

#### **Adult Studies for Advent** A Study of the Advent Bible Texts

Beginning on Sunday, November 30, and continuing for the Sundays of Advent in December, you are invited to consider the Bible Texts for the Season of Advent. Classes meet each Sunday, at 8:30AM in the Fellowship Hall, and will be led by Jack Kelly.

Advent – the season of "the Coming of the Lord." Historically the "Coming of the Lord" has been considered with three emphases – the coming in the past (the Incarnation of Jesus Christ); the constant coming in the present (experienced in the presence of the Holy Spirit and in the Sacrament of Holy Communion); and the future coming (the "Second Coming of Christ"). The Bible Texts for Advent each speak in one way or another of these "Comings."

If you look at the Prayers of the Day (Collects) for the Season (ELW – worship book – Series B, pages 18, 19), you'll notice the emphasis on Coming. Two of the prayers beseech the Lord to "Stir up your power and come...," while two address the Lord on behalf of the People of God: "Stir up our hearts...;" "Stir up the wills of your people..."

I hope you'll join us for these discussions during the Sundays of Advent. Bring your Bible with you – ready to mark it up!!



#### From Pastor's Desk...

"Stir up your power, Lord Christ and come."

(ELW prayer of the day Advent 1B,p. 18)

"Hark the glad sound! The Savior comes, the Savior promised long; let every heart prepare a throne and every voice a song."

(ELW 239)

The season of Advent is upon us. The hymns of this season bring lyric, rhyme and scripture to song. The Old Testament prophets proclaimed the coming of the Messiah and we can hear their words in the great hymns of our church.

"O Lord, how shall I meet you, how welcome you aright? Your people long to greet you, my hope, my heart's delight!" (ELW 241)

The expectation of the prophets. The winged song of the angels. The shepherds paying homage with fear and story. Mary pondering all these things in her heart gives to us a child's anticipation in our Advent watching.

"Rejoice, rejoice, believers, and let your lights appear; the evening is advancing, and darker night is near. The bridegroom is arising and soon is drawing nigh, Up, pray and watch and wrestle; at midnight comes the cry."

(ELW 244)

As the days grow colder, darker, cloudier, drearier and wintry, the Advent Hymns call us in another direction. They remind us that there is someone who is mightier than seasonal and personal darkness. He will break apart all bondage to sin and death. "...A savior is born to you; he is Christ the Savior," (Luke 2:11) We long for his light that shines.....

"As the darkness waits the dawn, so we await your light. O star of promise, scatter night, loving bright, loving bright, till shades of fear are gone."

"Shine your future on this place, enlighten every guest, that through us stream your holiness, bright and blest, bright and blest; come dawn, O Sun of grace."

(ELW 261)



Advent greatly anticipates the "Sun of grace." Advent has a highly expectant nature to it that calls us to shape our days with scripture, advent calendars, daily advent devotions and readings, family time that is distinctly separate from the commercialized rush, special Advent cookies, cooking special or traditional foods, smorgasbords and Christmas programs. This expectant shaping points our hearts and minds to one thing.....

"Come thou long expected Jesus, born to set thy people free; from our fears and sins release us; let us find our rest in thee.

Israel's strength and consolation, hope of all the earth thou art, dear desire of every nation, joy of every longing heart."

(ELW 254)

"Joy to the world, the Lord is come!

Let earth receive her King;

let every heart prepare him room

and heav'n and nature sing,

and heav'n and nature sing,

and heav'n and nature sing."



#### Remembering Dallas Lundgren

Dallas Lundgren, a life-long Moscow-area resident, died Tuesday, November 11, 2014 at the family home in Moscow. He was 49.

Dallas was born February 14, 1965 in Moscow to Kenneth and Dorothy Lundgren. His mother passed away in 2009 and his father in 2013. Dallas was the beloved grandson of Delbert and Annie Osborn. Dallas is survived by a brother, Gary, of Minneapolis, MN, an uncle and aunt, Virgil and Patricia Lundgren of Lewiston, and several cousins.

A 1983 Moscow High School graduate, Dallas earned a degree in automotive mechanics technology from Lewis-Clark State College in 1985.

Dallas married Shelly Rodrigues in November, 1991. The couple divorced in 1999.

As a boy, Dallas developed his passion for cars, spending time with his father, the long-time service manager at Wally Orvik Chevrolet in Moscow. Dallas went on to be an auto technician and worked for 23 years at Chipman and Taylor Chevrolet in Pullman. He later worked at Kendall Chevrolet in Lewiston.

