Valley Welcomes the Ahmadzai Family

On December 9, 2021, our team was notified at 10:00 a.m. that an Afghan family of eight was arriving at the Portland Airport in three hours. They were coming from a military base in New Mexico where they had been living since August 24. Very quickly, we mobilized our team to buy groceries, order a meal of traditional Afghan foods, procure car seats, and drive to meet them at the airport with no time to spare! Debbie Purcell, Karen Yakymi, Glenys Craig, and Kylie Cole met the family at PDX. We were thrilled to see their excitement and happiness as they jumped up and down and said, "we are home." The Ahmadzai family consists of Dad, Fawad, and seven beautiful and well-behaved children. The children are Yousof (13 years, a boy), Zulaikha (12 years, a girl), Wahab (10 years, a boy), Tawab (7 years, a boy), Malali (5 years, a girl who prefers to be called "Bahar"), Sudaf (3 years, a girl), and Fatima (16 months, a girl).

The mother of the children died giving birth to Fatima in Afghanistan. Fawad worked as an armed guard at the US Embassy at the Kabul Airport, protecting US workers. When the Taliban took over, he had to escape with his family, leaving behind his home, all his possessions plus his extended family.

During the first 10 days, many Valley families, friends, and neighbors have stepped up to help. Janae Pyle brought treats and played with the kids along with Karen. Claudia and Wade Askew brought more treats. We verified that Fawad and the three older children have been immunized against COVID and tested the remainder of the family—all were negative. (It is still important to wear masks if you are visiting the house). We took Fawad to the Cricket store to get his cell phone activated.

John Purcell drove Fawad and the two older boys around the neighborhood to locate grocery stores, schools, playgrounds, and parks, and took him shopping for clothes. Several families from the preschool donated new clothing, strollers, a booster seat, books, and toys. Karen and Zulaikha had fun holding up clothing to see which items fit which child.

Carol Powers brought puzzles and played with the children. Frank was called in and saved the day with a toilet plunger. Carol walked with Fawad to Fred Meyer and showed him the store layout and how the aisles and item prices are marked. They shopped for groceries and she helped him navigate the checkout process, including using his gift cards. She also showed him how to operate the pedestrian signals to safely walk across a busy street. Carol spent many hours shopping and successfully found shoes to fit Fawad's feet, which are not a standard US size.

Karen and Debbie each made several visits and took the kids to play in the Valley gym and preschool playground. Pastor Robin contacted First Pres. in Newberg concerning their ministry that distributes restored bicycles to the needy—John and Jenny Hale committed to take the older kids to Newberg soon to get bicycles, helmets, and locks. David Marquis arranged an emergency visit by a plumber for a burst water pipe.

Together Women Rise



Happy New Year from Valley's Together Women Rise chapter! 2021 was a stellar year of helping to support gender equality and to give a hand up to women and girls in underserved areas around the world. The countries where the Together Women Rise grant recipients are working are: Burkina Faso, Bangladesh, Zimbabwe, India, Uganda, Guatemala, Cameroon, Dominican

Republic, Sierra Leone, Kenya, Nepal, and Rwanda.

After an extensive application process these nonprofits received grant money between the amounts of \$25,000-\$35,000 to carry on the specific program that they proposed. Some were new programs. Some were an expansion of services or locations. All impacted thousands of women and girls and their families either directly or indirectly.

Together Women Rise, thanks to the generous members in chapters all over our country, also was able to give sustaining grants to previous featured grantees that have done outstanding work and have applied for sustained funding. The countries where these nonprofits are working are: Togo, Vietnam, Tanzania, Uganda, Senegal, Malawi, Jordon, Rwanda, Guatemala, Afghanistan and Nepal. These organizations received \$75,000 spread out over three years to continue their important work.

Valley's Together Women Rise (formerly known as Dining for Women) meets on the third Sunday of every month. This coming April we will have been doing so for 10 years! We used to meet after worship to share a potluck lunch and then hear about the featured grantee. And, that has changed during this pandemic to a remote meeting on Zoom. What has not changed is that each and every meeting is informative, inspiring and enlightening. The amazing work of nonprofits is revealed and supported by the donations by Valley's members and those of the over 400 other chapters across our country.

Library Corner



Valley's Library has many resources that can be useful in your own Bible study. One, *Biblical Archeology Review*, is a periodical written by practicing archeologists. Learning about the archeology and geography of Israel and surrounding countries can deepen our understanding of biblical stories.

