To God You Shall Return

The traditional Ash Wednesday words "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" might seem depressing. But in our often death-denying culture, some might find it refreshing to hear the frank statement that we can do nothing to save ourselves, physically or spiritually — that, no matter how we try to avoid sin, we can't untangle ourselves from self-interest. How liberating, then, to know we don't have to! God loves us as we are and sent Jesus to break sin's power over us.

A pastor described Ash Wednesday as the point you can pinch in the middle of a long piece of ribbon, such that when you lift it high, the two ends — one symbolizing our baptism and the other, our funeral — meet and touch. We come from dust and will return to dust, but we also come from God and will return to God. Ash Wednesday reminds us that we're always safe in God's love.

Message from the President

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Looking outside my window it is difficult to believe it is almost March – there is over a foot of snow on my back deck. But Lent is about to begin and with it our contemplation of Christ’s suffering and resurrection. Lent is a seemingly counter-intuitive time, as we grieve our Lord’s suffering that takes Him to the cross, and yet celebrate the joy our Lord’s suffering brings us through His resurrection. Lent is a powerful time to consider what it means for each of us and for our congregation to be in mission to the world, and who our ministry should serve to bring God’s presence to all those in this world.

Yesterday was our first Congregational Meeting of 2019. We experienced deep gratitude in learning that through God’s abundant gifts we had a positive end to our financial year in 2018. We ratified the Spending Plan adopted at the Annual Meeting in December confirming our roadmap for our financial goals and mission in the coming year.

We heard of disappointment among some members regarding how our support for Lutheran Campus Ministry has been eliminated. How we, as a congregation, decide what mission and ministries to support is among the most important conversations we can have as the Body of Christ. Indeed, the Stewardship Mission Group, at the request of Council, is organizing a series of small group discussions over the next 6-8 weeks at which members can share their thoughts, dreams, and concerns regarding the ministries and missions of Emmanuel. We have strong ministries to our youth, to the to our youth and community through our Preschool, to the wider community and world through Mission Endowment, and in many other smaller ways. We have redirected some of our resources to these ministries and away from other ministries, such as Lutheran Campus Ministry. Council over the past 5-6 years has led the Congregation in these decisions. It is critical THAT THE CONGREGATION WEIGH IN WITH ITS THOUGHTS

and give guidance about what the members believe is God’s plan for Emmanuel. Only with input from our members can Council reflect better the mission and ministry God has planned for us. So PLEASE, in the next week or two sign up to participate in these small group discussions. Come and share what you think God has planned for Emmanuel.

The LOTTs Mission Group is continuing its work looking into possibilities for how the property across Peterson Street can best serve the mission of Emmanuel. It will continue to work to gather information and formulate proposals for the Congregation’s consideration. The good news is that we have learned that the property is suitable for most any kind of development, whether by Emmanuel or another party, should the Congregation decide to sell the property. It will take time, thought, and planning to get LOTTs and Council in a position to make recommendations to the Congregation, but we will keep you all informed as we move along. PLEASE if you have questions or concerns reach out to anyone on Council or LOTTs and we will do everything we can to get you answers.

All the snow of the last few weeks may have slowed things down, but God continues to move us forward. God has richly blessed Emmanuel with the hearts and minds of you all – the faithful people of Emmanuel! I give thanks for you each day, and I look forward to engaging with you in our small groups as together we seek to discern what God’s plan for us is going forward!


Hello Wonderful Emmanuel Friends!

You may have noticed our Mid-Week Lenten worship schedule on the cover page. Our devotion topics sound quite interesting and thought provoking! (See more on this study series on page 8.) Make sure and get here for some delicious grub before devotions too! Our Mid-Week Lenten Suppers will begin on Wednesdays at 5:30 PM, with devotions starting around 6 PM. Huge thank you to our supper hosts: Pastor Daugs (Pizza Night! - 3/13), Choir & Bells (3/20), Church Council (3/27), Youth & Preschool (4/3), The Men of ELC (4/10).

Lent is always a gi-normously busy time around our church home (gigantic + enormous = gi-normous 😊) and help is always needed and appreciated. A few areas you might want to explore and possibly “get your hands dirty” in are:

- The altar guild needs one or two new folks (men and women are welcome) to prepare for communion and clean up after church. You will be given as much training as you want and no special skills are required except the desire to serve! Contact Deb Dumroese in church or by email (dumroese@moscow.com) for more information.
- Here is a place you can literally “get your hands dirty”! Let’s face it... the snow is going to eventually go away! Under all that snow will probably be a huge mess that will need to get cleaned up and continued to be maintained. We have a great program where you can “Adopt a Flower Bed” here at ELC. Here is how it works: The church grounds have been divided up into 12 areas all ready for a family... group... couple... individual... to adopt! Choose a bed from the Adopt a Flower Bed Map posted on the bulletin board in the Fellowship hall and fill in the requested

information under your chosen area number. As time and weather allow, care for your chosen area by pulling weeds, picking up trash, and generally making it look nice. It’s that simple! You will be responsible for your area until spring of next year (or you contact the church office and release your interest in the plot.) Next spring you can choose to adopt your same area, pick a different plot, or give someone else a turn. Here is how the grounds are divided up:







Pastor's Discretionary Fund



The Pastor's Discretionary Fund is used by the Pastor to assist individuals and families that are in need. Most often it is used to assist people who stop by the church office and request assistance for basic needs. Community organizations may also refer to Pastor, persons who need assistance. Pastor investigates each case by checking in with the Sheriff's Office and or Latah County Social Services both of which share a common data base that can spot repeating requests and persons to keep an eye on. These requests to the Pastor's Discretionary fund may be:



