The shepherds wore tennis shoes, Mary checked her makeup, one of the wise men got the giggles, and the sheep were noisy and nearly knocked the manger over to get to the hay...

When our son was young, I spent many years helping with Sunday School. Each year, inevitably, as fall progressed into winter the time came to plan for the yearly production - *Christmas Program*. Things do not always go as smoothly with these things as we adults would sometimes like. We never knew for sure how many kids would be there each week for the essential costume "fittings", practicing of lines to say and songs to sing. And so one year, we tried a new approach.

In early November, we began to work on this Christmas program. We wanted to tell the story of Jesus' birth. We wanted music. We wanted everyone to be in it, and we wanted it to be a little different. Well, it certainly was.

Each week, we'd costume the kids on the spot, using whatever odds and ends we had on hand. Then, we'd head outdoors for a photo shoot, while I diligently tried to capture them on film (This was in the days before digital.) The first week, using everyone present, we asked the kids to become "Jews trudging to Judea"- across the back of the church property and through Muriel Dodge's pasture. The second week the younger kids were transformed into angels, complete with tinsel halos and wonderful, childish humor. The third week we met in a nearby field, hastily dressing preadolescent boys in scraps of burlap and other rough fabric. Handing them wooden staffs, we lit a small fire and cautiously tried to herd a small flock of leery sheep within camera range. The fourth week we met at our house, using our old barn and 3 sheep for the crucial manger scene. It was a night I'll never forget.

It did occur to me that our schedule was tight. If we missed one week, or I ruined one roll of film, we would not be able to complete our plans. But we blundered ahead and somehow it all worked out. The day of the program we all sat back and relaxed (more or less). We did tell story of Jesus' birth. The *Kid's Choir* sang, a couple of kids played piano pieces, a few of the older ones read our rendition of the Christmas Story. And all the while, on the screen in the front of the sanctuary, flashed picture after picture of our precious children - every single one of them. Not everyone sang on key nor remembered all the words. The musicians tripped over some of their notes, the narrators missed some of their cues, some of the slides were too dark or slightly out of focus. None of that really mattered - and to this day, one memory stands out in my mind.

Picture this: a cold, dark, rainy night in an old, dingy barn - rain beating down on the tin roof, crowded with wise men, shepherds, Mary, Joseph, baby and hay-filled manger - and real sheep. The noisy, smelly kind. We were only pretending, but in doing so we got a little closer to each other, a little closer to that baby born so long ago - a little closer to the real meaning of Christmas. Let none of us forget - that <u>is</u> where it all began.

It is the children who help us remember.

So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn. ~ Luke 2:6

It was Christmas 1971. Pastor Moore and family had just come to Vinland the summer of that year. He and I went down to David's "Five & Dime" store in downtown Poulsbo, which I think was where Verksted Gallery is now. We bought jello molds, sandbakkel tins and individual candle holders. He, being a body and fender man, knew how to weld. He put the steel ring and all the parts together into the Advent wreath we've had now for 44 years.

He and I assembled it with the greens and candles that first year. The church was less than half the length it is now, space was limited, and he decided it needed to be hung. He put up the pulley mechanism. After that, I did it alone for a number of years, then Barb Erickson handled it for quite a long time. Later Katherine Wollpert took it over for a few years. I helped her, and I remember one year when the whole thing came crashing down while we were trying to hang it while swaying back and forth on the ladder. We didn't know whether to laugh or cry, but we got it all patched together and rehung. Currently, Marsha Wright is putting it together and is looking for someone to take over!

It has been suggested (for longer than I care to admit) that the Council have a small segment in the newsletter to let the congregation know what we are up to at our monthly meetings. Now of course one can always review the minutes, but who doesn't prefer a

paraphrase to dry minutes?

Firstly I would like to thank all those currently serving on Council; their dedication to their roles as stewards or officers is only eclipsed by their participation in just about everything else around Vinland.

The main focus of our last few meetings has been digesting the survey results and taking action where able and most needed. In addition, we have been tackling budgetary concerns, staff changes and building improvements.

Unfortunately as we head into November we are about \$10,000 behind in giving; however our spending is under budget by about \$7500 which gives us a balance of -\$2500. Bigger spending is on the way with the days getting shorter and colder, so we will be asking the congregation to revisit their giving to ensure we make the budget we unanimously agreed upon in January.

There has been dogged discussion about service times and types of service. As mentioned in our post survey listening posts, the Council did not receive a mandate from the congregation regarding time and service type. Which in turn leaves the Council with competing concerns of growth, logistics, fairness and grace; each of which require equal weight. So as we in the Council reflect, we keep God's word close at hand and heart; *Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others*. Philippians 2:4 and so the discussion with its many facets, continues.

