turn... Part II "Advent Happens"

See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland. - Isaiah 43:19

If you go to Merriam-Webster online you will "Advent" means: "the period beginning four Sundays before Christmas," "the coming of Christ at the incarnation," or the "Second Coming." After those definitions, you will find that "advent" also means "a coming into being or use," as in "the advent of the use of visual media" in worship. So, uncapitalized advent is used in a historic sense. The interesting thing about the season of Advent is that we are invited to look both forward and backward in time. We look forward to Christmas and celebrating Jesus' birth, while also remembering the Nativity in Bethlehem 2,000 years ago. At the same time we are also looking and longing for his promised return in glory and the advent of the Kingdom of God.

In looking back through the history of the church it is hard to not see patterns of change. God tries to set us on the path to holiness, we fail. So God tries something new. When it became clear the law and punishment model wasn't working, God sent Jesus to initiate the advent of love, grace, forgiveness, and mercy. Trace the spread of Christianity across the earth and you find that in nearly every new place, the core message of the gospel remained the same, but how it was practiced was often modified to fit the culture. Even in our own Wesleyan history, there have been difference in worship, music, even polity among parts of the body. As we've recalled this year, in over 150 years this church has gone through much change. Location, size, pastors, staff, lay leaders and programs have come and gone. 40 years ago, who would have imagined screens on either side of the cross? It was likely a bit controversial when it happened, with some not wanting it. Now we seem to be both accustomed to and comfortable with them.

Knowing we are always called not just to care for ourselves, but reach new people for Christ, over the past few months two studies have been taking place. Ad. Council has been studying our Mission and Vision statements which should drive decisions we make about how to be the church God calls us to be in this time. While that work has been going on the Worship Team was also studying what people in the community around us are seeking in church and worship specifically. In both cases, much time has been given to study, prayer, and listening for the Spirit of God. It has been a time of "*un-knowing*," a letting go of what we think we know about the community. Knowing the community is always change, we've taken on the mind of "students," seeking to learn about the community as it is today.

Using MissionInsite, (a church demographic database) we learned what lifestyle groups live in the neighborhoods around us. From 19 distinct lifestyle groups, each with it's own sub-groups, we found the five largest make up nearly 50% of the people around us. With that information we looked at the work of Tom Bandy, who has written about church growth for decades. His recent work has focused on the styles of worship people in these various groups are typically seeking. Based on those learnings, we made changes to worship, as you have certainly noticed. We hope you'll see that these changes have not been made for the sake of change, but for the sake of reaching new people.

The 8:30 service was made a bit more formal/traditional, adding back elements many of us over 50 remmber. We sing the Gloria Patri after scripture is read, take a formal offering rather than do it as part of Communion. Those are things that would be familiar to Baby Boomers who may have grown up in the church but drifted away. As they now retire, many are seeking meaning by looking at the spiritual aspect of life, and seeking faith communities. The 11:00 service is a bit more casual/contemporary, with changes to the bulletin, and exchanging the rushed greeting one of another at the beginning of worship for a hospitality table just outside the sanctuary that encourages conversation and the building of relationships before and after worship.

Whether these and other changes that have been made have been experienced as minor or major is in the eye of the beholder. For some they may feel minor, while for others they feel significant. Knowing this will always be the case, we not only understood it would be important not to do too much, too fast, but that we had to keep listening to the Spirit and the membership while constantly reevaluating what we are doing.

In any healthy church, there is always going to be some tension between doing things in familiar ways that have satisfied current members, and doing things in ways we hope attract new people to Christ. Knowing we are not here for our own sake, we need to adapt in ways that will help us welcome new sisters and brothers in faith find so that they too may the Advent of Christ in their own hearts and lives. This is one of our gifts to Christ and the world for which he came and still comes. So, Happy Advent! May Jesus Christ warm your hearts in this season of hope, joy, love, and peace.

TUESDAY DECEMBER 21, 7:00pm in the Sanctuary

Rev. B. Gordon Barry 2004 to 2015

Rev. B. Gordon Barry came as our new pastor in 2004 and retired in 2015. It was through his vision of the functionality of the church that the Sanctuary was renovated. It was transformed from a limited access to a user friendly facility. Gordie's vision included talking to the congregation and about the people in the congregation: who they are, their purpose and how we gather for worship.

Pastor Gordie understood that we needed to maintain, improve and develop the gift that previous generations gave to us for the next generations. He understood that worship had changed since 1963 when the sanctuary was built. There is more emphasis

on the congregation being an active part of worship rather than a passive observer. A plan was created and at the annual conference in 2009 a vote was passed to begin the renovation. Renovation began in August 2010. The renovated sanctuary was re-consecrated and the new sacred furniture was consecrated at the March 27, 2011 service. Because of the vision of the people of the Stevensville United Methodist Church over the past 150 years, our church has grown and continues to proved a place in the j Community where all people are welcome.

Rev. David F. Hills 2015 to Current

Rev. David F. Hills came in 2015 and is our current pastor today. David values that this year is Stevensville UMC's 150th year of ministry in the community. It is quite a legacy. But he also recognizes the community around us has changed and there is a need to establish a new way to reach this changed community. Yes, we will continue being and making disciples, but our path may look different than 150 years ago.

In the early 21st century most churches across America were seeing a decline in attendance. Neighborhoods had become 40 percent more diverse then they were just 10 years ago and churches could no longer offer a one size fits all approach to worship.

David's vision was to gain insight into the behaviors, attitudes and preferences of the households with-in approximately a 7 mile radius of SUMC so we could better understand our community, neighborhood and their worship preferences. Using demographic data provided by MissionInsite, it became clear that if we were going to bless those closest to us with God's grace, we needed to offer two distinct worship choices to the lifestyle segments with-in our community. Currently, we are providing two intentionally different worship service options: Caregiving/Educational and an Inspirational/Educational to reach the new emerging generations in our community. This will take adjustment on the church's part. As David quotes, *"We must listen, pray,*

and discern what God is calling us to do and be in ministry, not for ourselves, but for others in this generation and the next.
