Sermon Notes Sunday, November 22, 2020 God's Unfolding Story

Deliverance (Part 1)

Exodus 1:6-12:36

After nearly four hundred years of growth in Egypt, Israel is now ready to leave behind the chains of slavery and seek a new homeland. The book of Exodus is the book of redemption as it narrates the liberation of Israel from Egyptian captivity and presents basic historical facts about the origins of the Hebrew nation. Even as God gave Israel the Law, in the Ten Commandments, God told them that His intention was that they might worship Him and be reminded of the fact that He is indeed the Lord God, who brought them out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery (Exodus 20:2). The book holds out God's Law and sets a framework for how God's people are to interact with Him and with others. It also provides a portrait of Christ, the spotless Lamb of God, as the Apostle Paul states, who would set us free from slavery into the freedom of the glory of the children of God (Romans 8:21).
