"For I received from the Lord what I passed on to you; on the night Jesus was betrayed, he took bread, and when he'd given thanks, he BROKE it and said, "This is my body, that is given for you; do this in remembrance of me." 1 Cor. 11:23-24

I finally saw the movie, **UNBROKEN**, that chronicles the incredible story of Louis Zamperini. The Olympic runner somehow survives not only months at sea adrift in a life raft but harsh captivity in a Japanese internment camp. The movie gives us a noble version but is not as robust as the novel. There are visual

effects that create a visceral reaction from the audience. How much can this young man take before he breaks? The movie concludeswhen the war comes to an end. Louie and his fellow prisoners are finally liber-

ated. Sadly, the film only covers about half the story.

In the second half, Louie comes home and becomes very broken, dealing with what so many veterans struggle with, PTSD. Our hero tries to cope by drinking heavily. His depression causes him to rage, lament, and almost shatters his young marriage. But Louie is dragged to a Billy Graham Crusade and miraculously he commits to Christ. It saves his life, literally and spiritually. Being a pastor, you would expect I would find the second half of the story more miraculous than the first half. I do have issues with the title, UN-BROKEN. Returning from war, Zamperini is a very broken man and only God in heaven can put all the pieces back together. Psalm 51 claims, "*the sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and penitent spirit, O God will not despise*". Yes, this is



On the cross, Jesus Christ is wounded, sacrificed,

and broken on our behalf. The cross is the symbol of our faith. Every time we celebrate the Lord's Supper we break bread (his body) and drink wine (his blood) as a way of remembering and receiving new and forgiving life. In a way, you and I are most receptive to the grace and goodness that only God provides when we come with a broken and penitent spirit. Then and only then, when we are truly broken (and come clean about that), can God restore us to full and faith-filled life. **By grace we are saved.**

### barb's backyard



I would never have recognized it, had I been expecting its former shape. Appearing lifeless, it hung there, suspended, shrouded, bearing absolutely no resemblance to what it had been before. But I knew the promise it held, so I carried it home for safekeeping

During the passing weeks, I observed it carefully, hoping against hope, that I would be present for the big event. I'd never actually seen one in person, only on television or on the glossy pages of a magazine.

When the predetermined time had passed, I was indeed privileged. First, the slow splitting open; Then, the silent emergence. It carefully withdrew one - then another and another - until all 6 rested securely atop the dangling shell. Then, braced & balanced, it slowly pulled the rest of itself out. How ragged it looked - all folded up &compressed - not at all yet the image of what it was to become. It appeared to rest, but silently shuddered - with anxious anticipation or from the pure effort of pumping itself into its full, final shape. I resisted any urge to touch it, for it was not yet ready.

Just what does a caterpillar think as it eats its way through its green world? Does it have any idea at all of what lies ahead for it? The fortunate ones - those not plucked off by some hungry bird, nor eliminated by an overanxious gardener, nor demolished from inside by parasites - have a transformation ahead that is difficult to imagine. I wonder if, deep, down inside their tiny brains, they quake in fear of the changes ahead. There will be the end of their gnawing, the slowing down, the searching for the perfect spot to attach and encase themselves. Then the months of waiting - the miraculous metamorphosis - as their bodies change into something entirely different.

There it sat fully formed, unfolded and spread into a gorgeous yellow and black shape. It nimbly climbed to the top of its branch, wings wide open then slowly closing and reopening, to survey the world through new eyes. Slowly I put forth a finger, gently urged it to climb on and lifted it high in the air to watch as it took off. I held my breath as it fluttered across the open expanse, wishing desperately for its safe, secluded landing beyond notice of those who would prey upon it. For it was, after all, only one small butterfly in the larger scheme of life.

And what of the caterpillar? Was not the progression of its life determined in the beginning? I think, perhaps, it spends its allotted days simply **living**. It does what it must, slowly crawling day by day toward its destiny - toward confinement, transformation - and glorious release.

Listen, I tell you a mystery: We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed - in a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed...But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Corinthians 15:51-52 & 57

Megan Adrig is a self-professed movie buff and has been persuaded to try out a movie review colum. This first is called...

"Movies You May Have Missed"

Reese Witherspoon is an Oscar-winning actress with many acclaimed roles and well-loved movies under her belt. But it's her very first movie that she filmed at the age of 14 that you may have missed, and it's one of my favorites. "The Man in the Moon" (1991, rated PG-13) is the coming of age story about a tomboy, Dani Trant, and her rural Louisiana family in the summer of 1957. Dani, the middle of 3 girls (with mom expecting baby number 4), is restless, caught between her desires to spend her days in the carefree existence of childhood and her strict, but loving, father's growing demands for her to take on more responsibilities at home. When the Foster family returns to the long-vacant farm next door, Dani experiences new emotions when she finds herself falling for the oldest son, Court (17), now the head-of-family to his widowed mother and two younger brothers. While Court struggles with

his new role, he also enjoys a burgeoning, flirtatious friendship with Dani, trading barbs and lazy afternoons swimming in the Foster's pond. Dani is intent on Court being her first kiss and convinced they will be together. But when Dani's older sister - perfect, beautiful, and smart Maureen - and Court eventually meet and develop a relationship of their own, she must navigate her new feelings of jealousy and betrayal. Like all good dramas, there is a heart-wrenching climax that will have you reaching for your tissues. It's the relationships that make this story special, but its message of forgiveness not only how and when to give it, but also, when to receive it – that truly make this film a gem you won't forget. Reese Witherspoon is spot-on in her portrayal of a 14-year-old tomboy and she's supported by other fine actors, notably Sam Waterston and Tess Harper as her parents.
