Saturday Break-Out Session: Topics and Presenters

Gratitude in Our Lives – The Shape of a Practice with Diana Butler Bass

In a weekend of lectures and conversations, Diana Butler Bass explores gratitude as a personal spiritual practice and a communal one as well. As being grateful changes our own lives, it also holds the possibility of changing the heart of our communities. Although it seems hard to be grateful in these particular days, it is when thankfulness seems furthest away that we need it most.

Understanding Cultural Diversity Through Literature with Dr. Carol J. Nelson

We live in a diverse society. How can we better understand this society especially for our children? This presentation will introduce you to a variety of children and adult literature that will help you navigate our diverse culture. Presented by a professor who taught children's literature for over 15 years, Dr. Nelson will introduce a number of books to share with family including suggestions for how to apply the insights these books contain. The age range of the books include children through adults.

Dr. Carol J. Nelson, professor emeritus of Lewis Clark State College, is a graduate of both Washington State University and University of Idaho. She taught for both University of Idaho and Lewis Clark State College retiring after 34 years in public school education. She and her husband Steve have been members of Emmanuel Lutheran Church for over 50 years.

HOLY WATER - The Care of this Most Precious Resource with Jon Kimberling

The Bible includes more than 700 references to the word water. It comes up in the second verse of Genesis. In John 3 we read: *I tell you for certain that before you can get into God's kingdom, you must be born not only by water, but by the Spirit.* Fast forward to today, you turn on the tap and cold refreshing water instantly runs from the tap. Yet millions on our planet spend most of their day hauling potable water just to survive. Let's talk about the important role our church communities play in safeguarding this most precious resource.

Jon Kimberling is a long-time member of Emmanuel and the cofounder of the Palouse Basin Water Summit.

Are Strangers Welcome? Biblical Perspectives on Inclusion and Exclusion with Dr. Kurt Queller

How do God's people relate to strangers? Biblical purity codes establish Israel as a people separate from the rest—yet they are commanded to "love the alien as yourself," making no distinction between citizens and immigrants. The New Testament sees a fulfilment of Isaiah's prophecies in its welcome to people of all ethnicities, as well as to sexual minorities and other traditionally excluded groups. Explore with Dr. Kurt Queller how this biblical dynamic of separateness vs. inclusion works, and how it challenges us today.

Dr. Queller is a linguist and biblical scholar, whose publications include studies of gospel miracle stories. He is currently writing a book on *The Son of Man's Authority in Mark's Gospel*.

What in the World are You Doing? Having Gratitude for Mother Earth. with Deb and Kas Dumroese

In the Creation story, God told Adam and Eve, "I am putting you in charge of the fish, the birds, and all the wild animals" (Good News Translation). What does it mean to be in charge of the environment? How can a feeling of gratitude for nature help us with God's charge? Come explore those questions with us.

Deb and Kas Dumroese are research scientists with the US Forest Service. Their research on soil health (Deb) and reforestation (Kas) takes them to study plots and conferences around the world.

Rethinking Stewardship with Pastor Bob Kenyon

Ever thought about "rethinking stewardship?" Luther Seminary did in 2013, and this session will bring you some of the information they shared with us. Good useable tools like:

- Consumerism and stewardship: What 2 goals are at the top of every CEO's core values list? What do Sabbath and stewardship have in common?
- Connecting faith and finances: We belong to a good, generous loving merciful God! Just preach that! What should be the place of Sabbath...at the end of the week or beginning?
- Redefining three questions every estate planner asks.

In video as well as handouts, this session will attempt to help you rethink stewardship.

Bridgebuilder with Pastor David Daugs

A structured process for helping congregations in times of transition and tension.

The Latin words **pons** and **facio** mean a bridgebuilder. A **Pontifex**, signifying a priest, is one who draws sides together and connects people to one another. The Bridgebuilder process is a way to move beyond anxiety to clarity, to focus on resources rather than deficits, and to create a clear future instead of remaining mired in confusion.

The primary Bridgebuilders are the people of the congregation who are most in the position to effect decisions, changes, and direction. A French proverb says, "Change is a door that can be opened only from the inside." Bridgebuilder is a way to help this happen. "Organizations grow under pressure, when a change or a crisis reveals new strengths from all quarters" (Max Dupree). It is about staying connected and living in the future.

Pastor David Daugs has served as an ordained ELCA clergy for 34 years. He has been trained in the Bridgebuilder process and has taught it for the past 25 years. He currently serves Emmanuel in Moscow, Idaho. Pastor Daugs has ministered in a variety of settings, especially congregations that are stuck, or in a state of crisis or high anxiety.
