Pastor Gordon Braun served as Senior Pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church from 1981 - 1995. In 1988 he put together a "Worship Guide" for the members of Emmanuel which explains many aspects of how Lutherans worship. Here is a segment of this Worship Guide. In our March issue, we continued with an explanation of our Worship service. We move forward with a few more aspects of this. This is shared in hopes that it may enhance your worship life.

<u>Absolution</u> is God's word of forgiveness. Confession is not complete without it. The Pastor as God's spokesman declares the word of forgiveness. Check John 20:21-23, Romans 5:18 and John 1:12 for the basis of this.

The <u>minister greets</u> the congregation with the common New Testament greeting as found in 2 Cor. 13:14. "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of god and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all." This is one of the practices and traditions that takes us back to and ties us with the Biblical times of God's people.

Kyrie is a Greek word that means "Lord." This portion of the service is a series of short sentence prayers followed by the response "Lord have mercy" which is like saying "Lord, hear our prayer." Each petition is general in nature. It is up to the worshipper to put his/ her own personal content into the prayer as when we pray for the "peace of the whole world" you might think of one of the war-torn parts of the world or someone in the armed forces.

The Kyrie and <u>hymn of praise</u> belong together for the concept comes from the story of ten lepers who were healed by Jesus (Luke 17:11-19). They cried to Jesus for help. He healed them. One came back and praised Him with a loud voice.

In the Lutheran Book of Worship there are two hymns of praise. The first one is used on the non-communion Sundays. The second is referred to as "<u>This is the Feast</u>" from the first words in the hymn and is used on communion Sundays.

"Glory to God in the highest and peace to His people on earth" is the <u>song of praise</u> the angles sang to the shepherds on the first Christmas (Luke 2:14). The remainder is a combination of Biblical thoughts praising Father, Son and Holy Spirit (Psalm 24:7, Psalm 95, John 3:16, John 1:29, Hebrews 1:3, Isaiah 45:15, Acts 4:12, Romans 11:36).

Many of the thoughts in "This is the Feast" <u>come from</u> the book of Revelations 5:13, 7:14, 19:1, 22:1-5. "The Lord be with you. And also with you" can be found in Ruth 2:4. This is a mutual prayer between the pastor and congregation which is followed by the prayer of the day. This is a short sentence prayer summarizing the thoughts of the scripture lessons which follow.

At this point the <u>service changes</u>. We have been mostly speaking to God in confession, prayer, and praise. Now He speaks to us through His Word. Portions from four key parts of the Bible are read: Old Testament, Psalms, New Testament letters and the Gospel. The highlight is the Gospel, for which we rise, out of reverence for Christ's own words or a story intimately connected with Him.

Singing the <u>Psalms</u> has become a part of our service since the publishing of the Lutheran Book of Worship. They have been specially translated for this. The red markings indicate the point where the tone changes. Singing psalms is an acient Hebrew practice dating back to their origin.

Jesus was teaching the people (John 6). Some didn't like what they heard and began to walk away. Jesus turned to His disciples and said "Will you also leave me?" Peter said, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." We sing that as a response to the second lesson but it really expresses our attitude toward all scripture: It is the word of life. During Lent a somber response is sung based on Psalm 34:6 and Psalm 145:8-9.

The <u>sermon</u> is a proclamation of God's Word to God's people. It is usually based on one of the scripture readings for the day or a combination of them. Do not come to church only to hear the sermon. If you do, you may often be disappointed. Come to worship. You will never be disappointed.



How to Make a Palm Frond Cross

On the Sunday before Easter, many Christians celebrate Palm Sunday. Recalling the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem, churches distribute palm leaves in remembrance of people who waved them and carpeted his path with them. One of the things you can do with these palm leaves is to fold them into crosses. These are great to give out as little gifts or hide as secret presents!

Steps:



- 1. Gently tear or snap off a palm blade off the palm stalk. The type of palm doesn't matter provided it bends easily; just test its give before snipping and keep testing until you find blades that are adequately flexible.
- 2. Hold the palm blade pointy side up.



- 3. Fold the blade to the right to make a 90 degree angle.
- 4. Fold down once. Then, fold down again. You should now have a small square shape.
- 5. Push the pointy end around the back of the square and fold over.
- 6. Take the pointy end on the left, and loop it towards you without making any turns. Then:

•Push then pull the pointy end through the square until it comes out of the square.

•Pull through all the way.







7. Hold onto the square with one hand and tug on the fat and pointed ends to secure it. You should now have a locked 90 degree angle.



- 8. Take the pointy end and turning it towards yourself, push through the square. This is the head and base of the cross.
- 9. Turn 45 degrees to where the pointy end is facing downward and the fat end is facing to your right.



10. Flip it so that the fat end is now on your left.



11. Take the fat end and loop it away from you into the square. Pull it until it reaches about the same length as the head.

12. Turn it over to where the straight fat end faces left again.



13. Take the fat end and loop it towards you back into the square. Pull until it is about the same length as the other two parts. Be sure to



tuck it inside the other loop so that you can't see it. You're done!



14. Finished.

JESUS IS **RISEN!**


When Jesus' disciples saw that the stone was rolled away from his tomb, they knew he had risen. Make a moveable tomb to celebrate Easter.

