#### Letter to Congregation from Property Improvement Committee

From Roger Rees, Valley's Facilities elder and member of the Property Improvement Committee.

The Property Improvement Committee held a town hall meeting after church on Sunday, May 7, 2017 to update the congregation on the status of property improvements completed, projects currently underway, and jobs planned for the remaining three-year Building in Christ capital campaign.

#### Adult Education, Sundays 9:00 a.m. in Armitage Hall

**Introduction:** This begins a series of discussions by Marcus Borg, a noted Biblical scholar and theologian; a faculty member at OSU '79-07; National chair of The Jesus Society of Biblical Literature. He was a major figure in historical Jesus scholarship and an influential voice in progressive Christianity.

#### Titles in the DVD Series

- July 2: God Discussion begins with reference to our thought processes concerning God. Prior thinking focused on God as an all-powerful, loving Being who occasionally intervened in human history. This chapter focuses on God as the Reality and Spirit within which we live and have our being. The experiencing of God is enhanced by recognition of our limits of understanding, and the complexity and enormity of God and God's creation. Borg cites the conventional concept of God as loving, but possibly punitive if we don't "do right.", Borg, alternatively raises the concept of God as a source of infinite love and compassion that exceeds our ability to perceive or comprehend.
- July 9: Jesus Borg points out that Jesus may be considered the decisive revelation of God in human life. Two realities are expressed: the pre-Easter Jesus who was crucified, and the risen Christ who is the central figure of our Christian tradition. The risen Christ exhibited the qualities of God, and in one sense, became one of the names of God. Borg states that perhaps 10-20% of Christians have an intimate experience during worship, or thinking about the risen Christ.
- July 16: Salvation Borg discusses the conventional concept of salvation as a "loaded word" embedder in our lives and religion. Conventionally, it implies a perpetual after-life and salvation from the consequences of our sins. Alternatively, he emphasizes the concept of a salvation that occurs on this side of death as a transformation of human life, metaphorically expressed as freedom from bondage, removal of alienation, liberation resurrection and transformation that frees us from our fear-based self-centeredness.
- July 23: Practice This refers to practicing Christian principles in the "here and now." It implies a need for dedication, preparation and transformation to achieve those ends. In the Book of Acts, Christians were called "Followers of the Way, implying application of their Christianity to their practice of living. In the process of worshiping God, we are formed and filled. Prayer is not just about asking for things; it involves a pursuit of a relationship with God by which we are transformed.
- July 30: Community Although this aspect of our religion has received less formal discussion, it is at the heart of Christian history and practice. Borg's discussion raises the question of the role of community in Christian life today. This involves not just praying, but participation in the acts of living. Likewise, the purpose of the Christian community is participation in God's purposes, realizing that the phrase "that God so loved the world" expresses God's love for the practices of justice, love and caring for the well-being of both human and non-human life. "Loving God and loving our neighbors" is the bed rock of the Law, but all too often is "marginalized". We put limits on our care of the sick, the hungry and the outcast. Life in Christ involves our obligation to the broader human family.

# Consider joining the monthly Women's Bible Study beginning in the Fall:

It hasn't yet been decided how, or whether, the Women's Bible Study will be organized in the coming year, but it is hoped that decisions will be made during the summer. If you are interested in participating in this Bible study, please let the church office know or contact Connie Brenner.

The Horizons Bible Study for Presbyterian Women for the program year 2017-18 is entitled "Cloud of Witnesses: The Community of Christ in Hebrews." It was written by Melissa Bane Sevier, who was a church pastor for many years, and now focuses on her longtime ministry of writing and photography. The author has a Masters of Divinity from Louisville Seminary and a Doctorate in Ministry from McCormick Seminary. The nine lessons in the study explore nine major themes in the Letter to Hebrews, relates those themes to other parts of our faith tradition, and ties them together with the overarching motif of community. Since the study is thematic, not sequential, some parts of Hebrews may be included in more than one lesson because they relate to more than one theme. Passages in other books of both the Old and New Testaments are also examined to see how the themes in Hebrews relate to similar themes in other parts of our tradition.

Vacation Bible School is just around the corner. If you haven't already, you'll want to register your children soon. Space is limited!



The Property Improvement Committee has a lot of work remaining on our list of things to upgrade, including making at least one and perhaps two ADA compliant restrooms downstairs, upgrading all other restrooms and painting the sanctuary. There are many other items are on our list as well.

Some of the feedback, particularly initially, centered on the exterior accent colors. The Committee felt we had executed on our responsibility in managing the work, taking the advice of a professional architect and sharing all the conceptual drawings with the congregation. Therefore, we decided to hand this particular issue to Session.

After discussing this issue in detail during the June 13 Session meeting, is was decided to keep the current church colors for a minimum of three years at which time they will review the possibility of changes.

In the meantime, the Property Improvement Committee will put our energy into finishing up the exterior projects and begin with interior upgrades.
