Haiti Mission Trip

The Haiti Mission Team arrived back in the US in time for the Thanksgiving Holiday after a wonderful six day visit to Zamar Ministries in Croix des Bouquets, Haiti. The team carried with them six full suitcases of over the counter medications, donated by the ELUMC congregation, plus eighty pairs of children's new shoes and sixty new backpacks.

Annie Doraisingh led two clinics and one educational class on dealing with high blood pressure. She was assisted by 'Nurses' Sally Hood and Trevor Charlton. The medications from ELUMC were heavily utilized and greatly appreciated by the people of Zamar. Approximately sixty men, women and children were seen at the two clinics.

The team also took on a construction project, demolishing and rebuilding the collapsed south perimeter security wall. Two generator sets were also repaired and put back in to service. Additionally, time was spent purchasing materials and preparing for Melbourne First United Methodist Church, under the leadership of Pastor Dionne, with whom ELUMC overlapped for twenty-four hours, to carry out some painting and construction extension work on the main building in Croix des Bouquets.

The team worshipped with our brothers and sisters in Zamar in both Croix des

Bouquets and Mirabalais. We shared many hours of fellowship and strengthened our relationships with the people of Zamar. We thank God for being blessed with the opportunity to be part of his work in Haiti and for safe travels.

Holiday Blues/Stress



One day Jesus told his disciples a story to show that they should always pray and never give up. Luke 18: 1

Are you overbooked for this month? Do you look at your schedule and start to panic? How can you possibly do everything? There are meetings, birthdays, gifts, decorating, parties and too many other things, not including work, family and church.

It's time to trim your list instead of the tree. Consider fewer gifts, fewer decorations and not so many parties. Find quiet time to spend with devotional materials and in prayer. The only way to get to the heart of Christmas is with Jesus. All of the others things are fine, but they aren't necessary.

Practice some stress busting techniques. Here are some ideas:

LEAVE. If the noise level is too much or the crowds are closing in, just leave. You don't have to stay in the toy store with all the screaming youngsters, and you don't have to converse with the know-it-all at the party. You can walk away.

CLOSE THE EYES. Take a break from the lights and activities. Closing the eyes is a great way to get recentered.

TRY SOME SOLITUDE. In the middle of so much activity it helps to have time alone. Use the quiet time to set priorities, to pray, and to count your blessings.

GO OUTSIDE. Fresh air and sunshine can make a difference in how you feel. Being in God's creation and going for a walk can help find extra energy.

LOCATE SOME WATER. Listen to it, watch it, drink it or sit in it. Water refreshes in so many ways. He knows what we need; maybe that is why God put so much water on earth.

BREATHE. Remember to exhale occasionally. When the shoulders are up to the ears, it's time to take deep breaths. Fill the lungs completely from the bottom to the top. Pause for a couple of seconds. Exhale letting all of the air out of the lungs from the top to bottom. Repeat three to four times. Your shoulders have relaxed with the rest of the body. Stress causes shallow breathing. Deep breathing releases it.

LISTEN TO MUSIC. Choose whatever type makes you happy. Sing along. It's amazing how good this can make us feel.

It is our hope that the income gap will close and we will be able to pay the full apportionment.

The excitement within the Children's Ministry here at East Lake UMC continues to build. The Design Team has begun to develop a plan to enhance and grow this important ministry. The team (Pat Peterson, Gena Peterson, Julius David, Sue Bailey, and Erin Lowe) meet monthly to ensure on-going support for our Children's Director and the ministry.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY DESIGN TEAM

- Curriculum —Last month we reported that the new children's worship curriculum had been launched. The children and families are enjoying the new curriculum. To ensure that all teachers are comfortable with the new web-based curriculum, Pat Peterson and Erin Lowe offered additional training for the teachers.
- Communication—The "God Time" cards for the K-5 children's curriculum, 252 Basics, now provide resources to help the children to grow their faith all throughout the week. Parent Cues are being shared with parents to support spiritual conversation between parents and their children, based on the lessons being studied in children's worship from Pre School-5th grade. The Children's Ministry is now on Facebook!
- Safety Checkup—The Children's Ministry is taking a fresh look at the check-in and checkout procedures, reminding parents of the importance of complete records and the need for security. All registration cards are being reviewed to make certain that the information is correct and up-to-date.
- Planning—A master list of needs for programming for the next year is being developed so that we identify resource needs and are able to recruit the volunteers needed to maximize the potential of each activity within the children's ministry for the next year.
- Prayer—The East Lake UMC Prayer Team continues to undergird the Children's Ministry and the Design Team through prayer. Please pray with us.

IMPRINT Retreat

November 9 -11, several members of our youth group attended the fall retreat Imprint 2012 at Warren W. Willis Camp. This weekend focused on global health issues. Here are some testimonies from participants: including: water, hunger, and healthcare.

Paper Lanterns of Hope

Very soon the Youth will be remodeling the Youth Room. And two of the items you will find hanging in their newly decorated space will be paper lanterns. I can't encourage you enough to take the time to look at these lanterns.