One article in a recent issue discusses the story of Joseph in Egypt from Genesis, Egyptian documents, and archeological findings from Avaris, a city in the east Nile delta. (It's Tell ed Dab'a if you want to find it on Google Maps.) Excavations there show artifacts, architecture, and burial practices that are Palestinian, not Egyptian. The article's conclusion is "We can sum up all this Egyptian history in a sentence or two: A group of people who originated in Canaan became rulers in Egypt, but later wound up back in Canaan, chased by the Egyptian army." So, at a high level, the biblical and Egyptian stories are the same. Even if you don't have time for a whole article, just spending a few minutes looking at photos and reading captions can be interesting. This issue shows some beautiful mosaics from the Church of the Glorious Martyr, a fifth century pilgrimage site near Jerusalem.

Chelsea and Adam Redmond, preschool parents, cooked up and delivered a home-made Afghan meal to the family and they were thrilled! Chelsea also took Fawad and three children at a time on multiple trips to the library. Chelsea put a great deal of thought and energy into creating lists of potential Christmas gifts for the family. She partnered with Ruthann Marquis in coordinating the involvement of both the preschool and the congregation in supplying those gifts. Chelsea brought her children to the gym and joined Debbie in playing active games with the kids.

Sally Rasmussen contacted the Beaverton School District to help get the kids registered for school and learn about the programs that are available to students who have a history of interrupted schooling and trauma, and programs that support non-English speakers. She and Debbie tried very hard to get registration completed before the winter break. We learned that registering and correctly placing refugee kids into school is not a simple matter and has to be coordinated with LCSNW. Sally will be the lead volunteer for all school-related issues going forward. Our goal is to support these children for success in school!

Allison Gregory and her husband, Tanner, who also live in one of the Valley rental-houses on Cedar Street, have been very supportive. They went shopping for clothing items for Fawad and the children, funded by a generous donation from one of Allison's friends.

Glenys Craig played with the children on several occasions, taught them to write their names and phone number, brought them art supplies and toys, and took them up to Raleigh Park Elementary School (where they pressed their little noses against the glass to look inside). Katie Craig went on the bus with Fawad to the Beaverton library to show him how to navigate the bus system.

The entire Ahmadzai family attended the Christmas concert on December 19. David and Ruthann cooked and shared a dinner with them afterwards.

There is a core group of leaders who will coordinate volunteer efforts for this family: Debbie Purcell, Karen Yakymi, Carol Powers, Sally Rasmussen, Glenys Craig, and Ruthann Marquis. Earth Care Corner

Happy New Year and may 2022 be an Earth Friendly Year for you and yours!

Many of us start the new year with good intentions and strong resolve to build new habits. Commonly these resolutions center around health. Here are some New Year's resolutions for you to consider making for the health of our planet, which will ultimately make a difference in your health:

- 1. Bring your own shopping bags. Shopping with reusable bags everywhere you shop is a simple way to reduce ocean pollution while helping to prevent deforestation and reduce our world's dependence on fossil fuels. There is now a monetary incentive to avoid using a bag from the stores where you shop, as they must charge you \$.05 for it! *Resolve to bring your own reusable bags when you shop.*
- 2. Use a Reusable Water Bottle. Did you know that around 60 million plastic bottles end up in landfills every single day, and Americans alone send more than 38 billion water bottles to landfills every year, the equivalent of 912 million gallons of oil. That means that 1,500 plastic bottles are thrown away every second of the day. Did you know that only 9% of plastic bottles are recycled? That means the 91% are not recycled!!!!!!Even though plastic water bottles are recyclable and will each bring back \$.10 to you pocket, their manufacturing still takes tremendous resources for materials, energy and transportation. You can resolve to prevent that by using a reusable water bottle.
- 3. Bring your block Styrofoam and plastic #6 to Valley's east parking lot on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays between 10:00-11:30 a.m. each month. Valley's Earth Care team will transport those items to Agilyx in Tigard. Tell your friends and family! If you see some Styrofoam sticking out of a neighbor's garbage or recycling bin, pull it out and bring it to Valley on our collection days. *Resolve to keep Styrofoam out of the landfills*.
- 4. Experiment with alternate modes of transportation. If possible, try walking, biking, or taking public transportation more often to decrease your carbon footprint. Even carpooling is helpful because that's one less person on the road using fuel. Resolve to make earth friendly choices for transportation.
- 5. Use cloth napkins for all of your meals, not just at special dinners. Consider carrying one in your purse or car to use when you need it during the day. If you need one for your purse or car, ask Ruthann to make one for you! *Resolve to avoid paper napkins*.
- 6. Buy Secondhand. Consider purchasing more secondhand items, whether clothing, handbags, kitchenware, home decor, etc. from a thrift store or a consignment shop. These items already exist and virgin materials won't be needed to make them again if they are re-used. Resolve to use and purchase items to give them new life.
- 7. Consider Meat-less Mondays. The resource consumption that goes into meat production and the methane gas that results from the animals are heavy burdens for our planet. Did you know that approximately 1,850 gallons of water are needed to produce a single pound of beef compared to 39 gallons of water are needed to produce a pound of vegetables? Resolve to explore Meatless Monday options and make this a new habit!
