Final, mandatory camp meeting on July 19 after worship.







"Regal" was not the way I would have described him that day, mucking about in the mud with the others. Nor did he appear noble or proud as he hopped about with his ungainly gait, vying to grab what he considered his share of the take. Instead, he appeared rather bedraggled, a bit vulnerable and obviously hungry. And, as is so often the case, the others took advantage of this opportunity to constantly natter at and harass him. In fact, they were unceasing and merciless in their belligerence, darting in as they dared to scold and attack. Undeterred, he stuck to his mission, finally grabbing his prize

and silently lifting off to circle higher and higher. Still, he was followed by a streaming menagerie - swooping, lunging, attacking and squawking - that seemed to accompany him until he slowly faded from view. At what point they gave up, if ever, and finally left him to his peace, I did not know. Obviously, there is another side to majesty.

Liberty Bay in Poulsbo is extremely shallow and muddy. When the tide goes out, vast mud flats are revealed - the lower the tide, the more mud. Many underwater sea creatures become stranded at these times, left uncovered and unprotected. Some burrow down into the ooze or squiggle under rocks; others hide beneath damp seaweed. But many are simply marooned, left to the mercy of the sun, wind and ever-present carnivorous birds. Noisy gulls, crows, herons, and eagles swiftly move in to scavenge what they can while they can. And so it was the day I spotted the lone Bald Eagle.

In 1782, the Continental Congress adopted what was called the American Eagle as our national emblem, though not everyone agreed. Benjamin Franklin opposed the choice, as he favored the wild turkey for such an honor. One hundred years later, the ornithologist Arthur Cleveland Bent commented that the Eagle's carrion-eating habits and attacks on the smaller, weaker osprey "hardly inspire respect and certainly do not exemplify the best in American character." To add further insult, many felt the large birds were simply "lazy". True, they often are amazingly sedentary, remaining on the same perch for hours at a time. The reason? Competency and efficiency. Adult eagles are free to sit and conserve energy precisely because they *can* secure food at will - with deadly speed and aim. Skilled hunters, they are able to capture waterfowl in flight and rabbits and mice on the run. But they also eat carrion and are accomplished food thieves, as many an osprey has learned. It's called survival.

I ponder this majestic bird and see there are two sides to the coin - just as there are to our American values, collective actions, or individual characters. We all have our muddled times in the mud of this world - times when we are less than regal and certainly not proud. And there are the times we spread our wings, sunlight delineating all that's pure and good and promising in us - and soar.

For as lightning that comes from the east is visible even in the west, so will be the coming of the Son of Man.

Women of Vinland Third Wednesday of each month





"About The Contemporary Service"

It seems distant to jump from the "Great Commission" to discussions about worship service times, worship in Grace Hall or Contemporary Christian music services. However VLC is wrapping up the survey and important decisions are before the council; **plus** a selection Committee is working to hire a new Director of Music Ministry. So,to make meaningful choices about our mission of reaching out, we should be informed with a broad, even national perspective, in making decisions about our services. Said another way, we don't know what we don't know until we know more.

Of course the Great Commission is fundamental to our mission statement, "rooted, rejoicing, and reaching." No problem, right? After all, in the U.S., 77% [of people] identify as Christian and eighteen percent have no explicit religious identity? We're generally not doing badly! 77% is a good number (not to leave the 18% behind). But here is some additional information to consider (circa 2007): One out of every three adults (33%) is classified as unchurched - meaning they have not attended a religious service of any type during the past six months. Residents of the West (42%) and Northeast (39%) remain the most church resistant, while those in the South are the least prone to avoid religious services (26%)."

So the West is the most church resistant population in the country (that's here where we live). What does that mean to VLC, that statistically 42% of the stated Christian believers around us are un-churched? If nothing else, that is a huge mission challenge to help bring God's children home! And a large part of that 42% are the Millennials, Americans ages 18 to 29 who are considerably less religious than older Americans.³

The Body of Christ is made up of all parts and all age groups. Like climbing a ladder, each rung is needed. VLC needsall those rungsto keep strong. At VLC nothing is wrong - we're growing! But we have a sustainability challenge with young adults& families that I've heard many people talk about. So we need to take new steps to get additional results - even if it's uncomfortable.

