

As we enter another holiday season, the twinkling lights, festive decorations, and familiar carols remind us that something extraordinary is about to unfold—the celebration of the birth of our Savior. Growing up, Daddy would gather my sisters and I (and Mama) around as he read Luke 2:1-14 every Christmas Eve night. Today, MANY years have gone by, but as I was preparing for this newsletter, I read this again and reminded myself that it is not by mistake that Caesar Augustus ordered a census to be taken and that David with Mary had to travel to Bethlehem. Not by accident did Mary go into labor (No wonder she went into labor, the distance from Nazareth to Bethlehem is roughly 90 miles. Non-stop walking would take a person approximately 34 hours). I read that the birth of Jesus was announced by an angel appearing in the sky to the shepherds who were tending their flocks nearby in a field. The angel told them that a Savior had been born in Bethlehem and that He was the Messiah. The angel also told them how to find the Baby, and that they would find him wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. I pondered on this that God's plans are unexpected most of the time. Why lowly Shepherds? Why would God choose someone that doesn't necessarily have an education or a specific talent? They weren't most likely the richest ones in Bethlehem. They probably didn't get invited to fancy parties and celebrations. They were an unlikely bunch to be addressed by a heavenly angel that gave specific instruction for them to carry out His will. Nope, no mistake about any of this! God knew that the Shepherds wouldn't question their "assignment". They wouldn't hesitate if this Angel was telling them the truth; a truth about the Messiah that they had heard about from childhood stories. Instead they responded with faith and obedience. I have realized since being asked to be the Children and Youth Director that we should be open to God's call and to respond with humility and trust. Like the shepherds God's message is for everyone, not just the influential, "equipped", and powerful people. Will you respond to His call like the shepherds; without hesitation or questioning?
