"As the rain and snow come down from heaven, and do not return to it without watering the earth, and making it bud and flourish. So that is my Word that goes out from my mouth; It will NOT return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." ISAIAH 55:11-12



That is an extraordinary promise in the book of Isaiah, especially for preachers who read the sermon notes from their confirmation students. Our confirmation program just started up so I have the first wave of sermon notes. Some notable excerpts so far include, "A lot of times I really don't like church. I don't like worshiping God in a room. I like worshiping outside of church. I only go to church to make God happy,", "I'm lucky my parents are not divorced", "I believe this sermon has taught me that family and friends are treasures not little trin*kets", "I don't how this relates to my* life but I loved the sermon", and "I may forget God at times, God but will never forget me."

Granted, there are some healthy expressions of faith that they recorded from the Word they heard. Just say the word "sermon" and people get sleepy. This seems a long way from what God declares through the Prophet Isaiah, "my Word that goes out from my mouth will NOT return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." That is an

extraordinary promise that sums up the transcendent and steadfast reality of God's Word, IT WILL HAVE ITS WAY WITH US AND THE WORLD. And that is often hard to believe, as you look out at people checking their watches and holding back (or not) a yawn. I write this because we are between **Reformation Sunday and All-Saints** Day. As Lutheran Christians, we hear the Word Preached, read the Word in Scripture, and receive the Word through the sacraments of Holy Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and Confession & Absolution. We believe that Christ is the Word of God that comes to us to nurture, encourage, hold us accountable. heal, and direct our paths. The part that is almost impossible to believe is that God ministers through long-winded preachers, old liturgies, New Song lyrics, faltering readers, plain old bread and wine. Maybe that just makes church, faith, grace, and forgiveness all the more radical and unlikely. Since guys like me are the delivery system and people like you are disciples let us pray God is directly involved if SALVATION is to come.

Barb's Backyard by Barbara Erickson



It was odd that it caught my attention at all, but at the same time how could it not? It was so completely unexpected and foreign to my eyes that, even though it was nestled unobtrusively among the still-green leaves, it literally took my breath away. About five inches long, it hung as a tightly-packed group of dark-colored, woody pods, each one containing a brilliant, shiny red, plump, bean-shaped seed suspended from the pod by a single, white strand. I'm not kidding about the color - identical to the red of M & M's, I'd say! If this plant had produced this dramatic show of fall seeds before, I somehow had missed it.

The plant is a saucer magnolia tree, which we planted back in 1988 as a memorial to my mom whom we lost that year. It is slow-growing - only about eight feet tall after twenty-seven years of growth - but faithfully produces huge pink blooms each spring. Whether it was the unusually warm, dry summer, the tree

reached some certain level of maturity, or other unknown factors, it lavishly produced five or six of these hanging seed clumps this year. Maybe I just happened to be working in its part of the yard at the right time. Whatever it was, because I think of it as "Mom's tree", it stirred up all kinds of memories of her.

It is often so easy to take those closest to us for granted. Precisely *because* they are so near and dear to us, they become a part of the fabric of our everyday lives, woven in so tightly and secure that we forget how precious they really are. If we are fortunate, and fully aware, age and experience teaches us that life can change in the blink of an eye and we should NOT take anything for granted - least of all those we treasure. I have been reminded of this time after time, but more so recently...

- *My loving husband* best friend ever, stalwart partner, robust worker, now facing physical challenges.
- *My sister* living close by for the first time since I was two years old, facing failing eyesight, hearing, and the fragility of aging.
- Our adult son struggling with mental illness, substance abuse, and unemployment.
- *My youngest niece* dealing with health issues, unemployment, her Alzheimer's-affected dad, and a sister with mental illness.
- *Our dear friend* solid presence and confidante, widower with young-adult children, who recently escaped serious injury from a falling tree.
- *My "Coffee Klatch" ladies* each facing their own unique challenges with family members, health, disability, and aging.
- *My community volunteer friends* dealing with family issues of dementia, addiction, failed relationships, worries for grandchildren, spouses, and their own declining abilities.
- All of YOU whom I know, love, appreciate, and consider part of the greater family.

I am not alone in this; I only listed those above as a reminder that <u>all</u> of us carry burdens of concern for those we care for and love. Let us remember to be thankful <u>now</u> for those we hold dear - circumstances can change in an instant and tomorrow may never come.

I view the magnolia's brilliant red seeds and remember my mom's bright red lipstick, geraniums, and apple pie. I'm ever so thankful to have had her in my life...

Advent Begins November 29

Advent marks the beginning of the church year. It begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, which is the Sunday nearest Nov. 30th, and ends on Christmas Eve. Advent means "coming" and the focus is on the first coming of Jesus Christ as well as anticipation

of the return of Christ in his second coming.

We light four candles on an evergreen Advent wreath. Three candles are blue, which is a symbol of royalty. At Vinland the third candle we light is pink, signifying joy.

On Christmas Eve, four white candles adorn the wreath, as we celebrate Jesus' coming as the light that no darkness can overcome.

Red and green (secular Christmas colors) are not used as liturgical colors during Advent or Christmas. We generously use fresh greens during advent, and adorn the altar area with white poinsettias for Christmas, since white and gold are liturgical Christmas colors.

Reflection on Gratitude by Martin B. Copenhaver

No one is born thankful. Gratitude is something that is learned, and perhaps the best way to learn gratitude is by repeatedly expressing it. It is by offering thanks that we can come to something like thankfulness. When our children were young

we would often prompt them to express gratitude ("*Say 'thank you' to the nice gentleman."*), not merely to teach them manners, but also so that they might learn gratitude. After all, thankfulness takes practice.

As adults we can easily fall out of the practice of gratitude. So I was intrigued by the book by John Kralik, <u>365 Thank Yous: The Year a Simple Act of Daily Grati-</u><u>tude Changed My Life.</u> During a dark time in his life, Kralik resolved to write a handwritten thank-you note each day. When he had written to all of his family members, friends and co-workers, he expanded the list. Once he wrote a brief thank-you note to the barista at his local Starbucks. That one almost wasn't read because the young man behind the counter assumed it was a letter of complaint. After all, who would write a thank-you note to someone for making you a cup of coffee each morning?

Over time Kralik found that this practice was changing his life. He started viewing aspects of his life differently, not as occasions for despair or complaints, but as a source of gratitude.

So, thanks to Kralik, this year I am resolving to practice gratitude by writing more thank-you notes.
