

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A Word from Pastor Eric

Ankeny Presbyterian Church is moving forward with plans to repair and improve our facility so that it may function as a safe and appealing



You might recall that Robert Ridgway from the Design Alliance architecture firm joined us in January for a prioritization exercise regarding possible improvements to our building and grounds. Each of our members had a chance to fill out a survey prior to the meeting to share their ideas, and when we met on January 14, all members were invited to help rank those ideas. It was a fun time for dreaming about the future of our ministry! The Session is very grateful for your help in this process.

Thanks to a six-month strategic planning process by the Session, and your input this January, our Facility Improvement Task Force was well equipped to work with the architecture firm in developing a project list that will both enhance and extend APC's mission of *Sharing God's Love through Compassion and Service in our Neighborhood and Beyond*.

In consultation with our Facility Improvement Task Force (Del Konopka, Al Overbaugh, Lee White), the architect from Design Alliance prepared a Scope of Work document which identified the projects to be completed. At its February meeting, the Session approved the Scope of Work document, which will serve as the basis for our construction/renovation projects once they begin this summer. The Session previously approved the hiring of both a fundraising consultant and the architecture firm.

A Capital Campaign Task Force has been commissioned by the Session to conduct the fundraising campaign. The original leadership group of the Task Force consisted of Steve SchraderBachar, Rich Flaugh, Audrey Kobus, and Chris Wehrman, but it has now expanded to include thirteen church members. This group is operating in consultation with a professional church fundraiser from Church Campaign Services, who has laid out a plan by which our goal will be attainable over a three-year pledge period. The Task Force is hard at work identifying the various aspects of the campaign, developing a timeline, and

In particular, keep your eyes open for our official Capital Campaign fundraising goal, which will be set by the Session and announced by the middle of March.

The facility improvement/capital campaign process is more than just a chance to catch up on deferred maintenance items; it is an opportunity to prepare APC for a dynamic future of ministry in our community. I hope you are as excited about this as I am, and that you will join me in supporting the campaign and facility improvement work as they take place.

Protect Yourself from Colorectal Cancer


Many of us are unaware that colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer in the U.S. and the second leading cause of

cancer deaths. It usually affects those 50 and older.

Although there often aren't any signs or symptoms of the disease in its early stages, the

good news is that routine screenings may save your life. If everyone 50 and older were screened regularly, 6 out of 10 deaths from colorectal cancer

could be prevented. March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month. If vou're 50 or older and haven't been screened for colorectal cancer (a colonoscopy is considered the most reliable test and any



polyps found can be removed during aren't sure when tested again, be sure to check with vour health care provider.

One way to help prevent colorectal cancer, as with other cancers, heart disease and diabetes, is by eating healthfully and exercising.

Did you know...

 Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood.

- Approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S.
- Nearly 21 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.

• The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 pints.

 The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O.

 A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 pints of blood.

DMARC is excited to announce that loyal contributor Doug Woods has doubled his annual "Challenge Hunger" match from \$10,000 to \$20,000!

For retired West Des Moines police officer Doug Woods, the convergence of "The Grapes of Wrath," a primitive southern Iowa home, and a Bible verse led to his self-described "spiritual awakening"-and, soon after, the launch of the first Douglas M. Woods Hunger Challenge to benefit the DMARC Food Pantry Network. With the recognition that cash could help DMARC buy more food than he could buy at retail price and donate, Doug began to make monetary donations. But, he felt called to something bigger-to do something more.

The rest is both history and a future in the making, as DMARC announces the sixth year of the Douglas M. Woods Challenge Hunger Campaign. Thank you, Doug! From March 1 through April 30, 2018, donations to DMARC will be matched dollar for dollar, up to a total of \$20,000 given. Your \$10 becomes \$20, \$50 equals \$100, and so on.
