Mark #6 of Congregational Vitality: Caring Relationships



What are *Caring Relationships*, exactly? What we imagine as caring relationships, may look differently to each and every person. According to the Vital Congregations Initiative, perhaps it's helpful to say what they are not. Caring Relationships are not being part of a social club, facades, hypocrisy and judgment of "church' and "religion".

In Scripture, the Apostle Paul describes caring relationships with one amazing word: *agape*, which means "Godly love" in Greek.

So what should we as the church be aspiring toward as we seek to create caring relationships? I think somewhere along the line the church, like every other human organization and institution throughout history, has become confused by what, exactly, is the *source* of what nourishes these caring relationships, these authentic communities today. Somewhere along the line we started to rely more and more on our committees, and our pastors, and our fellowship activities as a substitute for the transforming experience of what Paul describes as this Godly, *agape*, love. Friends, Christ invites us to experience this love once

again in his presence, and calls for us to share this love with those we encounter.

What could it look like here at Valley Community, for us to prioritize caring relationships that go well beyond enjoying people who we are similar with and easy to spend time with and love? What could it look like for us to genuinely care for all people who may come through our doors; for us to embrace relationships with people who do not look like us? What could it look like for us to honestly feel safe enough to share our entire lives, especially those embarrassing, frightening parts with others here, instead of the traditional niceties that we are accustomed to? What could it look like for Valley Community to be a place where individuals and families come for the spirit-inspired worship and the fun events, but they stay because this is the place where they can truly be honest with who they are, and they feel safe and loved no matter what?

Yes, we may only "...know only in part" as Paul writes, but what a sight it is to be part of God's radical love here at Valley Community, in our neighborhoods, with our family and friends, and around the world as we are called towards such caring relationships.

By focusing on the availability of high quality seeds, and loans from commercial banks, Shared Interest works to support a previously un-bankable group of farmers towards higher incomes, sustainable futures, and healthier families.


All Are Invited to the February Senior Adult Lunch Feb. 27!



My Faith Story

"Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep. If I should die before I wake, I pray the Lord, my soul to take."

This is my earliest memory of my faith journey. Reciting this prayer as soon as I was learning to talk, being tucked into bed, and left in a dark room to peacefully go to sleep. However, I did my best to stay awake to avoid dying in my sleep and having my soul taken, whatever that meant. Very confusing to a preschool child.

At 5 ½ I received my first Bible at Lincoln Street Methodist Church near Mt. Tabor. My Sunday school teacher said reading the Bible would answer all our questions about Jesus and God and what they mean to us. Well, the St. James Bible had lots of thin sheets of paper, tiny print, very few illustrations, and congested with convoluted sentences, and meaningless vocabulary. I very quickly came to realize, "Adam and Eve" was not "Dick and Jane."

I recently asked my older brother and twin sister what they remembered about our church upbringing. Even though our exposure was extremely limited, we each recalled simple Bible stories, familiar traditional hymns, even the Doxology and Gloria Patri. My brother remembered attending a variety of denomination Sunday

Schools with neighbor friends. My sister remembered getting dressed up only to sit in dank basement classroom. I remembered singing "Onward Christian Soldiers" enthusiastically marching around the classroom.

Through grade school we car-pooled with friends to Sunday School. I don't recall being in the sanctuary except on rare occasions to sing at Easter or Christmas. Our parents only came to these special events, supported the church's building campaigns, but were neither members nor regular attendees.

Nonetheless, they believed and practiced Protestant ethics at home. Attending church Sunday School was no different than receiving an education on any other subject or learning any life skill. At home there were reminders of the Golden Rule, the Ten Commandments, while practicing humility, gratefulness, generosity, empathy and selflessness. As the most challenging child for my parents, I was no doubt reminded of these more often than my siblings.

But being quizzical, in time I discovered that attending my Methodist Sunday School was not the only road to practicing one's faith.

For example, late one Sunday night, at about age eight, I discovered a radio broadcast from the Apostolic Faith Tabernacle here in Portland where "Jesus, (is) The Light of the World". A charismatic preacher, and shout-outs of "Amen" and "Praise the Lord" evolved into enthusiastic gospel hymns. My secret discovery was revisited time and again. It was unfamiliar yet mesmerizing.

I also discovered early Sunday morning TV evangelists. Oral Roberts' tent meetings fascinated me. Sweating profusely he performed charismatic hands-on "healing" time and time again. Channeling Jesus, the blind could now see, the crippled could now walk, "for those who believed in Our Lord and Savior." What greater sign of faith was that? But really? While it was vivid entertainment, it also created skepticism.

By High School, church became optional and there were no parental dispute when each of us chose to drop away. We had plenty of other teenage distractions.

For the next 30 years I only attended church for weddings or funerals. By the late 60's my faith journey was to intentionally challenge those family-valued Protestant ethics. Of course my mother had no hesitation reminding me of what they were.

In the late 70's I discovered seeking inner strength and inner understanding was critical to professional and personal success. It was the era of numerous self-help movements. My faith journey turned inward and it was "all about me." Through counseling I became a Psychodrama junkie. I moved on to EST, and eventually Context. All these were very much self-focused; a lot of "me, me, me" and not much about others. By following this journey, Scientology could have been next on the next horizon.

However, when our children were about six and eight, we decided they were entitled to formal religious exposure. While "church shopping" a work colleague invited us to Valley. The pews were full, the sermon was life-relevant, and the music was familiar "comfort food." It was communion Sunday and the congregation all sang the Malotte Lord's Prayer. That closed the deal! The journey was over, and yet just beginning.

After years of religious ambiguity, it was a new experience to commit to faith; as a responsible adult and parent I was ready. I was soon baptized for the first time, became a member with my family, and invited to participate on committees, deacons and eldership. Joining the church choir was the biggest challenge, but what better way to become immersed in scriptures than through hymns and anthems.

Today it's difficult to imagine life without my Valley experience. My own unique faith journey has led me to a valued church community, friends, fellowship and confidently knowing now that when I die I will gladly and willingly let the Lord take my soul.