Dallas was highly regarded as a master technician and specialized in rebuilding and repairing transmissions for performance cars from around the county. He also restored collector performance cars including a Pontiac GTO and Chevrolet Novas. His 1966 Nova was featured in photo spread in a national car magazine.

Nitro, Dallas' loyal dog, was always by his side. Dallas enjoyed spending time with his father at the family farm riding the four-wheeler. He was an avid Gonzaga University basketball fan and enjoyed spending his last birthday with his brother attending a Bulldog game in Spokane.



Marnie's classroom had a



Make this special plate as a gift to give this Christmas.

#### What you need:

- Clear glass plate
- Acrylic craft paint
- Paintbrush and water
- Black permanent marker

#### What you do:

- 1. Turn plate upside-down on table. Paint one of your palms brown, and press it on the center of the plate.
- 2. Rotate the plate so fingers point down. Using yellow paint, make a straw bed in the palm.
- 3. Mix white and brown paint for Jesus' face. Use white paint for a swaddled body.
- 4. Paint a yellow star above Jesus and a yellow border around the plate rim.
- 5. When paint is dry, turn plate over. With the marker, draw dots for Jesus' eyes and write the words of Luke 2:12 around the plate rim.



#### **Pastor's Discretionary Fund**

The Pastor's Discretionary Fund is used by the Pastor to assist individuals and families that are in need. Most often it is used to assist people who stop by the church office and request assistance for basic needs. Community organizations may also refer to Pastor, persons who need assistance. Pastor investigates each case by checking in with the Sheriff's Office and or Latah County Social Services both of which share a common data base that can spot repeating requests and persons to keep an eye on. These requests to the Pastor's Discretionary fund may be:

◆ They are homeless and need a place to stay for a night or two. The fund can provide temporary hotel housing for up to 3 nights while other arrangements are being made. Pastor will assist these people in connecting with local resources. Most people may receive housing assistance up to 2 times per

year, however circumstances and situations may direct more assistance...especially when there are children involved.

- ◆ They may need assistance with utilities that are about to be denied. Pastor calls the utility provider and helps to set up a payment plan that incudes an initial payment from the Discretionary Fund.
- ◆ They are traveling through town and need gasoline or vehicle repairs so they can continue to their destination. Their personal resources are depleted. Pastor assists them in purchasing fuel or finding a mechanic who can repair their vehicle for a reasonable rate.
- ◆ People need to see a doctor or need medicine. Pastor uses the Moscow Clinic to provide these services. They may need a prescription filled and this is done through Rosauers Pharmacy.
- ◆ People may need food. They are connected with our local food bank and/or food is given from our ELC kitchen surplus or is purchased by



Pastor.


 Preschool families sometimes need assistance with, rent, utilities, food, medicine, clothing or tuition.


ELC has the gracious ministry of "loaves and fishes," assisting people with their most basic needs. This is a very "hands on" ministry through our Pastor. The Pastor's Discretionary Fund is in need of your financial support. Could your support for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund be above and beyond your usual gracious giving? If you are able to, please give a separate offering ear marked for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.

(Our Church Treasurer and our Pastor administrate the Pastor's Discretionary Fund.)

#### **Treasurer's Report**

Income and expenses this year need to average about \$26,200 per month to meet budget. Income for the general fund in October totaled about \$25,400 and expenses paid during the month were about \$23,300. As a result, the general fund deficit for the year-to-date has been reduced to about \$8,200. Expenses paid for the year-to-date are slightly below budget.

#### **Presidingbishop**

#### See each other as brother, sister

#### This is most certainly true: Remember Eighth Commandment explanation

I remember a particularly contentious meeting with a church council when I was a synod bishop. It didn't start out that way, but bit by bit the mood changed. Council members began to question my motives, then my veracity, then my character. Finally I said, "Hey, I have a mother you know." That broke the tension. My point was that I was a human being just like them, not a bloodless functionary. I had become "The Man," which made me sad and was hugely confusing for my husband.

I would like to say this was an isolated incident in my experience of life in the church, but it was not. Nor is it confined to the church. Suspicion and blame aren't new. Bearing false witness was around way before Moses received the commandments. But it seems that the climate of distrust and accusation in society has become more heated. It's just more disappointing when it happens in the church.

