In January 2019, the congregation approved a plan to improve the overall appearance of the interior of the Sanctuary. Since then, the Facilities Visioning Committee has been working hard to complete the project.

The first step was to paint the interior walls. All the walls of the Sanctuary and Narthex have been painted except for the front wall. That wall will be painted when the new partitions are installed at a later date. The paint and supplies were paid for through donations and the painting was through volunteer labor from the Facilities Visioning Committee.

The new sound system has been installed and is operational. The new system was paid for from the 2019 Church budget. Our Music Director, Rick Baty has been designated as the manager of the new system and will be providing the training to those who need to operate the new sound system.

The old audio sound system has been moved to Grace Hall. It is hoped we can make this system operational in Grace Hall in the near future. Essentially we will be getting two systems for the price of one.

Within a couple of weeks, we will be installing new front doors to the sanctuary. The doors have arrived, and we are waiting on the contractor to schedule an install date. The Sanctuary improvement fund received several donations to make this happen. Most notably, the Preschool has made several donations over the past two years. In addition, Mary King, through her funding raising efforts and special dinners, has made a significant contribution.

We have several remaining components to the overall Sanctuary Improvement Project. In order to complete the project, we will need additional funding. Our plan is to seek additional donations and have a fund-raising effort specifically for the improvement project. The remaining components are:

New Altar, baptismal font, lectern	\$10,000
New projector	\$4000
New front partitions	\$5000
Replace the side light fixtures	\$3000
Ventilation improvements	\$2000

These are cost estimates only. When funds become available we will move on to each new component of the project. Those wishing to donate may do so by sending their donation to the church office with a note indicating the funds are for the sanctuary improvement project. Those individuals or groups which want to adopt and pay for a particular component of the project, may do so as well. Please coordinate with Peter Hansen.

### Barb's Backyard by Barbara Erickson

Note: This came out of s wonderful writing class that was offered at Vinland's family Camp this year:

At any time, I can close my eyes & be transported back, and I am brim-full. Full of wonder, serenity, peace, and love. The forest is a magical place for me. On a trail, I can hardly take it all in, but I do try. My eyes scan the tree trunks, taking in the colors, textures, lichens, and spider webs.

Are there holes in the trunks? If so, are they a sign of damage, disease, or animal activity?

I search the ground at my feet, looking for signs that lead to knowledge.
I see tiny fungi, lush mosses—really all miniature worlds. Sometimes my

imagination runs wild and I envision small beings living there, working, playing, and building. I compare their world to ours and find myself wanting to live in their world for a brief time, just to see what it might be like.

I see signs to help better understand this place. For the type of flower petals, tree leaves, needles, branches, and cones that litter the trail tell much about the giants that loom overhead. I know a small squirrel has been above in one place for I see the scales of the Douglas fir scattered about that he (she?) dropped as he tore the cones apart to reach the seeds. In this case, the cones were still green, and I know they were the female cones for they are the ones with seeds.

I note the nearly invisible strands of a spider web stretching between the branches of a red huckleberry whose berries have ripened and are mostly gone now, likely eaten by a robin or towhee. The web leads me to look for others and I begin to see them everywhere, even high above the ground. Some appear tattered and empty. Others contain their tiny weavers, unobtrusive and lurking at the edge of the web, waiting for the hapless bug that becomes caught and struggles against the strands, creating vibrations that alert the spider.

I notice and bask in the quiet. I only hear an occasional bird call and try to identify which bird made it. "Shick-a-dee-dee" gives away the Chickadees, while the "Me-meep" of the nuthatches remind me of a VW horn. Robins are numerous and have distinctive calls and songs. Woodpeckers are often, though not always, loud with their rattling calls and punctuated hammering against a hollow tree trunk. Gazing through the woods, the trees stand like silent sentinels and below them, covering the forest floor, tall sword ferns reach skyward with gracefully arching fronds. I often wish the trees could talk, for what tales they could tell of all they have seen and heard through the years.

Logs covered with thick green moss attract my attention. I love to search them to see just how many kinds of mosses grow there, to discover small, oddly shaped fungi and the occasional centipede or other creepy- crawly insect.

