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FROM THE PASTOR

"Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." Romans 5:1-5

I would be stating the obvious if I were to say that this has been a particularly challenging year. From pandemic to politics, economic instability to environmental disasters, protests/riots to counter-protests/violence, prolific disinformation to polarizing divisions. And then there are the personal struggles that are particular to your own life. From a major medical trauma to failed personal relationships, job loss to the death of a loved one, profound loneliness to elevated stress, manic demands to accept technological realities to depression associated with modern living. (I hesitated to even begin identifying these particulars for fear of omitting your specific adversity!) It feels as if this has been a year where all these forces have conspired against us to become an unrelenting adversary.

So. What do we do as people of faith?

First of all, it would serve us well to remember that we're not the first generation of Christians to face adversity. Actually, it was the first generation of Christians who not only faced difficulties but it was because of their hardships that their proclamation of faith, in fact, prospered! The Apostle Paul said (in Romans 5:1-5) to this group of believers facing adversity (Paul offered his own list of adversity in Romans 8:35-39.), a peculiar thing... that we can "boast" (or in the NIV "rejoice") in our sufferings. "Inconceivable!" we cry!

To that, Paul would say, "Exactly!" (As in... "in-" = not + "conceive" = thinking.)

Which brings us to our second response. Paul points us to a way by which we can move through life's troubles. Rather than being psychologically crippled and embittered by life's difficulties, he reveals God's plan to face the storms of life. Paul lifts our gaze from the short-term (sufferings) to the long-term horizon of hope (glory). Can you see the up-lifting and ever-expanding movement in Paul's message (suffering... endurance... character... hope!)? So, we can focus on our problems... or focus on the big picture — and let us not forget that the believer's big picture is <u>very</u> big! Rather than dwelling on our present struggles, do the "inconceivable" (stop thinking about these things) and look towards the future God is presently laying out before you!

Then it is our response to live in peace. It's no escapist kind of peace, but rather a peace that allows us to fully stand and engage our world with a new message of love that has been lavishly poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. We don't have to rage and foment against that which (or those who) assail us! It's a peace with God, fueled by compassion.

Finally, Paul encourages us to do something rather unlikely. Boast. Now, this isn't a braggadocio litany of how we have prevailed over the troubles of this world, rather is a testimony to our God who has given us this peace through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Paul often speaks of this work of Jesus as God himself reconciling those who once were enemies, or adversaries. It's a speaking of grace to a world of troubles. It's a message that those around us need to hear. With God as our ally, there are no adversaries. Just opportunities for us to bring the hope we share in Jesus to all. (Hmmm. That sounds familiar!)
