WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A “SENIOR?”

If you are a senior, it may serve to encourage you when you come under fire for the “mess” you have left for the younger generation. If you are not yet a senior, perhaps it might help you to stop and think that perhaps things are as they are—positive or negative, because you have played a part in it being that way. WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A SENIOR?

PRAYER SEMINAR BLESSED BY GOD

It was an exciting weekend at the First United Methodist Church in Olympia, WA.

The prayer team met to prepare for the weekend at just the right time, as the church was sending a mission team to Haiti to work there for ten days. We had opportunity to pray for Pastor Joanne Coleman Campbell and the team as they prepared to travel to Seattle for their flight to Haiti. We interceded for them throughout the weekend seminar and worship services.

The theme for the weekend was “The Power of Prayer.” God manifested his power as the participants in the weekend experienced ways in which to develop an intimate relationship with God, ways in which to nurture that relationship, ways of learning how to teach others—especially our children, how to develop that intimacy, and how to protect that relationship for ourselves and others through intercessory prayer.

Participants were given opportunity to gather into small groups of three, select a specific Scripture that was meaningful to them, and then pray that Scripture for themselves and for others in the group.

They also had opportunity to intercede for their families, their church, their community, our nation and the world. Jesus and the Holy Spirit lives to intercede for us and so we were able to join Jesus in that intercession.

Since May 12 was the Celebration of the Christian Home [Mother’s Day], Larry preached on the subject of “The Christian Family, a Miniature Kingdom of God on Earth.” based on Ephesians 1:3-14. As a Christian family—nuclear, as well as church family, we are called to be a holy, a forgiving and a reconciled people.

Following the first and second service, two different individuals greeted me at the door and each spoke about the need to forgive.

The first was a gentleman who said he thought he had forgiven but couldn’t forget. While standing there I led him through forgiveness for those who had offended him—which was their sin, and helped him seek forgiveness for his attitude toward them—which was his sin. He forgave, received God’s forgiveness and expressed thanksgiving for experiencing that forgiveness and freedom.

The second was a woman who said to me, “I am the woman in that story you told in your ser-

mon. My ex-husband did what her husband did. He had an affair, broke up our family, hurt our children and I have that same hatred in my heart for him. I led her through the forgiveness prayer as I had with the gentleman in the first service. She experienced God’s amazing forgiveness and freedom from her hatred.

Then she said, “I don’t attend this church. I go to another church, but today when I got up I felt that, for some reason, I was to come to this church. Now I know why. I needed to hear that story.”

We serve an amazing and awesome God who knows our needs even before we ask and shows us the way to go in order to have that need met. I love this ministry!

Jesus said; *"If you love only those who love you, what reward do you have? Even the tax collectors do that. And, if you greet only your brothers, what are you doing more than others? Even the pagans do that. **Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect.**"* Matthew 5:46-48

That's what Jesus said! *"Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect."*

In stark contrast, I have heard people say, "Well, nobody's perfect." And that statement is usually made on the heels of making a mistake or given as an excuse for doing or saying something hurtful or realizing that they've acted in ignorance or just plain 'screwed up.' "Well, nobody's perfect."

That may be true, but it is no reason or excuse for not making an effort to "go on to perfection," or reaching for that higher goal that Jesus set for us. As follower of Jesus we are called to reach for the higher goal of what God has for us and not lower the bar to a level where we can feel good about ourselves, even when we know that what we do is wrong. 'Nobody's perfect.'

When Jesus told his disciples to be perfect as their heavenly Father is perfect, he said it in the context of loving those who love them, but also challenging them to love those who don't love them—even their enemies. He told them to greet not only their brothers, people who look like them and think like them who are a part of their 'in group,' but also those who were not their brothers or those totally unlike them. In doing that they follow the example of God, who makes his sun shine on the evil and good and sends rain on the righteous and unrighteous.

The next time we are tempted to excuse ourselves or someone else's behavior by saying "Well, nobody's perfect,' perhaps we should remember our Lord's command: "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." Strong Words! No Excuse!


