We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs from under Thy table. But thou art the same Lord whose property is always to have mercy. Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to partake of this sacrament of Thy Son, Jesus Christ, that we may walk in newness of life and grow to reflect Thy Spirit in all things forevermore, Amen. FELLOWSHIP CIRCLE

We've come too far to turn back now; By the grace of God we're gonna make it somehow. Nobody knows the trouble we've seen; We've come too far to turn back now.

A man's conviction that he is God's child automatically tends to shift the basis of his relationship with all his fellows. He recognizes at once that to fear a man, whatever may be that man's power over him, is a basic denial of the integrity of his very life. It lifts that mere man to a place of preeminence that belongs to God and to God alone. He who fears is literally delivered to destruction. To the child of God, a scale of values becomes available by which men are measured and their true significance determined. Even the threat of violence, with the possibility of death that it carries, is recognized for what it is—merely the threat of violence with a death potential. Such a man recognizes that death cannot possibly be the worst thing in the world. There are some things that are worse than death. To deny one's own integrity of personality in the presence of the human challenge is one of those things. "Be not afraid of them that kill the body, and after that have no more that they can do," says Jesus.

A MOP AND A BUCKET in hand can serve as a way to gain entrée into almost any space a person might choose to enter. This became clear to me early in my married life, when Billye and I realized that we needed more income than my academic employment provided while she was still in Law School. The only criteria I applied in my search for work was that I didn't want to do anything which required the same kind of mental demands of my day job. After a short search I found a janitorial position with late hours and reasonably difficult work. The office building to which I was assigned housed the operations of a very powerful and influential group of businesspeople. Offices and business suites to which it would have been impossible for me gain access from nine to five were suddenly open to me without question. Even when those who labored in the quarters I cleaned worked late, they would yield to my presence in order to allow me to do my job. Thinking back on this experience makes me appreciate how easily people will allow you to have access to their lives when your only desire is to serve them. In our reading from Matthew 16 this week, Jesus talking about "the keys to the kingdom of heaven" made me consider that perhaps the key to opening the doors to the new world we so desperately long for and need is to be found in service. Jesus calls us to be servants and we must be willing, as he was, to serve all people freely, without bias and judgment. One of the major reasons why people with A MOP AND A BUCKET can go just about anywhere is that they have come to serve and do the things that help others have a better experience in life. After all, Jesus came to clean up our mess, so maybe all of us can better learn to do the work of the kingdom of heaven by applying the theology of the "Son of Man," always carrying A MOP AND A BUCKET.
