A Message from our District Executive

Isaiah 40:27-31 records these words as in the Message version -

Why would you ever complain, O Jacob, or, whine, Israel, saying, "God has lost track of me. He doesn't care what happens to me"? Don't you know anything? Haven't you been listening? God doesn't come and go. God lasts. He's Creator of all you can see or imagine. He doesn't get tired out, doesn't pause to catch his breath. And he knows everything, inside and out. He energizes those who get tired, gives fresh strength to dropouts. For even young people tire and drop out, young folk in their prime stumble and fall. But those who wait upon God get fresh strength. They spread their wings and soar like eagles, They run and don't get tired, they walk and don't lag behind.

It was in early March that the first of the orders regarding public gatherings was issued, one of the first being no visitors to nursing homes and another being to limit public gatherings to 100, which was soon reduced in numbers. Although some lifting of restrictions may be forthcoming, we are still running this marathon of adjusting how we meet and care for one another. But take heart that God does still care for us, God is listening. If we turn our waiting to a listening to God, our strength will be renewed for the marathon yet to come. Keep walking, keep running, keep using One Call and individual phone calls, keep using Zoom or other means of group meetings, keep streaming or uploading worship services as God renews our strength, our creativity, our love. We can witness to the communities around us to the power of the presence of God in our lives.

<u>Cloth Masks</u> - Thank you to all the sewers who are making cloth masks. BDMers have given 535 masks to the Brethren Retirement Community (BRC), 350 to the Preble County Health Department and businesses, 150 to Fairborn Senior Services, and 320 to various care centers. All of these are very much appreciated. Additional cloth masks are needed for BRC, and we have received a request from BDM for masks for the rebuilding sites. Please keep sewing! BDM Site in Dayton – The current timeline schedules a rebuilding site for tornado recovery to be set up in July in Dayton. Not knowing how open or closed things will be, BDM is developing a new model for the initial phase of this project. Due to the uncertainty of travel between states and Montgomery County Health Department housing/meal regulations, BDM is counting on local volunteers to be the workers during the initial phase. There will not be any overnight lodging or meals provided during July. The plan is for rebuilding to begin on a smaller scale than usual, with a smaller crew. Details are being worked out for registering volunteers. When deemed appropriate by BDM leadership, the shift will be made to the groups of volunteers that are on the 2020 schedule. At that point, volunteer housing will be at Memorial Presbyterian Church, 1541 S. Smithville Rd., Dayton. We appreciate your patience and support as BDM works to develop a new model for safely serving disaster survivors.

Youth Trip to the Brethren Service Center – New this summer is the June 14-18 youth trip to the Brethren Service Center in New Windsor, MD. This includes two travel days and three days for processing school kits and hygiene kits for Church World Service. Youth must be at least 14 years old to participate.
