

## P!A!T! - Praise! Awesome! Thanks!

Pastor Gordon Braun served as Senior Pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church from 1981 - 1995. In 1988 he put together a "Worship Guide" for the members of Emmanuel which explains many aspects of how Lutherans worship. Here is a segment of this Worship Guide. This is shared in hopes that it may enhance your worship life.

#### **LITURGY**

The liturgies of the church consist of the whole system of services, seasons and ceremonies. The word itself is a Greek word meaning "public work." It is the joint action of the people of God. It is how we worship when we come together as the people of God.

Everybody has a liturgy. Have you ever noticed a baseball player at bat? He takes a few practice swings. scratches out a place for his foot at the plate, hitches up his pants, pulls down his cap, and sets himself ready for the pitch. It is a little routine to help him feel ready, or a "sense of shalom" when he joins body and spirit.

Worship services in the church are liturgical. They are structured so that we may speak in one voice. Thus the services become orderly. There are forms for worship which are intended to give direction and meaning. Someone once called our regular service a step-by-step walk with God.

The form is important but ought not be the most important aspect of worship. The content far outweighs the form. One can whip up some cake batter but doesn't just put it in the oven. A cake pan is used. The pan is the form, but it is the cake you eat. Form is the key to content.

Spontaneity is also important, or liturgy becomes lethargy. The worshiper must put his/her own spontaneous content into the form for the experience of worship to be alive. As we worship we are challenged to participate. Worship calls for the best of our imagination.

Liturgies are **Biblical**. Many parts of the various services are either a direct quote or a paraphrase of a Biblical thought. Some things are done in ways similar to the "ways" of God's people of old. Devotional practices have been perpetuated because they are helpful in our life with God: prayer, singing, hearing God's word, receiving the sacrament, etc. All of liturgy is a rehearsal of "God's story." The Old Testament Passover meal rehearsed the story of God's people in suffering and God's deliverance of them.

Liturgy enhances worship. One can have a football game with only a football and a few people. But many other things can enhance the game, like a dome, a marked field, referees, a band, cheerleaders, etc. Our liturgy is designed to put our worship mood in a proper framework to receive the Word and sacrament with a believing heart.

#### WORSHIP

Worship is an occasion to be with God. It consists of a meeting and a response. God meets us in Word and Sacrament – we respond. Notice this concept in the services. As an example think of the reading of the Gospel. It is announced, we raise, it is read, we respond, "Praise be to You, O Christ."

Our most common service is called "Holy Communion" because it culminates with the sacrament. For the Sundays we do not have communion there are rubrics that indicate where and how the service continues. We also use the Service of the Word on occasion. Different musical settings are offered for the service to add variety...

We decorated them all and sampled guite a few.






The kids took some home for their families, as well as wrapped some cookies up to deliver to their neighbors. It was a fun way for the youth to contribute to the season of giving.



## **Adult Sunday School at Emmanuel Lutheran Church**

Join Pastor Daugs on Sunday mornings at 8 AM in the Fellowship Hall for Yeshua.

Yeshua, the Hebrew name for Jesus, offers a fascinatingly new view of Jesus' life. Narrated by Dr. Oswald Hoffmann, Yeshua reveals ancient customs and beliefs with a clarity and detail not afforded by unaided Bible study or by most historical treatments.

Part 1: The Land and the Promise - Ur of the Chaldees, birthplace of Abraham, begins the narrative. Continuing through the fall of Ur, Abraham's entrance into the promised land, and the exile of the chosen people in Egypt, part one ends with their return to a homeland soon taken over by Rome and governed by the wily, paranoid half-Jew, Herod.

Part 2: The Promise Takes Root - This episode begins with the angel's visit to a young woman of "Sprout" and proceeds through the presentation of Jesus in the temple at Jerusalem after the family's return from exile. Scientific data relating to the star of Bethlehem are discussed.

