

Reflections from Reverend Greg Tatman

It has been a month now that I have been here at Valley. It has been a wonderful experience! It is nice to serve such a faithful group of Presbyterians. There are a lot of moving parts here, which show the vitality of the congregation.

I will always remember my first day, that Monday morning when I walked up to the counter holding the sliding windows in the office. AmyAnn was just opening up; turning lights on and doing some of the things needed to get the office going. She eventually got to me. She opened the glass sliders and asked, "Can I help you?" I promptly ordered a "burger, fries and a medium chocolate shake." It took her only an instant to not believe me, and I quickly said; "I am the new pastor."

Angie arrived almost immediately thereafter. We then opened up my new office, Ben's former office. It had been stripped of all evidence that Ben had ever been there. Empty book shelves. Nothing at all on the desk. Empty file cabinets. Nothing on the walls.

I was struck at the reaction of Angie and AmyAnn, (as well as Conner the next day). They were stunned at the emptiness. Their last view was full of more than a decade of the icons of Ben's ministry. Now nothing. It made me think of John 20, when Mary Magdalene was the first to arrive at the tomb on Easter morning, finding it empty. Mary was stunned, overwhelmed with anxiety and grief. "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb and we do not know where they have laid him!" she said.

Of course, some time later that day as Mary was sitting by the tomb, weeping in grief, Jesus appeared to her. "Mary," he said. That's all it took. She recognized him.

Jesus wasn't gone at all! If you think about it, Ben hasn't gone either. He is simply doing what all of us do, fulfilling the next chapter in his life. That all of you grieve for his absence, and for the changes it means for Valley, is a natural thing. Keep at it. Talk about it. Pray about it. And prepare for the new pastor who comes on board Valley in the middle of July. Then neither my or Ben's, or for that matter Jesus' legacy will be determined by an empty Tomb.

Dr. Koester Reading Biblical Literature – DVD Series

- June 4 Freedom and the law in Paul's letters. His letters to the Galatians and the Romans expressed the perspective that true freedom is expressed in love, joy, peace, patience and kindness. Those attributes promote a sense of community and enhance our ability to express love and assist each other.
- June 11 Paul on gender roles. Paul had previously stated that in Christ there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, nor is there male or female. In Christ, we serve each other subserviently out of love. Although the husband is "head" of the wife, he is to give himself up for her; thus, replacing domination with self-going. In separate consideration, slaves are to obey their earthly masters, but their primary loyalty is to Christ and God.
- June 18 Chapter 35. Letters to Sojourners A sense of social disruption was created by the existent influences and beliefs of the Jewish and Roman hierarchies. This was stressful, but as noted, stress has been a common if not universal component of religious history. James points out that we should be "doers" of the Word, not merely hearers. Likewise, it is not enough to have the right ideas, but if they are important, we have to live them out.. Peter admonishes us to do what is right following the inspiration of Jesus.
- June 25 Chapter 36. Reevaluations of the new creation. Rather than focusing on destruction, this chapter identifies God's role in a new creation. The antagonists in Revelation are God the Creator and Satan and the Beast. Evil is portrayed as a cancer invading life and must be destroyed. Powerful imagery raises the question of mankind's submission to evil vs. pursuit of redemption through Jesus. The triumphant outcome is a resplendent new heaven, new earth and new Jerusalem with golden streets, pearly gates and walls that are 1500 miles high. The metaphorical river of life flows from the throne of God adjacent to the tree of life that can heal all mankind. This implies our responsibility for using our God-given gifts to fulfill the purposes and intent of our Creator.

Trail in a covered wagon with a team of mules in the modern era.