Psalm 144:9 reads, "I will sing a new song to you, my God; on the ten-stringed lyre I will make music to you." That reference is the origin of the New Song Worship Team's name. But why do we need this new form of worship?

Contemporary services have radically impacted both church and culture. Churches are adding contemporary services because they meet the needs of young adults & families and many others across the age spectrum. Some of the largest and fastest growing churches in America are contemporary, e.g., Rick Warren's Saddleback Church. Meanwhile, traditional churches are struggling with declining numbers.⁴

Without changing our Traditional service, our vision for the contemporary service is to expand VLCs' worship offerings in a new venue that reaches out to people seeking a closer relationship with Christ. I've learned our VLC contemporary services began some 10 years ago, long before I joined VLC. The venue is solidly based in the Lutheran liturgical elements of Confession, Absolution, Scripture readings, Sermon, and Holy Communion. In these, the Lord descends to us with His saving grace – Amen! As a Lutheran, these are critically important to my faith life.

What about times for service? We know through many survey's and our own members who travel and attended elsewhere, that churches with contemporary worship typically hold their services as the late service, frequently between 10:30 - 11am. They have time for study between services, and their traditional services are held as the first service.

What about seating? Seating tends to be arranged in a semi-circle around a raisedplatform and Alter that gives participants a greater feeling of closeness to God– (and Pastor greater proximity to his flock).

This is, for a nationally trending number, a more meaningful experience.

But change is tough! Few in the Bible knew more about change than Saul. Just think of his change, from killing Christians to becoming the Apostle Paul - HUGE! Paul's thoughts about actions to save soulsare recorded in 1 Corinthians 9; 19 – 22. In short,"... I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means I might save some."

In this we see Paul's flexibility, while delivering the unflinching message of Christs' crucifixion and resurrection. And by looking outward, we see what is working throughout our country with young adults and families – that rung-of-the-ladder we need for sustainability. These things help inform us about the various times, places and manner of worship we offer.

So with God's Grace we get to decide again, in this time and place, how to best meet the needs of our congregation & community. With His grace first, our prayers, and the strong leadership that our Pastor and Councilare providing, I know we'll see the fruits of Romans 8:28:

"And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."

buildingfaith Home Practices Our picks for building faithful households

As you are driving around town or the country this summer, make this practice a habit! Check out the "building faith" website for more ideas.

Praying in your Car

Why is this faith practice important?

The average American spends 101 minutes a day driving. If you, like I do, live in an urban area, you may find yourself frequently frustrated or impatient while driving. Why not reclaim these hours and use this time to connect with God, your family if they are in the car with you, and your community? St. Paul wrote, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, givethanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1Thessalonians 5:16-18, NRSV). I believe the car should be an avenue for such focused intention. Indeed, focusing intention is a critical aspect of prayer.

What materials are needed for this practice?

A car, and a radio that is turned off.

How to do it

Focus your intentions: Start by taking a few deep breaths. If there are others in the car, encourage them to breathe too. Begin by asking God to help you be a source of Christ's peace at this time.

Pray for others: Focus on other people, praying that:

- They would know God's presence.
- That any sickness or trouble will be overcome.
- That they will find at least one moment of joy to celebrate today.

The license plate prayer: Look at the letters of the license plates on the cars around you. Offer up a prayer for a person that you know whose name begins starts with the letter on the license plate. Or, if you are in an area with cars from different states, pray for someone you know from that state, or for the people of that state as a whole.

Red light or traffic jam prayer: Start with the car in front of you; or at an intersection, across from you. Using the petitions above, pray for the occupants of that car. If you have time, pray for the car behind you and/or the cars beside you. Pray specifically that the people in the cars arrive at their destinations safely.