Part 3: Voice and the Light - The cries of John the Baptist lead into a portrayal of the community of zealous Jews at Qumran where John, orphaned as a child, may have grown up. Moving through the events of Jesus' early ministry we also witness the beautiful reenactment of a Jewish wedding as Jesus might have seen it at Cana.

Part 4: The Bread of Sacrifice - As the life of Jesus nears its tragic close. He prepares His followers with references to the coming sacrifice. We see archeological evidence for the practice of human sacrifice in caves beneath the North African city of Carthage, but draw nearer to the meaning of Christ's sacrifice in the story of Abraham's willingness to kill his son Isaac in obedience to the will of God. The segment ends with Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.

Part 5: Ripples of Darkness, Waves of Light - The familiar mysteries of Christ's death and resurrection take on a strong immediacy in this final episode. After dramatic reenactments of the torture, execution, burial and resurrection of Christ, the segment explores contemporary research on the recently discovered Shroud of Turin.

#### 2016 YEAR-END FINANCIAL REPORT

With a 2016 budget of \$363,600, that includes the roof loan, income needs to average about \$30,300 per month to meet budget. Income from the general fund in December totaled \$33,078 and expenses were \$31,484. As a result, the operating gain for December was \$1,595 and the year -end deficit total is \$27,471. We continue to carry a \$15,000 balance from our line of credit and incur about \$75 in interest expense monthly.

The balance on the roof replacement loan today is \$50,980, and our monthly payment is \$987.

This final report for 2016 was purposefully delayed so we could double check the numbers. The budget that was approved in at the November annual meeting will be brought forward at the March 5 regular congregation meeting for further discussion and ratification. We believe this would be a good time to further discuss financial priorities for the coming year.

As your treasurers, we continue to be in awe of your steady and generous support of Emmanuel and its vital missions.



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#### How Do Congregations Respond to Interfaith Couples?

Beth Parab is an Episcopal priest. Her husband, Sameer, is an observant Hindu. Their first date lasted eight hours, stretching from coffee to dinner to a walk on the beach. And very soon afterward, she had to start thinking seriously about whether interfaith marriage was a possibility for her.

As the world becomes more interconnected and more people's religious identities are in flux, couples who hold different beliefs are becoming common in the pews of almost every religious institution. And pastors and members need to adjust to those realities. "The issue now is for churches to acknowledge that there are interfaith couples in their midst," said Susan Katz Miller, author of *Being Both.* "You want to be as welcoming as possible if you want families to stay." Miller has seen an institutional shift toward understanding that interfaith marriage is happening, with or without the participation of churches, and she asserts "it's not a problem to be overcome."

While Christian-Jewish may be most people's first association for "interfaith," as the population of "nones" grows, the most common pairing is actually a Christian and a nonbeliever—and the clash between belief and unbelief can be more difficult than the clash of belief in different things. However, people with different beliefs can be happily married if their values are closely aligned, said Dale McGowan, author of *In Faith and in Doubt*, 2 a book about marriage between believers and nonbelievers. The reverse is much harder; a conservative and a liberal from the same denomination are more likely to have problems, because theological questions tend to be less of an issue than everyday values.

#### Issues Interfaith Couples Face

While there are often struggles regarding faith traditions and practices faced within an interfaith marriage, the greater struggles come from outside the relationship. Judgmental family members. Often, more than the couple or the congregation, extended family proves to be the sticking point. When Libby Yoskowitz of Huntington, NY, got engaged to a Jewish man, her conservative Presbyterian parents "definitely went through a process to get to the point where they were OK with it." Over time, Jack Yoskowitz has become more of a cultural than religious Jew. All three of their children were confirmed as teens, and none expressed interest in a bar or bat mitzvah. But the family celebrates all Jewish holidays, and Libby Yoskowitz said that the exposure has enriched her own faith. Particularly at Maundy Thursday and Passover services, she thinks about the common roots of Christianity and Judaism.

