

What are the Seven Marks of vital Congregations?

Each newsletter Pastor Jeff will share a little about one of the seven Marks of Vital Congregations.

"The purpose of the Vital Congregations Initiative is ... a process that seeks to help assess, discern and live into transformative actions that increase vitality. Through intentional spiritual practices and relational connections, this two-year process takes us deeper into following Jesus Christ, making disciples and being the vital community of Christ..."

(Purpose Statement for the Vital Congregations Initiative)

#1: Lifelong Discipleship

Presbyterians love their words. Sometimes we get a little carried away with using theological, or 'churchy' words. What does the term *Lifelong Discipleship* mean to you? Simply put, *discipleship* means to follow Jesus. If we add the word lifelong to it, then what we have is: *Lifelong Discipleship—following Jesus every day of our lives*.

Discipleship is very different than simply going to church or calling one's self a Christian if someone asks what religion we are. When we follow Jesus in our lives, that means that we are continuously growing, learning, and changing, based on a regular interaction—a relationship—with God. Going to church is great, but what good is it if we just go home and live our lives the same as we always did? Reading the Bible is wonderful, but what do we learn? It's awesome if we pray, but how does prayer actually affect our lives?

If a congregation life Valley Community is *vital*, then our members and friends should be able to speak of how this church provides opportunities for people to follow Jesus every day of their lives. A church can offer all of the staff, preaching, and programs it wants, but our first priority must be for our community to follow Jesus each and every day. What does Valley Community do well in this regard? Where can we grow and improve?



My Faith Story

I was raised in a not-entirely-typical Christian home, with parents who attended church and made sure that we did, at least most of the time. Especially if it wasn't hunting season. My mother was the oldest of six siblings whose church home was First Presbyterian in Oregon City, and most of them went on to become active members of Presbyterian churches in Salem, Pendleton, Lebanon, Vancouver, and San Jose. And we still begin extended family meals with grace. But we didn't at home. I was baptized in a Lutheran church in Salem, Oregon (which I visit these days when it hosts Interfaith Advocacy Day when the Legislature is in session), but we switched to First Pres, Salem, shortly thereafter. I'm not sure why.

I grew up attending Sunday School, singing in the youth choir, going to Presbyterian summer camp at Silver Falls and Santiam Lodge, being confirmed and being active in youth group at First Pres until I left for college, even though my parents left to become some of the founding members of John Knox Presbyterian in Keizer while I was in high school. While in high school, I tried to be an obedient Christian, but the element that I totally missed internalizing throughout my childhood was that GOD LOVES US. I'm not saying that that part of the message wasn't there, but that it wasn't something that I picked up on.

During college, it seemed to me that being an actively-involved Christian took up a lot of time, and belief in God was something that was pretty irrelevant to my life. So I kind of went my own way. It wasn't really until I was in my early 30's, having finished college, gotten married and divorced, that it seemed to me that the life that I was in firm control of wasn't working awfully well. I had a couple of friends at work who had active lives of faith, and in talking with them wondered if there might not be something valid in what they believed. So I started attending a weekly evening class with them, where I heard, over and over again, how much God loves us. Kind of a novel idea for a mid-30's adult who'd grown up going to church. About the same time, I'd started engaging in a lot of weekend activities with the Mazamas – not rock climbing, but hiking with Mazama groups – so going to church on Sundays really didn't fit with that activity. And I knew a number of people who felt they were worshipping God where they felt God truly is – in the forest!

But when I accepted a transfer to Washington, D.C., and started a new life in Virginia (where I found out pretty fast that hiking the trails in the Appalachians or Blue Ridge isn't nearly as pleasant as the Cascades or the Gorge), I decided to find a church home. I'd tried attending a couple of more evangelical churches in Portland, and didn't find them to be in my comfort zone, so naturally gravitated to a Presbyterian church. The one I found in Alexandria was absolutely an answer to prayer. The women's Circle that I joined was a group of women ranging in age from early 30's to 60's, and most of them were still working. It was a close, welcoming group, as was the rest of the church. We were active in mission, community outreach and Bible study, and in trying to be a community of believers. One of the ideas that I internalized there was the reiterated instruction throughout the scriptures that we are to care for the widow, the orphan, and the alien. I served on Session at Bush Hill and was quite active.

While there, I met my husband at work. He's a non-believer (or maybe more accurately, a sceptic) from a pretty dysfunctional Jewish family. His grandparents, like my Danish grandfather, were all immigrants, his from eastern Europe. He's tolerant, even encouraging, of my faith and commitment to the church community, and our granddaughter's involvement. He does worry a bit, though, that my beliefs aren't quite conventional enough to pass muster with a Christian church.

In a way, my life has been bookended by Faith – my mother's name was Faith, and she always assumed that things would be okay, and worked to see that they were. I'm not sure her faith was in God, but in some basic law of the universe. And now much of my time and effort is involved in trying to see that our granddaughter Faith – who was named for her great-grandmother – learns that God loves her, and that she is to love and care for all of creation. I hope that she grows to understand Micah 6:8 "He has told you, O Mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you – but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

The basis of what I've come to believe is that the generative force in the universe loves his/her creation. All of it. Not just all humans, Christian or other, but the natural world as well. And has given us the responsibility to care for it as well as for each other. That Jesus Christ is the embodiment of the life God had in mind. And that the Holy Spirit is present when two or more of us are together, and empowers us to accomplish the work of the Lord.

Community Recycling Event September 21

The Earth Care team at Valley invites you to participate in our first ever Community Recycling event. On Saturday September 21 from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. there will be a lot of activity in the Trimet lot one block south of our church!

Several community organizations have committed to being there to receive recyclable and reusable items brought in by our church members, our local neighbors and anyone else that has seen our notices posted around.

So far these are the organizations planning to be there:

- AGYLIX: Their Tigard facility recycles Styrofoam and #6 plastic.
- **COMMUNITY WAREHOUSE:** They are a non-profit that serves as a local furniture bank to provide for those in need of all things inside an apartment or a house.
- FRED MEYER: plastic bag and plastic film, similar to the bins in each of their stores
- GEM TEXT: clothing recycling to keep it out of the landfill and on someone's back instead.

There are other organizations that have not yet confirmed. More information on the completed line up of participants will be forthcoming in Eblasts, bulletins, on Valley's website and Facebook page.

As you look around your house, start thinking about what you can bring to our community recycling event. We live in abundance and much redundancy. There are many in our Portland area that could use what we have in excess. Please start looking around your home now, tell your neighbors, tell your friends, tell your coworkers and tell your family about this event. More to come!

Music Update for Children/Youth



To achieve this goal, they provide technical assistance and financial support to schools to pursue holistic need-based education geared to eliminate both in-school and out-of-school constraints that could prevent a girl from finishing high school, getting into vocational training or college, and ultimately, into a job.