What a wonder it all is and my thoughts often lead to the Creator of this wondrous place. I feel a strong presence here, unlike anywhere else and it speaks to me. I breathe deeply of the rich, moist air and am free.

But ask the animals, and they will teach you;
the birds of the air, and they will tell you;
ask the plants of the earth, and they will teach you;
and the fish of the sea will declare to you.




## CONGREGATIONAL M E E T I N G

From Bishop Rick Jaech

Dear Pastors, Deacons and Congregations,

Eight members of the Southwestern Washington Synod, including myself, just returned from the Church-wide Assembly of the ELCA held in Milwaukee, WI. At this Assembly, the ELCA once again committed itself to faithfully following the Way that Christ frees and empowers us to walk, which is expressed in outreach, evangelism, education, compassion and the pursuit of justice. There were many important actions that were taken, which I will report to you in the weeks ahead. However, I wish to speak about one Assembly action which has received considerable media attention in the last few days and, in some cases, the reports have been false and confusing.

The Assembly voted to declare the ELCA to be a "sanctuary denomination". This action was part of a larger resolution that reaffirmed the long-standing commitment of the Lutheran Church to welcoming and caring for immigrants and migrants, which we have been doing for 75 years through Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service.

The word "sanctuary", however, is a word that is broadly used in a variety of ways and for that reason I want to give you some basic clarifications about the intent and meaning of this resolution.

In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is **publicly declaring** that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. The ELCA Churchwide Assembly declared that, when we preach on Sunday that Jesus tells us to welcome and care for everyone around us, then on Monday we will use our hands and voices to make sure it happens.

Right now, our immigration system is broken, chaotic and in need of repair. While we may have many different ideas about how to fix this broken system, we are also called to love our neighbors, particularly those who are most vulnerable to the brokenness of this system, especially families and unaccompanied youth.

The Churchwide Assembly's declaration that the ELCA is a sanctuary denomination binds only the ELCA Churchwide Organization; it does not bind or obligate congregations, synods, or other organizations to be a sanctuary place.

The Churchwide Assembly did not call for any illegal actions. All actions mentioned by the Churchwide Assembly are legal. If any person or organization chooses to go beyond these actions and engage in civil disobedience (and therefore accept the consequences), that would

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The mission of the Southwestern Washington Synod is to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ by empowering congregations and Church leaders to grow in worship, education, outreach, stewardship and other ministries. be their choice. In any case, a congregation or synod that considers becoming a sanctuary organization should first consult with legal counsel.

The Churchwide Assembly did not define what it means to be a sanctuary denomination, but rather requested that the ELCA Church Council provide guidance as to what it means to be a sanctuary denomination.

While we don't yet know the full scope of the work that this declaration will open for the ELCA, we do know that many ELCA faith communities are already doing sanctuary work. For a congregation, Sanctuary could include any of the following:

Form a book study using, for example, *They are Us: Lutherans & Immigration* by Bouman and Deffenbaug, or another book of your choosing. Hold Sunday adult forum conversations or a series of evening discussions and consider inviting people from a number of different perspectives on this topic.

Study the ELCA Social Teaching Statement on Immigration https://www.elca.org/en/Faith/Faith-and-Society/Social-Messages/Immigration

Invite members of a congregation to meet with nearby organizations that work in the area of refugee resettlement or immigration issues, such as Lutheran Immigration & Refugee Services.

Seek out elected officials to meet with and discuss this subject.

Host English as a Second Language (ESL) classes.

Pray regularly for immigrants and also for ICE and Border Patrol agents.

Welcome all people to your congregation's worship and events without classifying them according to their immigration or citizenship status.

Invite members of your congregation to advocate for immigration reform by writing to congress.

Providing housing for a community member who is in the midst of legal hearings and facing deportation.

Providing sanctuary has many different meanings. I am sure that within our Southwestern Washington Synod, we will have many different reactions to the topic of sanctuary, depending on what definition we give it. Once again I wish to state that the Churchwide Assembly's decision to make the ELCA a Sanctuary Denomination does NOT compel or obligate a congregation to do the same. However, this action gives us the opportunity to dialogue with each other about how our congregations and church body can help the United States fulfill God's desire for justice for all, including citizens, immigrants and refugees.

I welcome your thoughts, reactions and suggestions.