Many theories can be put forward about why we behave this way: people feel threatened or discounted, people feel deeply about an issue, the topic at hand is critically important, truth is at stake. When the discussion or letter or email reaches this level of intensity, it's no longer possible to

hear one another. And as the tension and the volume increase, our vision becomes impaired. We are no longer able to see the other as a brother or sister, someone for whom Christ died.

This constricted conversation is becoming a habit. It is the default setting for us when our position is challenged or when we challenge someone else. It is a bad habit. And like all bad habits it is, in the short run, a lot easier and more fun to practice than its corresponding good habit. I'll admit it, there is something satisfying about being so certain. It's easier to ascribe motive than to engage in an open dialogue with the sincere intent of seeking understanding. Righteous indignation feels good.

In the church this is called "prophetic," as if being prophetic only takes the form of scolding. I have received letters and emails suggesting I do things that are anatomically impossible and certainly not

appropriate to reprint in a church publication. These epistles sometimes end with "In Christian love ...." I know a conversation is going to head south in a hurry

when it starts with these words: "With all due respect ...."

There is another way.

In his Small Catechism, Martin Luther gives us this explanation of the Eighth Commandment: "We are to fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light."

What a beautiful and generous way of being. The self is no longer at the center. The focus is no longer on

justifying or defending one's own position. All attention and care can be given to the other. As the volume is turned down our sight improves—we now see a precious child of God. Paradoxically this gentle approach makes it more possible to have difficult conversations.

We believe baptism makes a

difference and makes us different, that our lives are now hidden in Christ, that we are inseparably joined to the love of God in Christ Jesus. We believe that in baptism God has set us free from sin, death and the devil. God has also set us free from ourselves. Because of this it is possible to engage in a new way of being together. The church can model respectful dialogue. Instead of contributing to the static of suspicion that fills the airwaves, we can be a community that creates an open space where questions really are questions, not accusations, and disagreement doesn't devolve into discounting. If we were to do this, congregational meetings might actually be fun. Let's try this: the next time we find ourselves on the giving or receiving end of less-than-graceful communication let's recite Luther's explanation of the Eighth Commandment.



#### **News From Liberia**

Ebola...Aids...Food shortage... and a Bible launching.

"You did not choose me;
I chose you and appointed you to go and bear much fruit,
the kind of fruit that endures..."

John 15:16

Ebola brought Liberia into the International news. But Ebola is just the latest challenge for a country just beginning to emerge from the effects of 25 years of civil war. Many Americans may not know much about this West African country founded by freed slaves. country is about the size of Tennessee home to more than four million of world's the most financially challenged people. Per capita income is \$223.90 (UN) 80% and of the population is living below the poverty line (World Fact Book). The situation is dire. Despair would be Yet, God chose easy. right now for a several decade long translation effort to come to fruition. For the first time ever, a complete translation of the Bible is available in Kpella, the native language of Liberia's largest ethnic group. This hopeful news came not from the news or the internet, but from

Emmanuel's congregation.

Jane Leidenfrost has lived some of the long

history of translating scripture into Kpella the language. Her husband Ted Leidenfrost heard a missionary speak of the need for

Christian literature in the Kpelle language in 1953 and recognized God's call. The couple spent 33 years learning from and sharing their love and their gifts with the Kpelle people of Liberia. Ted taught, developed ministered, Christian Education Materials and produced a Newspaper in the Kpelle language. Jane did illustrations for the publications, and taught women to read even as she homeschooled her children. own Meanwhile, Ted learned Hebrew and began the work of translating the Old Testament into Kpelle. The couple retired in 1989 and moved to Moscow, but Ted's work continued

in 2011. And now, at last, complete Bibles printed in Kpelle have arrived in Liberia. Jane's e-mail tells of a launching ceremony for

the Holy Scriptures in Kpelle and also includes a call for more literacy classes.

Like the e-mail. the stories of Liberia on Jane's heart are personal. They include a family friend, who was raised alongside her sons, Dunne seriously was injured during the civil There are many things he cannot do, but he is able to teach Kpelle at the University. would be teaching now, if the university was open. But like others who work in schools and business closed due to Ebola he is on leave without pay.

Meanwhile, September through December is the time the local crop of rice is harvested. Normally the work is done communally, but Ebola has prevented this. addition, boats with rice from Thailand won't dock, and the price of this staple food is rising fast. One news report states (Bloomberg) that farm families are eating next year's seed rice.

The challenges facing Liberia are huge. But, as Ted often found a way to tell us, our God is good. Who but God could know that a project so many years in the making would finally be launched in this time of need? Let us join Jane and her family in prayer for the people of Liberia.