Unwelcoming congregations. McGowan, an atheist, used to go with his wife to her Baptist church until one Sunday when the pastor specifically attacked marriage to unbelievers; basically he felt that "[the pastor] was asking my wife to leave me." Similarly,

Sameer Parab no longer attends church after a toxic experience—the congregation of his wife's liberal Episcopal church refused to allow an interfaith group to rent a meeting room on Saturdays.

Fear of confusing the children. A common worry about exposing children to two faiths is that they will feel confused, but Miller discounts that. "To give them as much information as possible is a gift," she said. In the extensive interviews she did for her book, adults never wished they'd had less information as children, but often spoke of wishing they'd had more.

#### How Faith Communities Can Respond

In shrinking mainline churches, interfaith families might easily be seen as a prize in a competition, or as a resource that might be lost. But Miller suggests that pastors talk to the other religious leaders in an interfaith couple's life, with the goal of strengthening all relationships, within the family and outside.

Indeed, some churches are being proactive. Last year, St. Elisabeth's Episcopal Church in Glencoe, IL, a Chicago suburb with a large Jewish population, ran a program for interfaith families in conjunction with a synagogue and learned that they needed a meeting space that was neither Christian nor Jewish, plus some kind of shared worship element. "I can't guarantee that everyone's going to be comfortable with me," said pastor Daphne Cody, "I've had to come to peace with that." Every week at Communion, Cody specifies that "all are welcome, regardless of religious background," but even that receives varying responses. Some Jewish spouses feel they need permission to take it; some feel they need permission not to take it. Her congregation has added some elements, such as a psalm that they have learned to say in Hebrew. But "Jesus is the cornerstone of Christianity," she said. "We want people to participate as they're comfortable, but we're not going to take Jesus out."

If a pastor tells a nonreligious spouse that they're always welcome at church, "it will almost always be heard as an attempt to proselytize," McGowan said. Pastors need language that explicitly assures people that's not the case. "You've got to be clear, or it will be assumed to be something else," McGowan said. Some nonreligious people come with memories of bad experiences. That is particularly true of conservative churches, he said, where "for a lot of people, it's a reminder of something they left." Thomas Beaudoin,

an associate professor of theology at Fordham University, agreed that in a conservative congregation, interfaith relationships can produce more anxiety. Non-judgmental sharing of experiences, on both sides, is a path forward, but "you can't get there cheaply." He suggested that church members "try to tell the story of how you came to understand the center of your faith the way you do." Beaudoin speculates that people who have loose affiliations to their faith are more likely to marry outside it—but as it is, churches are "having a hard enough time holding Christian-Christian couples."

"You should always be open to conversation," said Jeren Rowell, Kansas City district superintendent for the Church of the Nazarene. Many interfaith conversations, he said, find "quite a bit that would connect us, more than what would divide us." In fact, in most Nazarene families, a child chooses to be baptized when he or she is ready, which can lead to constructive dialogue. The non-participating spouse, Rowell said, needs to reach "a place of comfort, that [the church] has the best interest of the child in mind."

Welcoming a spouse from another tradition or no tradition succeeds "because we don't make a big deal out of it," Rowell said. "You begin at the point of just offering friendship."

For Miller, who grew up in and married into an interfaith family, "it has inspired creativity, the idea of bridge-building and peace-making." Even without the marriage factor, people do frequently change denominational identities and move from one faith or church to another. "Some people would say that every marriage is an interfaith marriage," she said.

#### Embracing One Family of Different Faiths

How does our congregation respond to interfaith couples and families consistent with our theology and values as well as respect for people who hold different beliefs? What would true acceptance look like? What are the benefits or rewards for our congregation when we interact with other faith communities?

# How ASDA Service Dogs Help Children With Autism



Our service dogs are trained to provide deep pressure therapy on command to help reduce anxiety and avoid meltdowns.
- Provide Tactile Stimulation to Disrupt a
   Sensory Overload Tasks that can provide
   a tactile distraction from autistic behaviors
   have proven to be quite useful in sensory
   overload situations. Service dogs are
   trained to get up on command or with a
   cue like patting one's knee and use their
   nose to nudge the child, which disrupts
   sudden overload.




