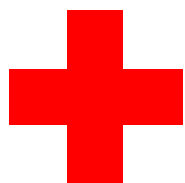


Blood Donation and Anemia

If you would like to be a blood donor but have been told your iron is too low, or that you have anemia (kind of the same thing) here is some info about how to correct low iron levels.

Food sources include red meat (beef, dark meat chicken or turkey are best), eggs, leafy greens and dried beans. But to really correct low iron, you probably need to SUPPLEMENT. Daily needs are for people who have a good amount of iron on board already. Up to 250 mg per day of Ferrous Fumerate or Ferrous Gluconate can be tolerated if taken with food. Most people will be able to build up their iron level in 10 days at this dose. Once a person has an adequate iron level, it can be easily maintained. (Of course there are exceptions.) If you have a tendency toward low iron, a multiple vitamin with iron should be enough.

I also recommend taking additional iron supplement (at least 25 mg) for five days after blood donation in order to restock your supply. Questions? Contact Valerie Conner, dietitian, at vmconner@msn.com.



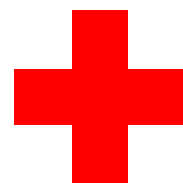

Mission Endowment Comm. awards grants to five recipients

The Mission Endowment Committee awarded five grants to applicants during the Spring 2019 cycle. A total of \$10,750 was given to three local, and two international recipients. The grants support housing, food, education, and social services. Members of the Mission Endowment Committee are Jan Bellis-Squires, Robert Hayes, Mary Kelly, David Marquis (Co-chair), and Carol Powers (Co-chair). Janet Adkins is the Mission Committee liaison.

- **Impact Northwest** – Homelessness Prevention Services: provide safe, secure transitional shelter, and case management leading to long-term sustainable housing.
- **Seeds of Learning** – Provide scholarships for four low-income students in Nicaragua so that they can pursue a university education.
- **Interserve** – Support the Jesse Montes family to set up a residence in Bhutan where they will teach and provide mental health services.
- **Valley Community Presbyterian Church Youth** – Triennium 2019: provide a portion of the funding needed for Valley's youth delegation to attend Triennium at Purdue University in Indiana.
- **Good Roots Community Food Bank and Garden** – Good Roots is a partner agency for The Oregon Food Bank. This grant supports food purchase, garden supplies, and fuel for their delivery truck.

Presbyterian Women of the Synod Gather



Fifty-one Presbyterian Women from 10 of the 11 Presbyteries in the Synod of the Pacific gathered at a retreat center in Burlingame, California, April 5-7. It was an inspirational weekend of information about activities and projects of Presbyterian Women (PW) across the denomination, sharing activities and mission projects of the churches in the Presbyteries, introduction of next year's Horizons Bible study, fellowship and worship.

Two women from the Synod spoke about their experiences participating in the 63rd session of the UN Commission on the Status of Women in March of this year. This year was the first time the PW delegation was accredited by the U.N. as a non-governmental organization (NGO). That status expands Presbyterian opportunities for participation in the annual commission.

One speaker, a young woman who is an ordained clergy person in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), is a PhD candidate at Drew University in religion, culture, and ecology. She spoke about climate change and the effect of fossil fuels. She highlighted collective action such as the current proposals for PCUSA (and other denominations) to divest themselves of carbon-centered investments and work to hold industries accountable as more effective than individual decisions.

The Gathering viewed multiple sessions of next year's Bible study "Love Carved in Stone; A Fresh Look at the Ten Commandments," taped by the Rev. Eugenia Gamble, author of the 2019-20 Horizons Bible study. The study promises to be a most interesting discussion of one of the basics of our faith.

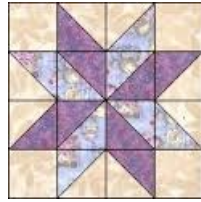

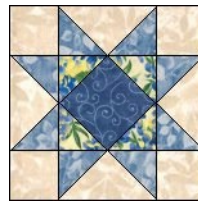

Earth Care Corner

Want to know a great way to avoid excessive packaging? Buy in bulk!

There are many stores that have bulk food sections that allow you to place the item that you want to buy in a plastic bag that then gets labelled with a specific number code that allows the clerk to weigh the bag and determine the cost of the contents. This is great for herbs, spices, teas, coffee, nuts, grains, flours, baking chips, noodles, rice and much more! No kidding!

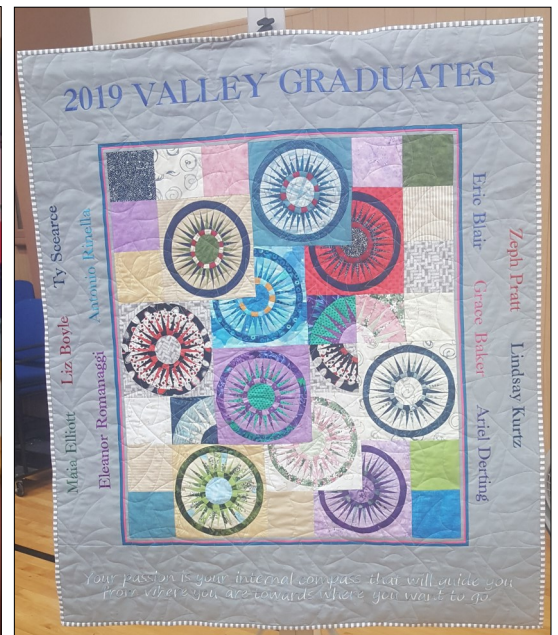
Buying in bulk is *always* a money saver and often the products are from the same company that packages items in smaller quantities that sit on the shelves in your local market. Instead of needing to buy a new packaged food item, it is just as easy to buy in bulk, refill your container, rinse out that plastic bag and reuse it the next time you go shopping.

Some of the stores close to Valley Community Presbyterian Church are Fred Meyer's Nutritional section, New Seasons, Natural Foods and WinCo.