There will be *many* changes coming our way in 2016, decisions about our budget, it's structure and our mortgage, multiple staff changes and continued brainstorming on best how best to serve those that are already here and how best to reach out to those we have not yet met.

We thank you for your continued prayers and support of our amazing place of Grace.

Is That New Song Service Lutheran? - Steve King

Occasionally I'm asked if the New Song Service (NSS) is actually Lutheran. So I thought it might be good to look deeper. First, the title begs the question, "what IS Lutheran, anyway?" I grew up Methodist, and we rarely took communion (back in the day). In 1971 my new marriage brought me into the ALC, Lefsa, & Lutefisk. And at various times since, I've wondered about different aspects of being Lutheran, from infant baptism to kneelers, crossing myself, liturgy, old & new music, sacraments, traditions and habits. So what is Lutheran, and where is our freedom in worship?

The ELCA web site has teaching materials that contain rich discussions of doctrine.

Now I'm no Bible scholar, but we can put some things together from their source: As Lutherans we first believe in the Triune God, The Father, the Son and His salvation through Grace, and the Holy Spirit given to us. (That's different from other Christian denominations that are more liberal or fundamental.) And from that comes the Bible (the inspired word of God & studied interpretation) plus our Cannon (think inherited traditions).

We believe God <u>comes to us</u>, not the other way around. He stands at our door and knocks – if we open the door He comes into us. He does that is through "<u>The Means of Grace</u>," which are composed of the <u>Word and Sacraments</u>. Now we're getting closer to the worship service.

We believe in the Liturgical worship. Webster defines "Liturgy" as:

1) a form of public worship; ritual. 2) a collection of formularies for public worship. 3) a particular arrangement of services. 4) a particular form or type of the Eucharistic service.

If we look at pages 91 & 92 of our *ELW* hymnal (red book), we see liturgy is composed of gathering, word, sacrament, and sending. Specifically, the <u>Word</u> means: 1) the written Word (Bible), 2) music (words/inspiration), 3) preaching, and 4) prayer. Add in, 5) the Sacraments of communion & Holy baptism and together you have the five elements of Lutheran liturgy, the Means of Grace.

The Introduction to ELW is very clear that within liturgy there is great flexibility beyond our familiar settings:

On page 7: "Still, it is not possible or necessary for a single worship book to contain all the expressions of worship desired in every context by an increasingly diverse church. The book contains notable representatives of a wide variety of liturgical texts and musical forms that point to larger repertoires outside this volume."

On page 8: "[ELW] continues to emphasize that 'freedom and flexibility in worship is a Lutheran inheritance, and there is room for ample variety in ceremony, music, and liturgical form."

...is the new song service Lutheran? (cont.)

In other words, the red book settings give us familiar forms within which we can choose traditional worship – and it leaves the door open for creativity as well.

Regarding technology, our NSS follows a growing inheritance of contemporary Christian music. And technology (for better or worse) is changing the face of music – weather it's the iPods we listen to, the smart phone we stream music to, or even the instruments we use with the electronics & speakers that broadcast the music.

The other changing aspect of music is something we all grew up with, e.g., Tommy Dorsey, Chuck Berry, John Denver, Elton John (1930s – 1980's) and beyond. That change is **Musical style**! A good example is when I write the title, "*Blue Suede Shoes*." (For the younger crowd, Google *Elvis Presley*). Moms and Dads mostly disliked that "newfangled music." But now it's 'solid gold!'

Our contemporary service is within the Lutheran tradition of flexibility while holding firm to the "means of grace" found in our Lutheran liturgical elements of gathering, word, meal, & sending. Our "contemporary service" in no way replaces the rich setting we're familiar with in our *ELW* hymnal. But it does use changing aspects of music, including electronics and different musical styles beyond the *ELW*, to offer an alternative venue that appeals to our changing demographics in Kitsap County, the US, and actually throughout the world. I know VLC is flexible enough to have both, in order to appeal to a broad demographic and diverse church.

Finally, there is the brief topic of our habits that can mislead us about what is and isn't Lutheran. We grew up experiencing our worship traditions in local congregations. And out of habit or preference, we can make the mistake of thinking what we've always done defines what is Lutheran. So if we see an electric guitar in church, we might say, "That isn't Lutheran," which isn't true. It is important to distinguish between Lutheran theology and personal preferences based on habit or "what we've always done."

You've heard the phrase, "the only constant in this world is change." Change is happening with our music services. Yet Lutheran worship is designed for this flexibility within the means of grace & the flexibility of liturgical worship described in our Lutheran hymnal. So our NSS fits well within Lutheran doctrine, ELCA beliefs, and our Vinland Mission State: *Rooted in Christ, Rejoicing in Worship, Reaching to Serve*.
