Valley's Sanctuary Choir Presents 'A Ceremony of Carols' January 8



A Ceremony of Carols, Op. 28, is a choral piece by Benjamin Britten, scored for three-part treble chorus, solo voices, and harp. Written for Christmas, it consists of eleven movements, with text from The English Galaxy of Shorter Poems, edited by Gerald Bullett; it is

in Middle English. The piece was written in 1942 while Britten was at sea, going from the United States to England. The Valley Sanctuary Choir will perform an arrangement for four-part choir by Julius Harrison.

Soloists are Haley Maddox, mezzo soprano; Grace Skinner, mezzo soprano; Justin Peters, tenor and Aaron Lange, tenor.

Guest harpist is Denise Fujikawa, Professor of Harp at Portland State University. She studied at the Eastman School of music with the renowned harpist Eileen Malone, was awarded a graduate teaching assistantship at the University of Southern California and has taught at California State University, Sacramento. She currently resides in Portland where she has been a member of the Portland Opera Orchestra since 1998. She played harp with the Sacramento Symphony from 1992-1997 and many other orchestras in New York, California, Oregon and Washington.

God has just handed us something very special: a "brand, spanking-new" New Year. With this New Year, we can do some very special things. Or not. It's really up to us. Newness is something that is very popular in our American culture. Who doesn't enjoy that "new car" smell, that fresh-out-of the box aroma of a new pair of leather shoes, or the feel of that nice Christmas sweater you just opened? Our



resolve is high to make this year different than other years. But research shows, the average time between the moments we make our resolutions and their demise is a pathetic three weeks.

By that time, all the newness has been aired out of them – and they become mere chores. It's

one of the reasons I don't make resolutions.

Instead, I'd like to offer a new way to tap our New Year's enthusiasm. Let's focus on provisions for the journey. In our culture, when we are faced by the unknown, we like to stock up on what we need. Like when we get an inclement weather report. Remember a few weeks ago when people rushed to the store to stock up on provisions? I've often been fascinated why a snowstorm requires bread milk and eggs, any more than any other day in the year. But apparently, our anxiety is alleviated.

So my question for you is this. (Focus on the year ahead.) What are the most important "provisions" that you will need for your faith journey? When you think about the most challenging times in your life, what are the most important things that have tided you over?

Personally, I can think of some precious things that have gotten me through. The majority of these things take up little or no physical space. This makes sense because Jesus always encouraged his disciples to travel light. In Mark 6:8-9,



TOUGH GIRL



Local author Carolyn Wood, who was only 14 years old when she won an Olympic gold medal in swimming, will be talking about her recent autobiography entitled *Tough Girl: An Olympian's Journey* at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, January 27, 2017, in Armitage Hall. All interested Valley members, friends and neighbors are invited to attend. Refreshments will be provided and Carolyn will have copies of her book for sale and will be glad to autograph them following the presentation.

Amazon.com gives the following brief description of her book: "After several failed swim lessons, young Carolyn Wood finally conquers her fears and dives into unknown waters in *Tough Girl*. By 1958 she has set a goal to make the 1960 Olympic team and, along with teammates and competitors, begins the arduous road to Rome. Losses, pain, fear, and fatigue accompany the rambunctious athlete as she finds her way through athletic training, school, and social-gender expectations.

Beautifully written, *Tough Girl* artfully weaves Wood's life story around the tale of her long walk on the Camino de Santiago, an effort to tap into her tough-girl resilience so she can understand and accept the end of a decades-long marriage. The ups and downs of this story will thrill and inspire readers as the ultimate lesson becomes clear: we get through life one stroke, one step, and one page at a time."

Carolyn is a former English teacher in the Portland Public Schools and has lived the majority of her life just a few blocks from our church. *Tough Girl* tells her life story with the challenges, triumphs and public and personal victories that helped make her who she is today.

'Dining for Women' Project in Cambodia

Valley's Dining for Women group starts this New Year on Sunday, January 15 at 11:30 a.m. with a very interesting featured grantee in Cambodia called Mith Samlanh. This project aims to provide safe shelter to marginalized girls who are separated from their families in Phnom Penh as they are transitioning back to their families or participating in vocational training.

Dining for Women loves this project because of its focus on marginalized girls to secure their rights to education and employment while assisting them in their reintegration to their families. By providing transitional shelter and support services, Mith Samlanh is reducing the vulnerability of young girls to human trafficking.

We have an amazing potluck lunch, learn about the month's featured grantee and have the opportunity to support that nonprofit by making a monetary donation, typically what is spent on lunch out. Christmas Cookies Came to Valley