What you need:

- 4 pieces of paper (brown, blue, black, yellow)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Brad fastener
- Marker

What you do:

- Fold the brown paper in half, short side to short side. Cut along the fold. On one half, draw and cut out a large half-circle (the tomb). On the other, draw and cut out a palmsized circle (the stone).
- 2. Glue the brown tomb onto the blue paper.
- 3. Cut a black circle (the inside of the tomb) the same size as the brown stone and glue it onto the brown tomb.
- 4. Place the brown stone over the black half-circle; this is the entrance. Push the brad through one edge so the stone can move from side to side.
- 5. Cut out a cross from the yellow paper and glue it by the tomb.
- 6. Write "Jesus is risen!" atop the blue paper.

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SMALL IS BIG AGAIN: RECLAIMING SMALL CHURCH MINISTRY

Although megachurches garner a great deal of attention, these supersized congregations comprise only a small fraction of all worshiping communities in the U.S. The current estimate is that only about 1,650 megachurches (worship attendance exceeds 2,000) dot the landscape out of a total 330,000 congregations across America. In fact, most churches are small: two out of three Protestant churches attract less than 100 worshipers in a typical week. Some scholars predicted that megachurches would essentially put small churches out of business. But the percentage of large churches as part of all churches is growing slowly while the number of small churches has remained stable. While the church's larger mission continues to be carried out by many small worshiping communities, small churches may get locked into self-criticism. However, more congregations are embracing the strengths associated with their small size. As one congregation proclaims: "We're not just any small church. We're the small church that's here!"1

What Do Small Churches Need?

Lewis Parks, a champion of small congregations, claims that they can do big things with "a little cooperation with the Spirit on the part of those gathered, a little striving for excellence, a little freedom to express local religious creativity, and all things sprinkled with lots of hospitality"² A few other suggestions include the following:

A compelling story about their history, purpose, and mission. Members often possess a common narrative about when and why the church was established and some specifics of that particular historical period. But fewer members know the chapters in the church's history. For example, which pastors or lay leaders exerted a major influence in embracing new mission or overcoming risks? What community events (such as rapid population growth, departure of a major employer) affected the church in a major way? How do members describe the current chapter in the church's narrative? Too often, the church's story that clearly reveals the congregation's ongoing ministry remains implicit. When members share greater awareness of the church's mission and history (how did we get here?), they gain greater clarity about the congregation's unique identity. Consider engaging members in an exercise that surfaces the church's history, experiences, traditions, and untested assumptions.³ Then, create a vision statement that captures these insights and use it on your website, with social media, and other church communications.

Intentional efforts to increase visibility. Effective approaches are size-specific. Every small church can creatively send the message to newcomers and the community—"we are here, we care about you, and we welcome you!" An electronic presence (website, Facebook, Instagram) establishes a virtual welcome mat. A well-maintained and lighted church building signals a physical "home" that anticipates visitors.

Participation by members and leaders in community events suggests commitment to the well-being of neighbors. Hosting community events, speakers, workshops, and the arts indicates that the church is a willing partner in promoting their neighbors' quality of life.⁴ Form a team of six members to test the congregation's visibility by instructing them to approach five people they do not know. Next, have these members inquire: "Have you ever heard of (the name of your church)? What do you know about it (for example, location, programs, etc.)?" Reconvene these volunteers and share the results. Based on what you learn, devise one or two new action steps to increase the congregation's community profile.

Customized methods for outreach. Context is everything when developing strategies to welcome newcomers. Would your community be described as active or sedentary, family- or career-focused, a stable or mobile population? A family-focused and stable community is more likely to respond to family and friend networks. If a population is career-focused and mobile, investments in electronic and social media will likely pay dividends. Have leaders discuss the key characteristics of the church's community five years ago, currently, five years from now, and ten years in the future.⁵ Refine the church's strategies based on these observed changes.

Purposeful efforts to pass along the faith to future generations. Following the words of Robert Schuller, congregations should view faith development as planting seeds: "Anyone can count the seeds in an apple, but only God can count the number of apples in a seed." Research shows that when congregations value nurturing faith in children and young adults, that emphasis and their hard work bears fruit. How does the church measure success in this ministry area?

Seed-planting congregations in this way also make ministry with millennials a priority. Parks makes a convincing argument that small churches are best suited for reaching out to this age group—adults born between 1981 and 1996.⁶ Millennials' life experiences differ greatly from previous generations and one in three are religiously unaffiliated.⁷ They were more likely to be raised in a nontraditional family and are more culturally diverse than past cohorts. Despite growing up in an online world, they place a high value on friendships and relationships. Small churches offer them the unique opportunity for intimacy and caring relationships. They are looking for safe spaces for themselves and their children. Review the demographics within a fifteen-mile radius of the congregation to determine the age profiles of residents and to create updated strategies to reach unrepresented groups.

Accept reality and build on strengths. Garrison Keillor famously said: "I believe in looking reality straight in the eye and denying it." Small churches cannot afford to deny reality. Leaders can accept the things that cannot be changed while identifying the advantages that small size affords. Sometimes, cherished programs or even the church building have to be sacrificed in order for the congregation's future mission to thrive. Consider a four-session group study to discover new insights for small-church ministry.⁸

Making Small Big Again

Margaret Mead's statement inspired many in earlier generations: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has." A parallel truth applies to congregations. Never doubt that small churches have changed the world and they will continue to do so.
