The Rev. Dr. Kenneth Bailey, Anglican theologian and Bible teacher, grew up in a missionary family in the middle east. He is a New Testament scholar and expert on the culture of the Palestinian and Jewish people inhabiting the Holy Land. Dr. Bailey suggests that our traditional understanding of the Christmas story may be inaccurate. From the translation in Luke's Gospel, we learn that Joseph and Mary were unable to find shelter in Bethlehem's "inn," and given accommodations in the inn-keeper's stable. The Greek word translated as "inn" appears in only one other place in Scripture. Luke 22:11 tells us that the disciples met in the "quest chamber" or an upper room where they prepared and ate the Lord's last Passover with them. The word in Greek is "quest room," and comes from the root to un-harness. A room where you un-harness your donkev.

If Dr. Bailey is correct, based on the fact that Bethlehem was too small to support an inn, and close enough to Jerusalem that accommodations could be found there, then the "quest room" wasn't out back, or a stable. It was inside the home of one of Bethlehem's residents. Jewish homes had two rooms with perhaps a court yard. One room was where the family and quests slept, and the other room was where food was prepared and at night domestic animals were lodged for security. We see this in the story Jesus tells in Luke 11:5-8. A home owner is approached by a neighbor in the middle of the night looking for a loaf of bread to feed an unexpected quest. The owner says "the door is now shut (for security purposes) and my children are with me in bed, I can't get up to give you anything."The scene for those listening to Jesus would elicit laughter and delight as they could imagine the ruckus and noise of geese, chickens and donkey's startled awake by the persistent knocking and the family as well as neighbors being rudely brought out of their sound sleep. The room where the animals were kept was complete with manger and cooking area for the family. Perhaps this is where Joseph and Mary were housed, because the "family/quest room" was filled with family members already.

What's the difference? Our traditional understanding makes Joseph, Mary and the newly arrived Christ child unwelcomed quests, hastily provided for in less than a comfortable or secure manner. It makes for great sermons, But what if Dr. Bailey is correct? The scene changes from being turned away to being welcomed into the security of a faithful Jewish home and the warmth of a straw and hay-laden area near the hearth. Hospitality is one of the hallmarks of the Christian life and Gospel. Jesus and His holy family are welcomed and shown hospitality by the poor residents of Bethlehem. Room was made for them.

This Advent and Christmastide how many opportunities will there be for us to make room for one, two or three more in our homes as we celebrate the birth of the Son of God? The Twelfth Night Evening Prayer and Dinner on Jan. 5 will be just such an opportunity for us all. Father as we remember with thanksgiving the birth of our Savior and Lord, we pray that You provide us with opportunities to remember and care for the poor around us, the lonely, the hurting, the forgotten. You love us so much You gave us Your best. Grant that we may love others in the same way.

Mission Partner Updates

The Emmanuel Development Center

This month, we wanted to share with you a victory for the indigenous Christians of Costa Rica. A few months ago, one of the most prominent Cabecar Christians, Isaac, suddenly died, leaving his widow and five children. As one of the very first Cabecar converts, Isaac had been a faithful Christian for over 25 years and a pastor to his people. Because of his Christian faith and that of his immediate family, it was decided that he be buried with a simple Christian ceremony, rather than subject the body to the elaborate ceremonies of the Cabecar people's animistic religion.

Soon after his burial, Isaac's brother, a prominent member of the Cabecar governing body, brought a lawsuit against Isaac's widow and two of the missionaries in our area. This case went before the Supreme Court of Costa Rica. These days, the preservation and "protection" of indigenous culture and beliefs is a hot political topic, and the very idea of evangelization of the indigenous people is often frowned upon. We knew that the decision of the Court would have greater implications, especially for the indigenous Cabecar Christians.

We praise our Lord that in His sovereignty and goodness, the lawsuit was a victory for upholding and respecting the indigenous believer's rights to freely worship and follow Christian practices in Costa Rica, even when these are contrary to the traditional beliefs of their people. What man meant for evil, God meant for good.