- ◆ They are homeless and need a place to stay for a night or two. *The fund can provide temporary hotel housing for up to 3 nights while other arrangements are being made. Pastor will assist these people in connecting with local resources. Most people may receive housing assistance up to 2 times per year, however circumstances and situations may direct more assistance...especially when there are children involved.*

- ◆ They may need assistance with utilities that are about to be denied. *Pastor calls the utility provider and helps to set up a payment plan that includes an initial payment from the Discretionary Fund.*



- ◆ They are traveling through town and need gasoline or vehicle repairs so they can continue to their destination. *Their personal resources are depleted. Pastor assists them in purchasing fuel or finding a mechanic who can repair their vehicle for a reasonable rate.*

- ◆ People need to see a doctor or need medicine. *Pastor uses the Moscow Clinic to provide these services. They may need a prescription filled and this is done through Rosauers Pharmacy.*




- ◆ People may need food. *They are connected with our local food bank and/or food is given from our ELC kitchen surplus or is purchased by Pastor.*

- ◆ Preschool families sometimes need assistance with, rent, utilities, food, medicine, clothing or tuition.



ELC has the gracious ministry of "loaves and fishes," assisting people with their most basic needs. This is a very "hands on" ministry through our Pastor.

MEDIA TECHNOLOGY FOR WORSHIP

Recent advances in media technology have brought sweeping changes to many aspects of everyday life, including church. In 2012, 35 percent of US congregations were using video projection equipment, a number that has surely increased since that time.¹ Using technology to enhance the ministry and message of your congregation takes practice, but with some planning and intentional effort, you can reap great benefits.

New Technologies Expand Options

Media technology has increased the options for making worship more visually accessible and inviting. Worship leaders may project song lyrics on a screen in order to free worshippers from the use of hymnals or show a single graphic design to illustrate the worship service's central theme. Preachers may display the sermon's key points to make it easier to follow or include a video clip instead of telling a story orally. Churches that have the resources or in-house volunteer talent may develop their own videos or project the image of the preacher and the band on multiple screens using image magnification so that worshippers can see their faces close up.²

How to Get Started

To get started, assemble a worship design team that includes the preacher and a variety of creative and technically oriented individuals. "Creatives" could be professionals in the arts, but also anyone who reads or is involved with art in the community, writes or crafts as a hobby, or watches movies for enjoyment. "Techies" could include professionals or anyone able to work with or willing to learn computers, projectors, digital cameras, or video cameras.

To arrive at a visual metaphor for the sermon and worship service, team members can look individually and collectively to television, movies, and the internet for tangible objects or events that become the basis for the primary metaphor of the day. One method is to first develop a single idea as the focus and then search for

an image that communicates it. Brainstorming with the small group can often be the most effective way to arrive at this.³

Ultimately, effective worship design requires attention not only to technology but the use of metaphor. Metaphor, the "tangible representation of an abstract idea," has long been used in the language of sermons and written prayers. By using media technology, worship designers can represent this metaphor visually. Len Wilson, a worship consultant, thinks it's helpful to make a distinction between the theme, the main message that worship leaders want to get across, and the metaphor itself, which can be visually represented by an object or a combination of text and object.⁴

"This Is Hard Work!"

Developing computer graphics and videos for worship can be time consuming. It takes about five to ten hours to produce basic graphics, including announcements, song lyrics, Scripture lessons, and images to illustrate the sermon. Developing a video from scratch takes even longer. A video with simple graphics and no special effects takes about ten to fifteen hours per



finished minute to produce, not counting time spent brainstorming. Luckily, videos must be brief: one minute for most topics, three minutes for special projects, and five minutes maximum.⁵ Doing media projects on a regular basis for worship can be compared to riding a roller coaster. Once the work on a project finishes and the team is ready to breathe a sigh of relief, they are asked to do something else, and the excitement and fear begin again.⁶

While it can be challenging to develop and implement new ideas week after week, advance planning can help. Worship teams can lay out a detailed, color-coded production schedule using an Excel spreadsheet and assign a different project to each color. Note the person responsible to carry it out and keep track of deadlines. Update weekly if necessary.

Creative Ways to Expand the Media Palette

A common trap is to think of the projection screen primarily as a place for printed words such as song lyrics or announcements, rather than thinking of visual imagery as important in its own right. Here are several ways to expand the “media palette” in worship and beyond.

- Instead of leaving the screen empty between song sets or announcements, revert to a default image such as the worship service’s central graphic, allowing worshippers to meditate on its meaning.
- At the beginning of the service, consider projecting a series of still images in a continuous loop for worshippers waiting for the service to begin, a technique borrowed from movie theaters.
- Design an image as a visual representation of the Scripture lesson. For example, to illustrate the story of Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch on the road to Jerusalem, one worship team created an image of a long road leading to a city far off in the distance. In gazing at the image, worshippers could imagine themselves in the story during the Scripture reading and throughout the service.⁷
- Outside of worship, images and videos can be used as a visual marketing tool in the church’s social media and website presence, ensuring that the work is being put to full use.

Pitching a Tent in Electronic Culture

Some people may object that media technology in worship represents an attempt to be relevant at all costs. Yet

Tex Sample, who lectures widely on the church and popular culture, points out that Jesus accommodated himself to contemporary culture by using the vernacular language of Aramaic and telling parables, though he also selectively resisted the culture by breaking purity code to heal persons who were thought to be impure. In this way “the Word became flesh and lived among us” (John 1:14), with the Greek word translated “to live” meaning “to live or camp in a tent” or “to pitch or inhabit a tent.” In a similar way, the church can “pitch its tent” in an electronic culture by using sound, video, and lighting practices taken from the entertainment industry without being crass or shallow.⁸


