"Listen, I tell you a mystery; we will not all sleep, we will be changed- in a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sounds, the dead will be imperishable, and we will be changed." 1 Corinthians 15:51-52

This post-Easter season has been busy with way too many funerals. In the span of six weeks, I will have presided at four funerals, all with graveside services. Death is something almost all of us deny, dread, and are deeply disturbed by. Ernst Becker in his classic, "Denial of Death", argues that our fear of death runs so deep in our psyche and our souls, that we expend an inordinate amount of energy fleeing and/or pretending that it will never be our turn. Becker points to the cultural rush for plastic surgery, non-stop distractions, and sanitized funeral homes as evidence.

By denying death so vigorously, ironically, we expend a great deal of our energy and emotion running away, instead of trying to find peace with our mortality. We are mortal, that's a fact. The bible declares we are like grass, flowers, and vapor. Each of those analogies are to help us realize and accept how temporary we are. For Christians, Paul points to the mystery of the resurrection, "For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be raised imperishable".

It shouldn't surprise us that death is more of an inconvenience than an obstruction for God. You wouldn't know it, given the way so many Christians fear death. In my experience, believers don't have much of a problem trusting the resurrection, intellectually and biblically. What is hard is the leap from in your head to in the ground. Maybe that is why as a pastor, I like graveside services. Every time I stand at the grave of one of God's saints for a committal, I begin, "None of us lives to himself and none of us dies to himself. If we live, we live to the Lord, if we die we died to the Lord. So then whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's."

I guess I feel like I am practicing for my own committal, though someone else will have to preside and say those words. When the bible speaks of such mysteries, we don't so much get answers as promises. Promises are preferable, like "whether we live or whether we die, WE ARE THE LORD'S". My prayer for us is that God would give us the faith to trust the death & resurrection of Christ is sufficient. And to have confidence that in your baptism this great salvation is yours. You cannot be anymore saved than you are right now!

Your name is written in the Book of Life!



"A jellyfish!" one little boy gleefully shouted out "We found one on the beach!" "YES!" I answered. "They have no bones but no shell either do they? So they

"They have no bones, but no shell, either, do they? So they can't stand up or move like we do – they just float around in the water." Once again, I was filled with the wonder of children who are awe-struck by creatures that are built so differently from us, yet manage just fine in their various niches in the world. I also wondered – why aren't we all equally enthralled with these wonders of life?

Seated on logs in a circle at the edge of a vast, sandy beach, these preschoolers were active, inquisitive, and anxious to get

moving. I needed to keep them engaged while I could. Holding up two large shells of the horse clam, I explained how these soft-bodied creatures live inside, digging into wet sand and extending a part of their bodies to suck in water that contains their food and oxygen. I quickly moved to another large shell - some knew that it was a snail shell, but none knew what kind. Large, round, and pale, the huge moon snail bull-dozes its way through mud searching for clams; when it finds one, it uses its tough, jagged tongue to drill a perfectly round hole in the shell and suck out its lunch. To protect itself, it can withdraw its body into the shell and shut the opening with a "door". I held up what appeared to be a very dead, dry crab. Only it wasn't. Dead, that is. In the simplest terms, I explained how the crab wears its "skeleton" on the outside of its body as a hard skin. It has a problem in that the skin doesn't grow larger; when it needs to grow it pops this skin open, removes its entire body, and crawls away to hide so that its new soft skin can harden. The old skin (or molt) remains behind and is often mistaken for a dead crab. I explained how you could tell whether it was dead or a molt, then showed a few more examples of clues left behind by sea creatures. As they examined the shells and dry body parts, we shared tidbits of information about each. I offered a few words about beach safety and respect for the animals' home – then we were off.

As a volunteer beach naturalist for WSU Kitsap Extension, the part I enjoy the most is sharing my knowledge with others – especially children. Most children are curious, honest, and uninhibited. They eagerly lap up new knowledge and let you know whether or not they are enjoying the experience. With parents close at hand, this lively crew spread out across the beach, searching for whatever they could find that grabbed their attention. The small shore crabs were an instant hit, as they always are, with the kids turning over rocks and empty shells in search of them. After a reasonable amount of time, I asked them what else they could find. As parents and children searched together, the many wonders of the saltwater beach began to be discovered: clams, oysters, snails with eggs, sand dollars galore, crabs (dead and molts), different seaweeds, limpets and chitons. Seagulls searched the nearby stream, a kingfisher chattered by, and some of the kids splashed in the surf in their high-top boots, laughing and squealing. Several children followed me around and brought me numerous things they found, asking again and again what those were. What a wonderful time we all had!

We are all surrounded by small, everyday wonders; many are things so common that we take them for granted or simply overlook them. When we slow down, breathe deeply, take our noses out of our various devises and take the time to intentionally observe, we, too, can discover that child-like wonder of this world. It is the only world we have, after all, and it deserves our undivided attention.

And God said, "Let the water teem with living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the expanse of the sky." So God created the great creatures of the sea and every living and moving thing with which the water teems, according to their kinds, and every winged bird according to its kind. And God saw that it was good. Genesis 1:20-21
