Brothers and Sisters in Jesus,

Our daily routine begins with examining our appearance. Before the mirror as we shave, brush our teeth, or comb our hair. Some of us go to great lengths to be sure that our hair "looks just right" and that our cosmetics are just the right shade and within the bounds we set for them. Periodically, we also visit our doctor for an examination, and at time, they discover something that has escaped our notice. Sometime the finds are minor and easily remedied, at other times serious or life-threatening. At times, self-exams can head off a more serious condition.

Lent begins Ash Wednesday, February 10. It's a period of 40 days (except Sundays) leading to the celebration of our Lord Jesus' passion, death and Resurrection. During Lent we examine our spiritual/soul's life. We ordinarily give so little attention to our interior life that a period of forty days of self-examination can seem overwhelming. Some reasons we avoid Lenten discipline may be: we don't have a spiritual life beyond Sunday worship; or we live distracted and superficial lives; or we make excuses for our laziness and seek to justify our behavior; or we may play the victim, never accepting responsibility for the condition of our soul, or considering how to deepen our relationship with the Lord Jesus and others. At the heart of our souls' health is our moment by moment relationship with Jesus.

This Lenten examination helps reassure us of the Lord's transforming and unconditional love. St Paul in 2 Cor. 13.8 explains the basis for self-examination: "Do you not realize that Christ Jesus is in you – unless of course you fail the test?" During Lent we note how He has transformed us up to now. We honesty appraise areas where we are resisting His transforming love in the present. We ascertain what we placed between the Lord and ourselves. We allow Him to direct and guide this process so that we don't engage in guilty 'naval gazing' but intentionally seek the Holy Spirit's power as we surrender more of ourselves to the Lord. Jesus love for us is the basis for spiritual growth. Others need to come to know His love through us. Purchase a notebook. Commit your thoughts and prayers to writing. Fast from food, TV, digital devices and invest that time instead to growing in your knowledge and love of the Lord Jesus. Share what you have with the needy around you as a token of your willingness to spend and be spent in the Lord's service.

There will be 'helps' available in the narthex of the church for daily study, meditation and prayer. I pray each of us will seriously examine our lives to see where they reflect the life and love of Jesus, and where they do not, to repent, ask the Lord's forgiveness and the presence, grace and power of the Holy Spirit as He informs us, transforms us, and conforms us to the image of Jesus.

LENT

Lent is Forty Days, excluding Sundays, from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday, when Jesus' followers seek to deepen their relationship and commitment to the Lord through practicing the disciples of serious self-examination, fasting, times of prayer and Bible study, spiritual reading and almsgiving.

FASTING AND ABSTAINING DURING LENT

The Biblical practices of fasting and abstinence are used to make us more aware of the Lord's presence and discipline our fleshly cravings and lusts. Traditionally, we fast as we are able on the week days of Lent. This may be reducing portions or eliminating a meal or two. One common practice is to fast until supper each day. In place of taking meals, we read and study Scripture, pray for ourselves and others. Abstinence is refraining from a particular food or beverage for a period of time. Traditionally, Fridays, commemorating the Lord's death, have been days when we abstain from meat. The price of the meat not eaten would then be donated to the poor. These practices of self-denial can help us realize how dependent and self-absorbed we are. Ask the Holy Spirit what special discipline you should embrace as you participate in this period of self-examination and repentance.

SHROVE TUESDAY

The practice of special observances to mark the day before the Lenten fast begins are numerous through Church history. The Tuesday before Ash Wednesday was the day when all the dietary fats were consumed or removed from homes. Mardi Gras, or Fat Tuesday, derives from this ancient practice. Shrove Tuesday in the English equivalent of Mardi Gras. Traditionally we have a pancake and sausage supper at the parish hall. It is prepared and served by the Vestry, and all are welcome to participate. Shrove is derived from the word shrive, which means to seek forgiveness. Come for supper and bring a friend, February 10 from 6:00-7:00 PM in the Parish Hall.

ASH WEDNESDAY

The Holy Eucharist will be celebrated at 6:30 PM on Ash Wednesday, February 10. Ashes will be imposed on the foreheads of those who desire during the service. The ashes are made from the palms of the previous Palm Sunday celebration which have been dried, burned and pulverized. The Anglican adage applies to the imposition of ashes: All may, none must, some should!

MORNING PRAYER

Monday through Friday during Lent, Morning Prayer will be celebrated in the chapel at 8:00 AM. If you are willing to lead Morning Prayer, please contact Father Stan. The service is about thirty minutes in length. Start your day with us praying Morning Prayer with the Church across the world. We will use the TEXTS FOR COMMON PRAYER.

PRAYING THROUGH THE NAMES OF GOD

One Sunday my friend Anne asked an interesting question. Piqued by the morning's sermon on self sacrifice and service to others, she asked, "What do you think of personal giving, sacrifice, and when does one say yes or no in the spirit of Christ? What are our limits?"

This simple yet broad question with few particulars sparked a variety of responses as Anne posed this question to several gathered for coffee in the Narthex. One thoughtful response was, "You cannot give if the well is dry." Another profound statement was, "Follow the Holy Spirit and He will guide us through the situation." And a third: "What does Scripture say? We should follow Scripture."

Three diverse responses, and all are valid. Then Anne remembered the biblical story of Jesus with Martha and Mary (Luke 10:38-42).

"Are we, as women, to act as Martha or as Mary?" she asked many. Lively discussion followed, with no consensus. Our attentions were drawn away and, as many good discussions go, it ended without conclusion. So now, in retrospect, we reflect: Are we as women to be Martha or Mary?

Martha was the dutiful hostess, bound by her responsibilities to provide hospitality and food for Jesus and his disciples. Feeling the heavy role as provider, Martha expressed righteous indignation at Mary's not helping her. Mary was the curious women, sitting enraptured at the Lord's feet, entranced by His every word. "Scold her," Martha said. "Mary made the right choice," Jesus replied, "and I cannot take that away from her."


In our generation are we women to be Martha or Mary, servant or student? I wondered this myself the very next day when my husband needed help unpacking from a camping trip but would not ask me for it. I had a free hour, and intended to spent it in devotional study. I still had incomplete homework for our ladies' bible study. I longed to sit down with my bible. But, I know my husband was weary yet determined to finish a tedious, time consuming job. The Holy Spirit led me to leave the house, comfy chair and bible behind, and offer my assistance.

"Thank you," he said, "I appreciated your help and moral support."

Perhaps the discussion of how to serve, when to sacrifice, and what to study will continue next Sunday at church. In the meantime, do we become servant or student, Martha or Mary? The answer is clear to me. We are both Martha and Mary. Here is my prayer:

Lord God, guide me to serve You boldly and study earnestly. Give me discernment to know Your will for me each moment. Open my eyes to see and understand Your plan for my life, how I might glorify You in both service and study with a loving heart. Give me a bunger for Your Word and a desire to put others before myself. Father, I thank Your for loving me first. Jesus, thank You for every opportunity You give me to express Your love to others. Holy Spirit, inspire me with hope and courage. In Christ alone, amen.