On November 9 through 11, many of our Youth attended IMPRINT at Warren Willis. I know most of us think of these retreats as an opportunity for our Youth to celebrate their love of God through praise and worship. But, don't think that way about IMPRINT. The purpose of IM-PRINT is to make our Youth and chaperones, like me, aware of various social issues. The focus this year was on health.

This is an eve opening experience. We saw videos and heard presentations describing the hardships of African tribal people who suffer from starvation, lack of clean water and disease.

We also learned how we can make a difference. I will admit, perhaps because IMPRINT took place so soon after the election, to being concerned this would be very political. It wasn't. Instead, it focused on the difference we can make whether as individuals or as a Church. After all, the role of the Church through the centuries of its existence is to provide help to those in need.

We heard from a Pastor whose Church funded a well in an African village. By building this well, women and children no longer had to walk several miles multiple times a day to get water. As a result, more children were able to attend school. The villagers suffered fewer illnesses because they had water free from bacteria and germs. A small irrigation system was built allowing the villagers to grow crops for food. Just this one well transformed an entire village. The pictures and videos we saw showed village children with smiles resembling those of our children opening a Christmas present.

We learned that many villagers die from diseases and illness preventable and curable. One of those diseases is Malaria. Several of our Youth have already begun a fund raising campaign to purchase mosquito nets. These nets will save lives. We saw how several foundations raise money to provide inoculations and medications. More lives will be saved.

After learning about how hunger, health and disease impact our world, including our very own community, our Youth were challenged to imagine a more perfect world. The paper lanterns depict their vision for that more perfect world. Take a look and see for yourself. Their vision does not lack hope. With that I am satisfied our Youth, with eyes wide open, will be poised to make a difference. A difference bringing hope to all they encounter, which, no doubt, leads to a more perfect world.

Hope for Africa, IMPRINT 2012

All activities we did at the retreat were meant to open our eyes to concerns we normally turn away from. For example we did a water walk, where we walked over a mile retrieving water from a lake and bringing it back in jugs. It was

actually pretty difficult, and to think that people in Africa walk three times the distance 3-4 times a day is heart-wrenching. We also participated in a food banquet to emphasize the amount of people in the world who live on less than \$2.00 a day and have very little to eat, 15% of campers (the upper-class) had a buffet for lunch and could get seconds, 35% of campers (middle-class) had rice, beans and tortillas for lunch, the last 50% of campers had nothing but water and a bowl of rice to eat, representing those making less than \$2.00 a day. It left an incredible impact and emphasized the amount of people who go to bed hungry each night.

At worship, the pastor really stressed the importance of not just feeling sad about all these global difficulties, but going home and actually doing something about it. We, Jimmy Hickman and Nicole Platti, are taking that initiative. The focus of our fundraiser is healthcare, specifically malaria. We are trying to raise \$1000 dollars to purchase 100 malaria-prevention nets and directly



save 100 lives. In what we call Hope for Africa, all donations will go to the organization Nothing But Nets which buys, transfers, and distributes bed nets all around the world to families in need. Our goal is to raise the money by New Years' Day, and any donation is well appreciated. With every \$10 donated, a live is saved and when a child dies in Africa every sixty seconds from malaria, how could we not reach out and help?

Count to five. One...Two...Three...Four...Five. In those five short seconds, a child in Africa died of starvation. In America, one in every six children is hungry. Women and children in Africa have to walk at least four miles a day at least three times a day to get water for their family, which they use to drink, clean clothes, bathe, and cook. This water is unclean, and usually filled with disease. This makes it lethal because most people in Africa have HIV/AIDS which weakens their immune system. Thus, they can't fight off the disease they are drinking in the water. Drinking water is literally killing them. Malaria kills over 3,000 children everyday.

A family in Africa lives on less than \$2.50 a day. That is probably as much as your cup of coffee costs that you get at Starbucks every morning. All these things are what our youth group learned at the Imprint retreat at Warren W. Willis Camp. We also learned how we can help to prevent these statistics. We can donate food to organizations that help feed children in Africa. We could volunteer at a soup kitchen to help feed the homeless in America. We could raise money to help pay for a well in Africa, giving clean water to a village. We could donate \$10 to buy a mosquito net for children. This covers a bed, so you would be saving a person's life from malaria. You could use the money you by coffee with to help pay for any of these things.

On the retreat, we had an unusual lunch. Everybody was given a letter, A, B, or C. Anybody with A was the upper class of 15% of the people. They had a buffet, water, sweet tea, and cookies for dessert. People with a B were the middle class making up 35% of the population. They had rice, beans, and a tortilla shell. And the last 50%, the C's only had rice and water. They also had to eat on the floor. Think of this the next time you are eating a great lunch or dinner. Think of the other 85%. Our pastor was walking around checking out all three groups, asking how they were doing. After lunch, he told us what he had learned from this walkthrough. He told us that the C group was in fact the most generous. One of our own youth, Josh Cilmi, offered him some rice. Nobody else offered him food. After learning all of this, I know I can help, I know I can make a difference, and so can you.
